History of the College

The Arkansas Polytechnic College was created by an act of the Arkansas General Assembly in 1909. Under the provisions of this Act the state was divided into four Agricultural School Districts. Boards of Trustees were appointed by the Governor with the approval of the Senate, and appropriations were made for the erection of buildings and employment of a faculty for a District Agricultural School in each of the four districts.

Changing and increased demands for college education in Arkansas caused the Board of Trustees in 1948 to convert the college from a junior college to degree-granting institution. So after twenty-one years as a junior college, accredited for nearly two decades by the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, the college in 1948-49 offered the third year of college work, and in 1949-50 the fourth year, with the first baccalaureate degrees awarded at the end of the 1949-50 spring semester. Arkansas Polytechnic College is now fully accredited as a senior college by the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools.

The purpose of Arkansas Polytechnic College is

to meet the educational needs of Arkansas' young men and women insofar as these needs may be determined and the facilities and resources of the College permit. The basic need for the broad development of the student in knowledge, experience, and attitudes, it is believed, is common to all educated citizenry. The curricula in their more specialized aspects, however, have been selected and developed to equip students, particularly those training for vocations such as business or teaching, primarily to meet the needs for service within the state or to prepare them for entrance into or continuance of professional study in Arkansas institutions.

In the development of its purpose Arkansas Polytechnic College is offering courses leading to baccalaureate degrees in the Divisions of Business Administration, Education, Languages and Literature, Science and Mathematics, Social Studies, and Fine Arts, two years of training in the Division of Agriculture and Home Economics and in the Division of Engineering as well as a two-year terminal course in the senior college divisions, and a two-year vocational training program in auto mechanics, machine shop, and wood-working.

Offerings in agriculture include agronomy, agricultural engineering, animal industry, forestry, pre-veterinary medicine, and horticulture. Offerings in home economics are liberal in scope, preparing for home-making or for a wide range of occupations for women. In order to develop well-rounded students, both departments encourage participation in extra-curricular activities and provide opportunity for training in leadership through the sponsorship of activities of common interest, such as Agri Day and FFA-FHA meets.

The objectives of Engineering at Arkansas Tech are to help the student to become acquainted with the professional and sub-professional fields in engineering so that he may select wisely his field of concentration, to form efficient study methods and orderly mental habits, to gain the basic knowledge necessary to meet the demands for more advanced work and for professional practice, to understand the quantitative and creative nature of the engineer's mode of thinking, and to develop a desire for continued growth as a professional man, a citizen, and an individual.

EDUCATION

The pre-service education of the teacher must be such that it will become functional in the life of the teacher as a professional worker. It is therefore concerned with the area of general education; and the field of professional competencies in the areas and at the level at which he works with children or youth.

Since it is assumed that practically all students enrolled in education courses at Arkansas Tech will be teaching in Arkansas schools, the curriculum of the Division of Education has been planned to include all courses necessary for certification by the State Department of Education. Within the Division of Education there are three departments: Elementary and Secondary Education; Physical Education; and Industrial Education.

Recognizing the needs of large groups of young men for training in skilled trades, the Division of Vocational Education at Arkansas Polytechnic College offers courses in woodworking (both carpentry and cabinet making), auto mechanics, and machine shop.

These non-credit courses, terminal in nature, are designed to enable the student to progress individually to gain the necessary proficiency as quickly as possible so that he may take his place in productive industry.

Arkansas Tech has complete and modern workshops for training students in these courses. Through donation and purchase of machines and equipment released by the United States Army, the College has been able to expand greatly its training facilities in these fields. Equipment in the various shops is valued at more than \$200,000.

While the College does not guarantee placement of its vocational graduates, it maintains an employment advisory service to assist in placing graduates in suitable employment.

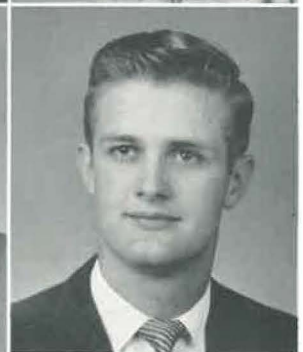

VOCATIONAL EDUCATION

In 1935, the National Youth Administration launched a vocational training program, and Arkansas Polytechnic College was selected as one of the centers for this work. A newly constructed group of buildings were used to house NYA students, and vocational work was carried on from 1935-1942. At the conclusion of the war, the shop was opened to train veterans, and a large amount of new equipment was added.

Tech has always tried to meet needs in the educational training of as many people as possible in Arkansas and especially in this section of the state. To do this Tech is now, as in the past, giving training to many people who are not regular college students. This fall a related training program has been added for high school graduates who are interested in vocational training.

The college has three shops all equipped and staffed for different fields of training. The program requires two years to complete, but many of the students find that they are ready to take a job in private industry long before they have finished the prescribed courses.

General education, as well as technical education, is an important factor of the Vocational Program. Students who have not finished high school are given training in English, math, and drawing leading to a high school diploma. Those students who have a diploma are allowed to take any courses in the college which they need or want.

The program is under the direction of Vincent R. Faulds, Assistant Professor of Industrial Education.

AUTO MECHANICS

The Auto-Mechanics course completely covers general auto-mechanics and also allows students to get special training in parts of the course where they want and need it.

Specialized areas include body and fender repair, radiator repair, engine rebuilding, brakes, tune-up, ignition, etc. The auto shop is equipped with the latest machines and auxiliary equipment, and is completely departmentalized.

