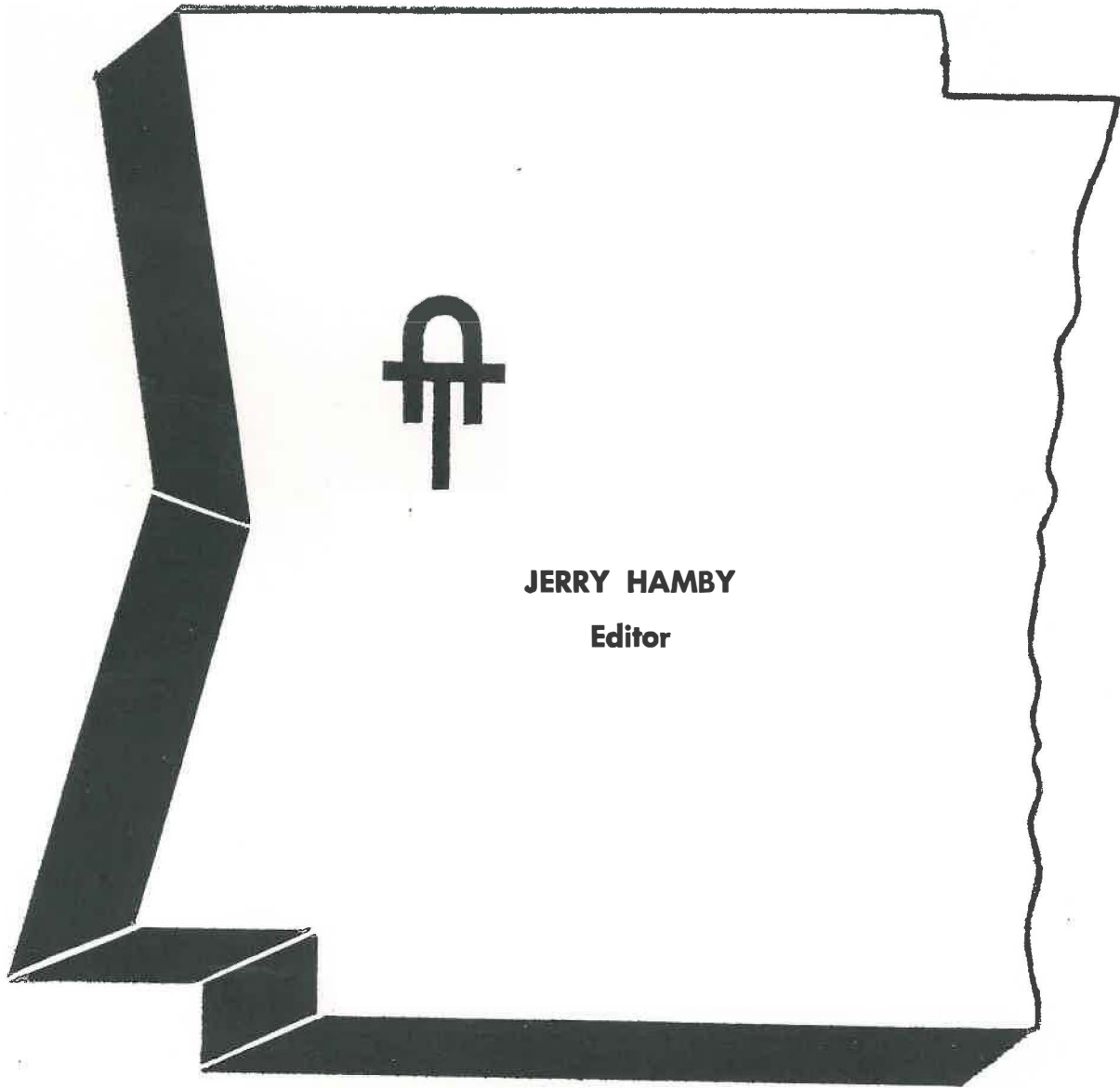

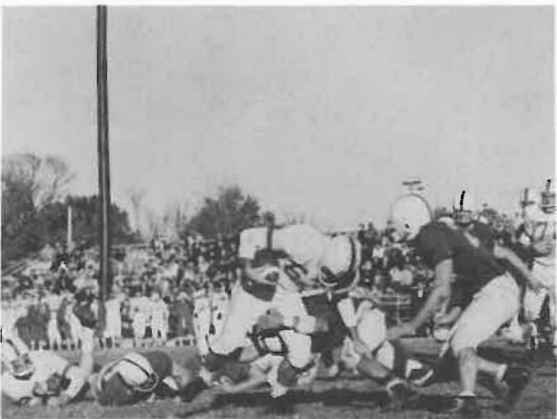

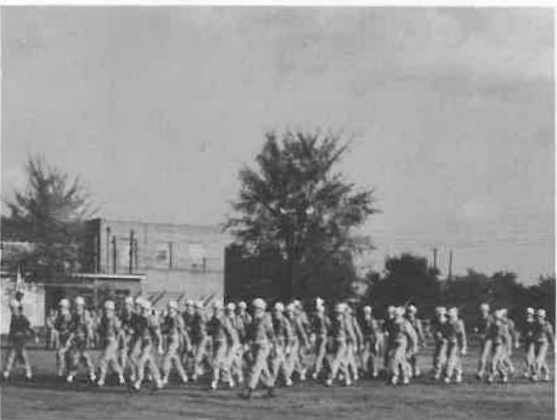

That was a statement made by an athlete who had had this man as his coach and it pretty well stands as consensus of how all the boys who have ever played under him feel. As an athletic coach, he is in a position to have a great deal of influence on the lives of young men growing into maturity . . . and what is more important than guiding the leaders of tomorrow along the right paths?

A speaker once stated that Coach Marvin Salmon had been around Arkansas Tech longer than even President Hull, recalling the fact that he grew up just off the campus and later went on to attend school and play football here. "Shorty" was one of the gridiron giants at Tech during its junior college era. He went on to Oklahoma A. & M. to gain his B.S. degree, performing pigskin chores there also.

He served with the United States Marine Corps in World War II during which he was severely wounded in battle.

After a highly successful tenure as head coach at Russellville High School, he finished his work for a M.S. degree at the University of Arkansas in 1953 and came to the APC campus in 1954.

It is our feeling that if all persons in position to affect the lives of youngsters on the road to manhood were of the calibre of Coach Salmon, then there would be nothing to worry about as far as our future citizenry is concerned.