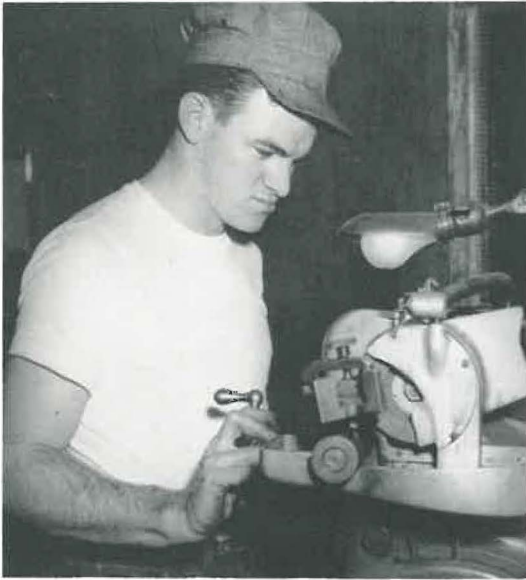

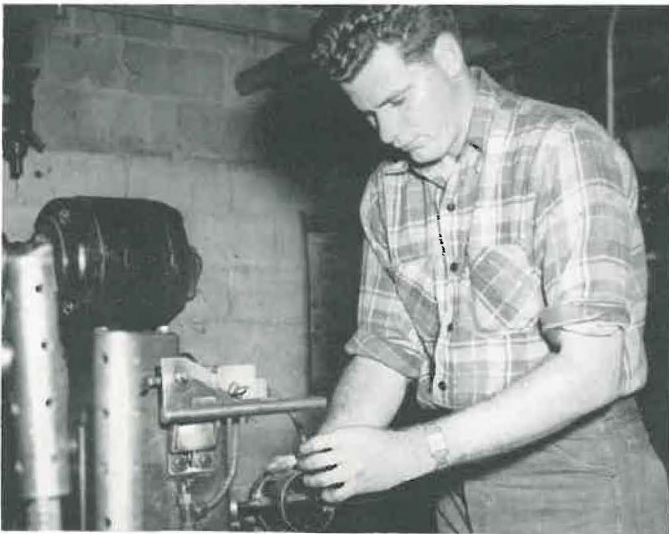

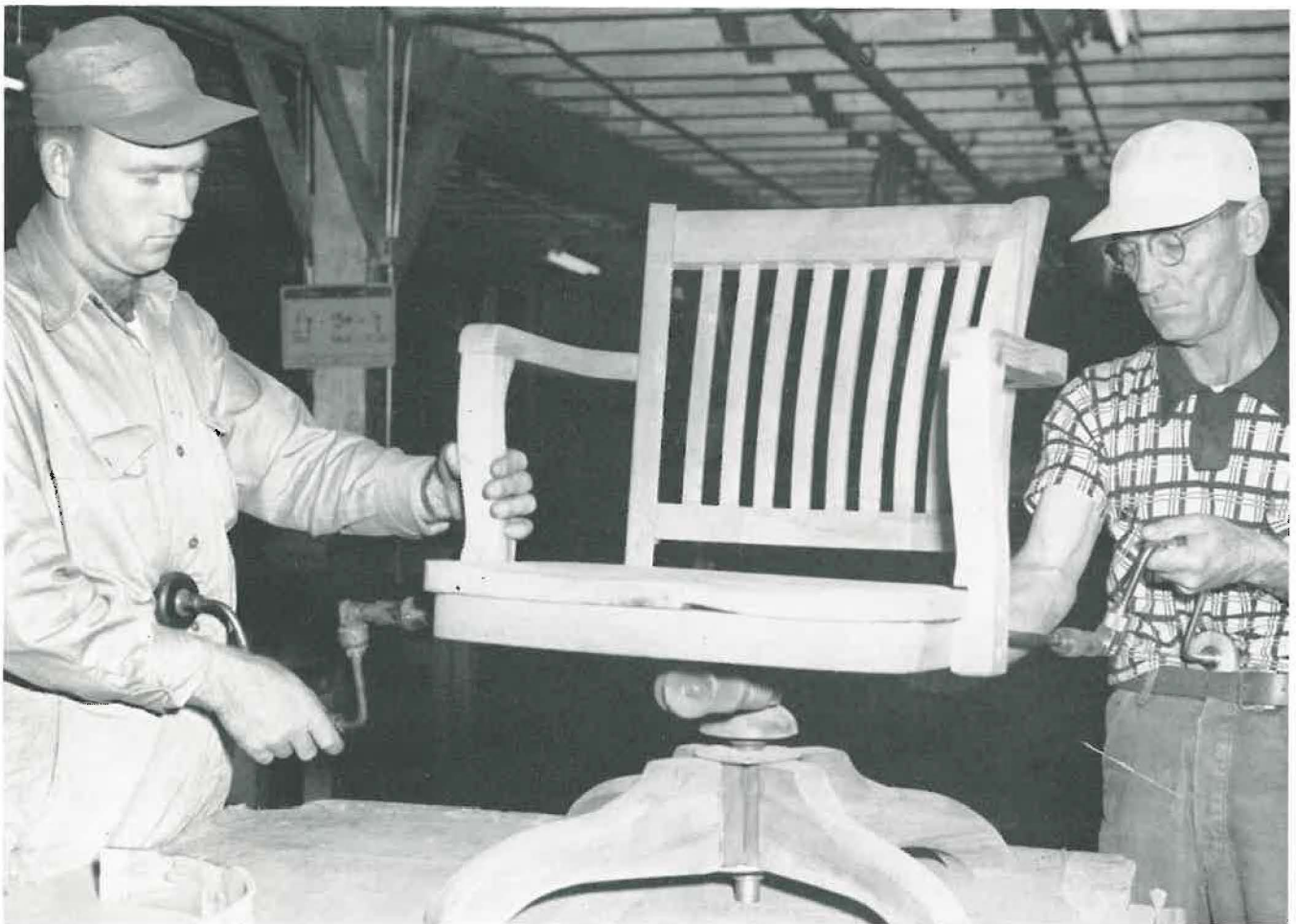

Rehearsals have begun on the second major Guild production as this publication goes to press. This production is to be Shakespeare's "Taming of the Shrew."

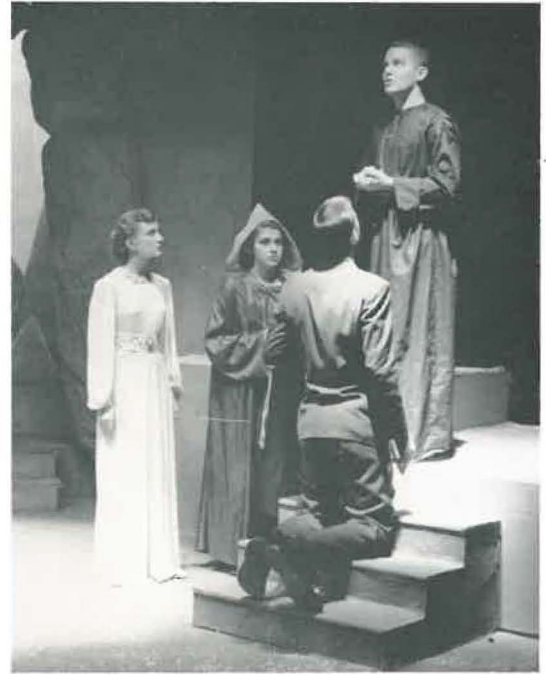

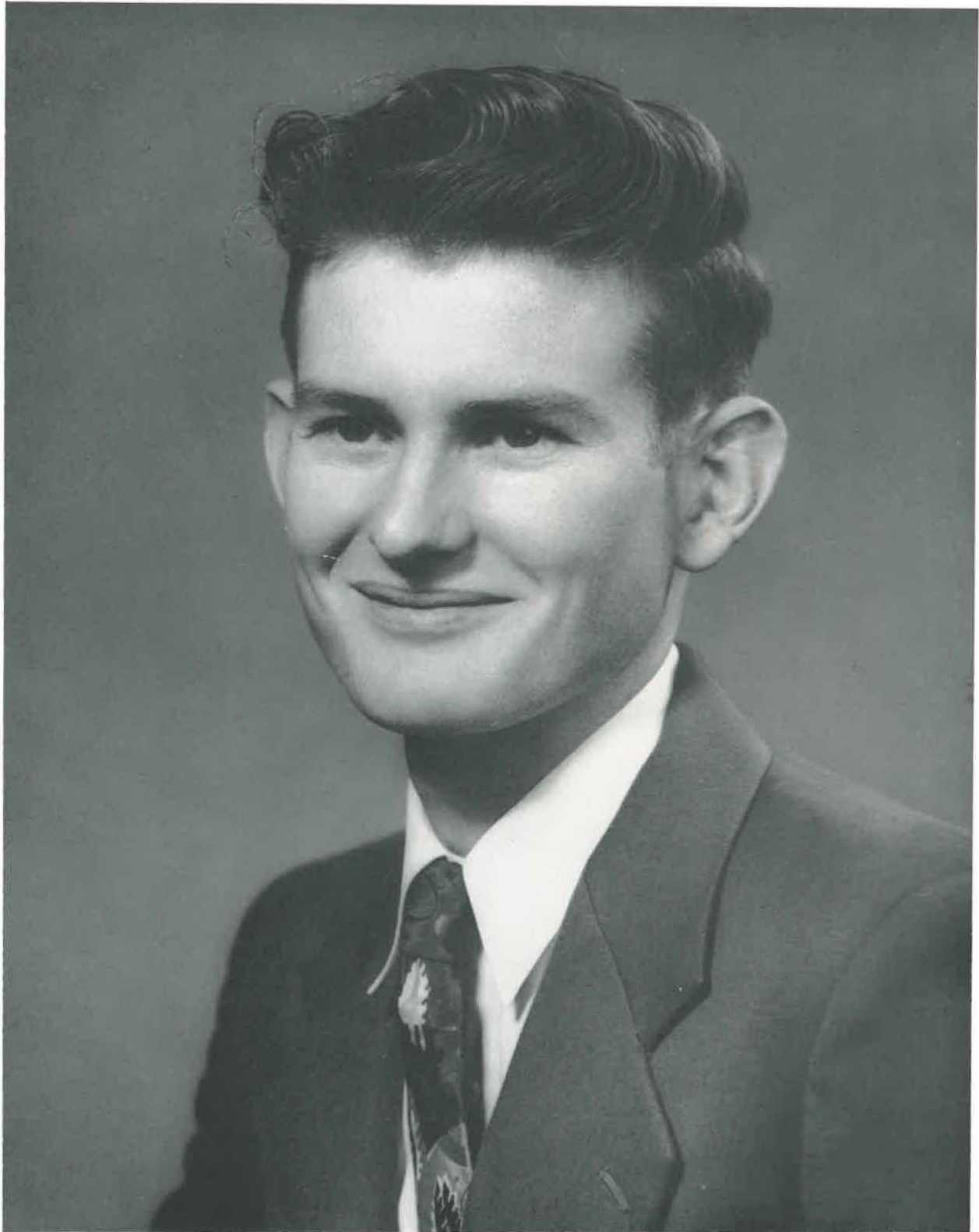

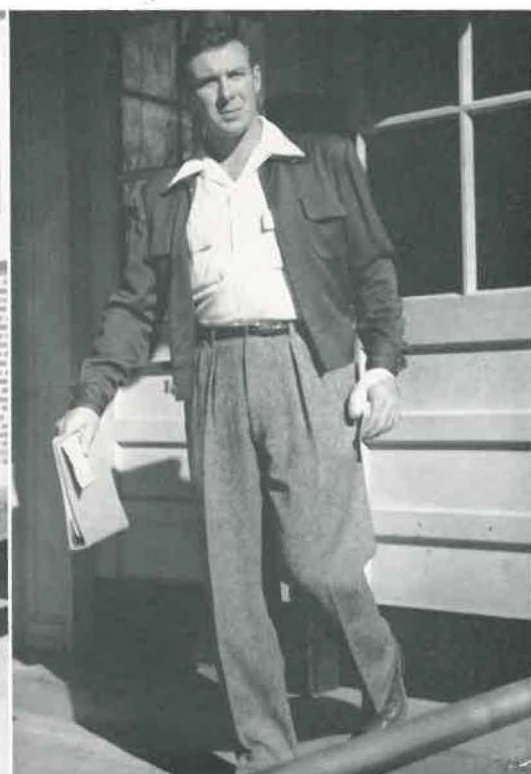

"HUP, TWO, THREE, FOUR." For the first time the sound of military cadence was heard across the campus. The reason was the new Department of Military Science and Tactics, which began instruction with the opening of the Fall Semester. Under the direction of Lt. Colonel James V. Sanden, Professor of Military Science and Tactics, the Military Department, or the ROTC Department as it is known to most students, was ready to begin the task of training college students to be commissioned officers in the U. S. Army. Although it is newest ROTC Unit in the state, the "Tech" Unit is one of the largest, with the prospect of an even larger enroll-

ment seen for next year.

The primary purpose of the Army Reserve Officers' Training Corps is to produce commissioned officers for the Organized Reserve Corps and the Regular Army. In the light of world conditions, the important role of the Army Reserve Officers' Training Corps is greater than it has ever been before. The continuous reinforcement of the Regular Army and Organized Reserve Corps with well-trained junior officers from the ROTC is an essential element of national security.

American colleges have always provided a large portion of the leadership of our nation in time of

peace. It is logical, then, that we should look to the colleges to provide leadership in times of danger. With the expansion of the Army today, vast numbers of officers are needed to train and lead Army units. The officer requirements for one Infantry Division is nine hundred and fifty eight. The officer requirements for the standing Army of today is filled with about one-third Regular Army officers and two-thirds Reserve Officers.

The Organized Reserve Corps and National Guard, "our second line of defense" for the nation, is completely staffed with Reserve Officers. Because the very survival of our nation depends upon the young men who are capable of fulfilling posts of leadership and responsibility the Army Reserve Officers' Training Corps, by producing these leaders, is contributing outstandingly to our national defense.

The Reserve Officers Training Corps as it is known today was authorized by the National Defense Act of 1916. The basic

graduates could be called up in quantity to take their places in the existing units. By the middle of 1941, 56,000 Reserve Officers, chiefly ROTC graduates, had been called into service.

A major change in policy is gradually being effected by the Army as regards the instruction of ROTC units. A progressive move towards branch general instruction is underway, but is dependent upon the experience being acquired in certain test

idea came from the Nation's past experience in needing officers in a hurry in an emergency. Since the training of officers took time, and since relatively few young men could be admitted to full time training at the Military Academy, it was decided that valuable results might be obtained by giving as much military training as was feasible in connection with regular civilian education. Building on the foundation of the already existing military college and "land grant" college programs, the Government authorized specific and comprehensive training for the various arms of the service in other institutions as well. These courses would lead to Reserve commissions for those completing them in satisfactory manner. Regular Army officers were detailed as professors and assistant professors of military science and tactics in the numerous institutions that were granted these ROTC units. Gradually a steady flow of new reserve officers came to be commissioned each year.

When the Army began its rapid expansion shortly after World War II broke out in Europe, it was necessary to detach large numbers of Regular Army officers from their regiments in order to organize and train the new outfits, and otherwise supervise the widespread problems involved in expansion. Fortunately, ROTC

units, and the desire of college authorities, as to its continuance. The ROTC Unit at Tech is one of the new Branch General units. Since its introduction in 1916, the Army ROTC program has presented specialized branch instruction to all ROTC students. The adoption of the Branch General instruction is regarded as one of the major steps undertaken by the Army to revitalize the program and increase its effectiveness as a primary source of officers.

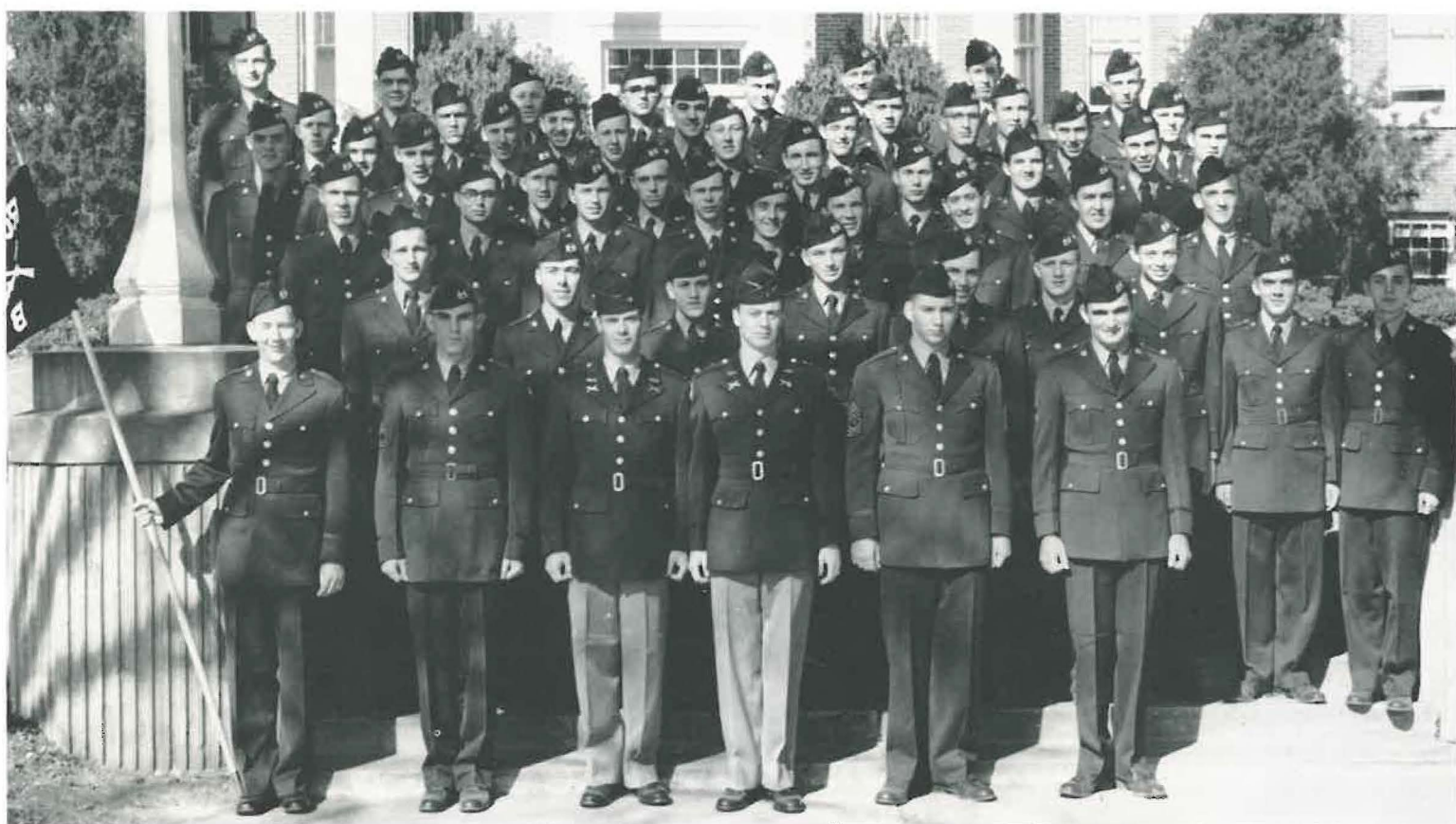

1952 Season

September 18, found the Wonder Boys matched with the strong East Central Tiger team, and the Techsters had been on the practice field for two weeks, conforming with the newly enforced AIC regulations. East Central took the game by a score of 28-11, but Tech sup-

porters became optimistic when they viewed the fighting Wonder Boys in action, regardless of the loss.

Then came the big game of the season as far as the title race and conference prestige were concerned. On October 4, the Wonder Boys pounded the future AIC champion Southern State Muleriders for two and a half quarters, then fell victim to a well-remembered lateral play in which the ball was picked up on the first bounce by the opposition and parlayed into a touchdown. The final score; State 13-Tech 7.

Northeastern State College of Tahlequah, Okla., was next on the agenda for the Wonder

Boys on October 11. Tech lost by a large margin, 33 to 13. However, with four minutes to go in the final quarter, the Redmen led 19 to 13, and Tech was still connecting with their potent aerial attack of the night which found quarterbacks, Dave Sacrey and Jimmy King, hit receivers Bill Davis, C. J. Richison, Don Dempsey and I. E. Turner for 27 completions. Pretty good throwing in any man's game!

After three straight losses, the Wonder Boys played host to the Arkansas State Teachers College Bears, and the results were heartwarming. The Wonder Boys played a tremendous first

half and defeated their arch rivals the "Mighty" Bears of A.S.T.C. for what was to prove to be their only victory of the season. Sammy May's 154 yards gained in the first half, Luther Young's brilliant line bucks and refusal to be stopped despite a plaguing knee injury, along with truly magnificent team play and spirit combined to give Tech continued mastery over the Teachers.

For the rest of the season, the Green and Gold found fate and fortune looking down on them, and dropped the four remaining games on their schedule.

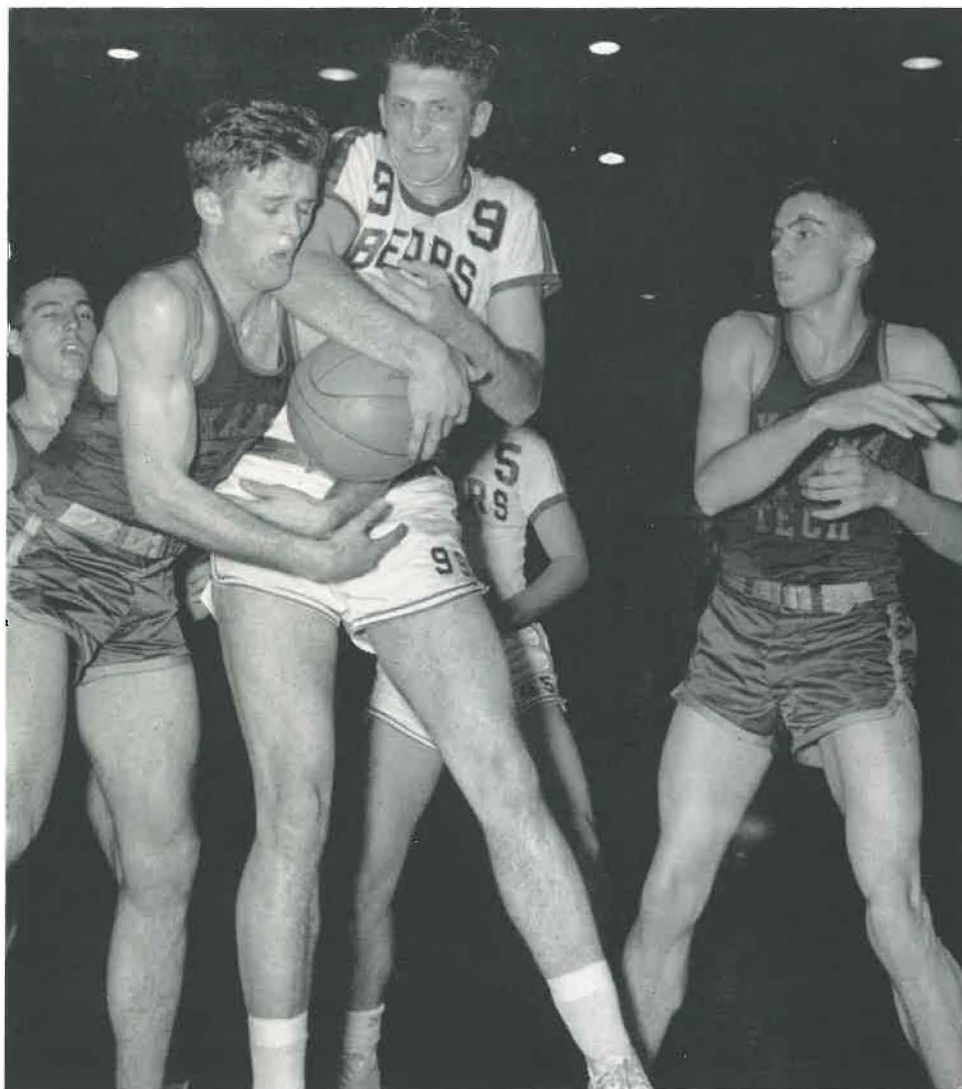

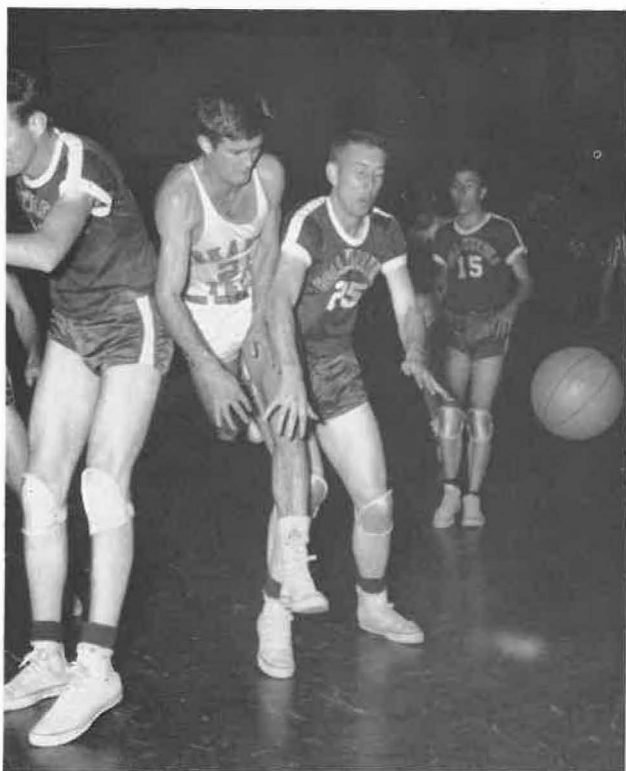

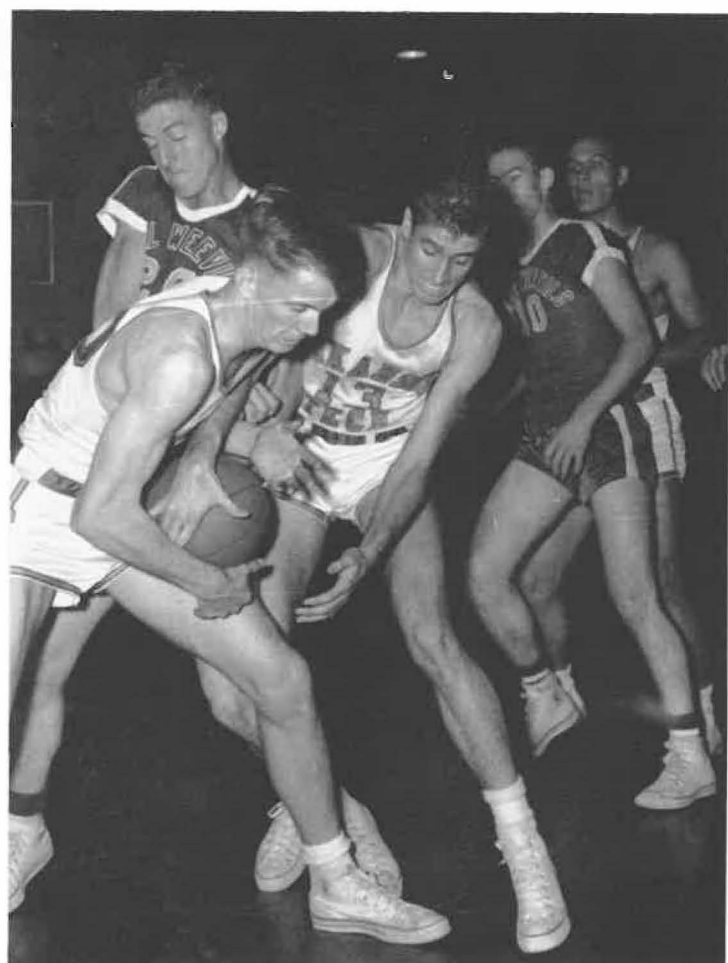

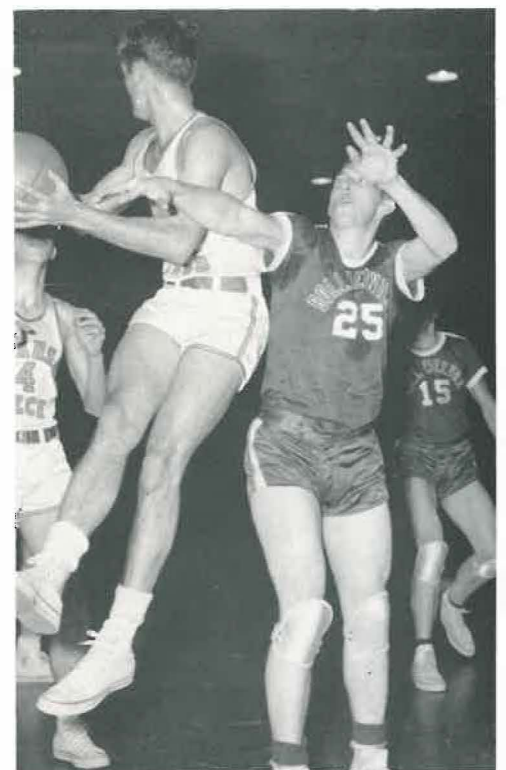

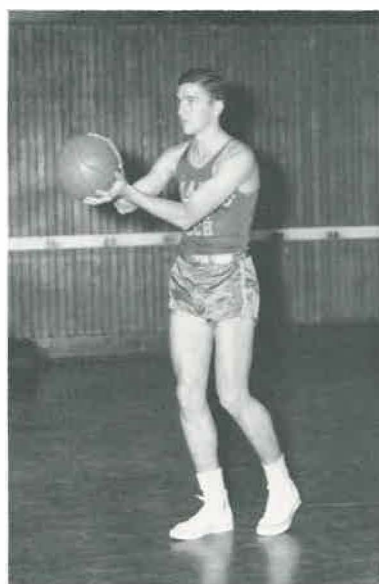
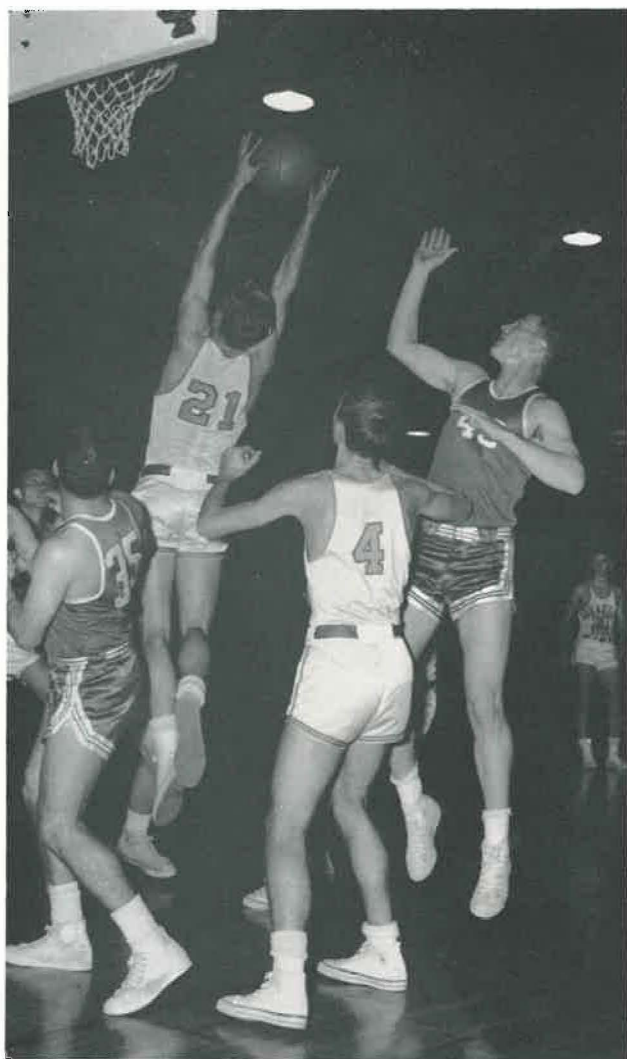

1952-53 SEASON

The Tech Cagers opened the 1952-53 basketball season in fine style with a 97-70 win over Beebe JC on Dec. 1. On Dec. 5, the Wonder Boys journeyed to Little Rock to meet the Junior College Trojans. After a dismal first half, the Techsters found the range in the last half to score 62 points of their 103 total. Final score was Tech 103—JC 78. The first home game of the season was on Dec. 12, when the Wonder Boys again defeated Beebe JC 134-61.

Tech played hosts to Northeastern State College of Tahlequah, Okla., on Dec. 12. The Oklahoma Redmen were thoroughly trounced as Tech took an early lead of 26-15 at the end of the first quarter, and went on to win 95-68.

The Wonder Boys handed Arkansas A.&M. a 96-83

defeat Dec. 13, in a rough and tumble game in the Tech Armory. In the first quarter the Techsters limited A.&M. to 13 points, while making 36 themselves. However, in the final period A.&M. came back strong to score 27 points compared to Tech's 16.

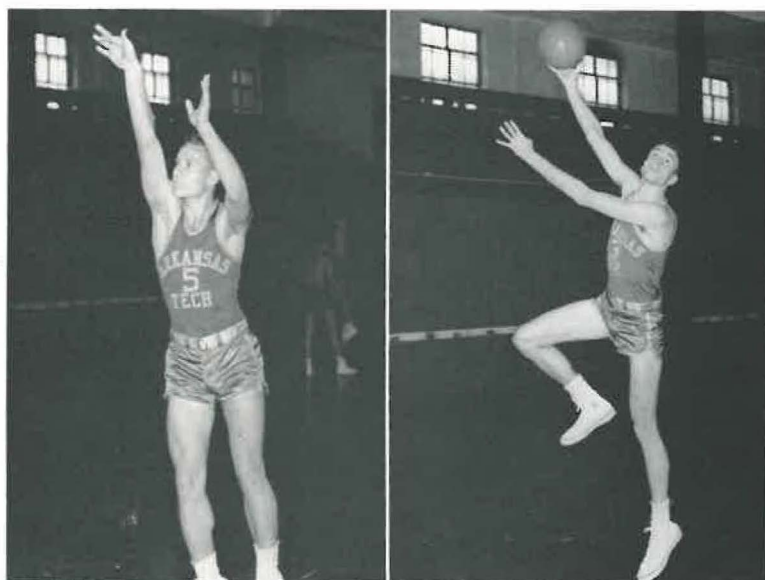
During the week before the Christmas holidays, the Wonder Boys triumphed over Arkansas College 86-68, and Little Rock JC 91-79. Returning from the holidays, the Tech team traveled to Conway to overpower Hendrix 99-57.

Henderson was next on the schedule on Jan. 15. The Reddies were easy victims for the Tech cagers. The first platoon jumped into an early lead and from then on Tech was never pressed and won the game, 100-52.

Jan. 21, the Wonder Boys paced by their two senior

squadsmen, B. B. Baker and D. Ruff, battled the Mountaineers on even terms in the first half, before gaining a 39-21 lead at half time. The College of the Ozarks team outscored Tech in the third period, 21-22. However, that was all for the Mountaineers, as Tech went on to win, 87-65.

Ouachita was next on the schedule on Jan. 24. Led by Robert Wolfe and Willard Smith, with 14 points apiece for high scoring honors, the Wonder Boys romped over Ouachita 101-73.

Tech met their old foes, the Bears from State Teachers on Jan. 27, at Conway. After a slow start, the Wonder Boys gathered speed in the third and fourth quarters and defeated the Tutors, 95-77.

The Wonder Boys dropped the rugged Southern State Muleriders 83-81 in a last minute freeze in a crucial AIC game before an overflow crowd in the Armory, Jan. 30. This game was classed as the "big one" in the battle for the conference championship. It was a see-saw affair all the way with the score being tied six different times, and the lead constantly changing.

Feb. 3, found the Techsters at Magnolia, again playing the Muleriders. This time the Wonder Boys downed the Riders by the large margin of 90-72. Coach Hindsman used a bit of surprise strategy by starting his second platoon and winding up the game with the first platoon.

Victory number fifteen was won on Feb. 9, as the Wonder Boys ran over Arkansas A.&M. Boll Weevils, 124-86, at Monticello. It might be said that this victory was won especially for Coach Hindsman who was

in the hospital and unable to accompany the team on the trip.

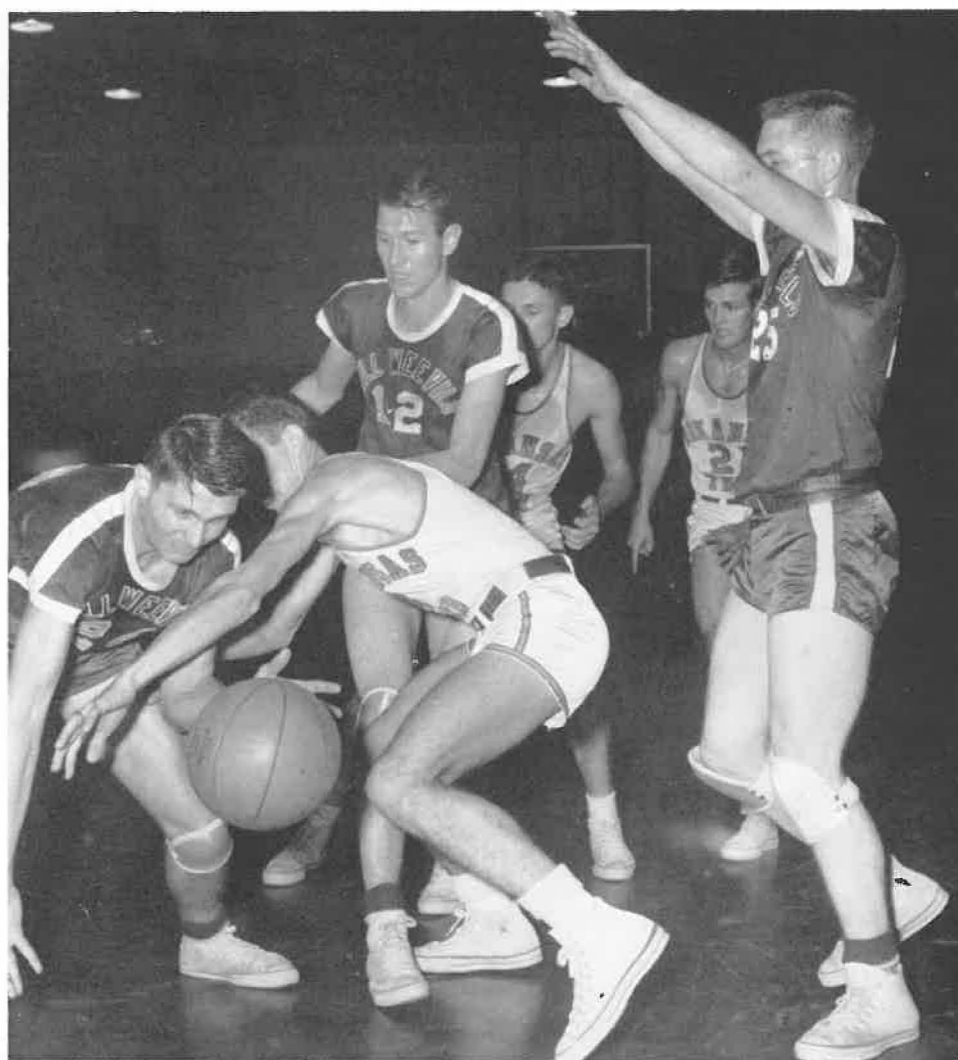
Two games in two days was the schedule for Feb. 13 and 14. On Feb. 13, the Wonder Boys defeated Ouachita on their home court, 83-77. The next evening found them at Henderson, defeating the Reddies, 115-86.

The "game of games" occurred on Feb. 17, in the Armory as the Techsters again clashed with the Bears from Conway. It was a fight from the opening whistle, with the score being tied fifteen times. The Wonder Boys put on a brilliant comeback in the final minutes of the game to edge out an 84-83 victory over the fired-up State Teachers five.

Feb. 21, the Tech cagers again triumphed over the Hendrix College Warriors, 82-69, on the Warriors' court. On Feb. 24, Tech beat Arkansas College, 97-70. The last home game was played against the College of the Ozarks quintet on Feb. 26. Tech kept their perfect "no loss" record by defeating the Mountaineers, 117-60.

March 2 and 3, found the Tech team in Little Rock, at the NAIB Tournament. Here they defeated Arkansas State 97-80, and Arkansas College 79-74, to win their fifth consecutive AIC Championship.

This Championship entitled them to travel to Kansas City, on March 10, to represent Arkansas in the NAIA Tournament. In the first round they defeated East Carolina State, 85-81. However, the Wonder Boys bowed to Indiana State, 81-100, in the second round, after playing a terrific game and ending a wonderful season with 24 games won, one lost.
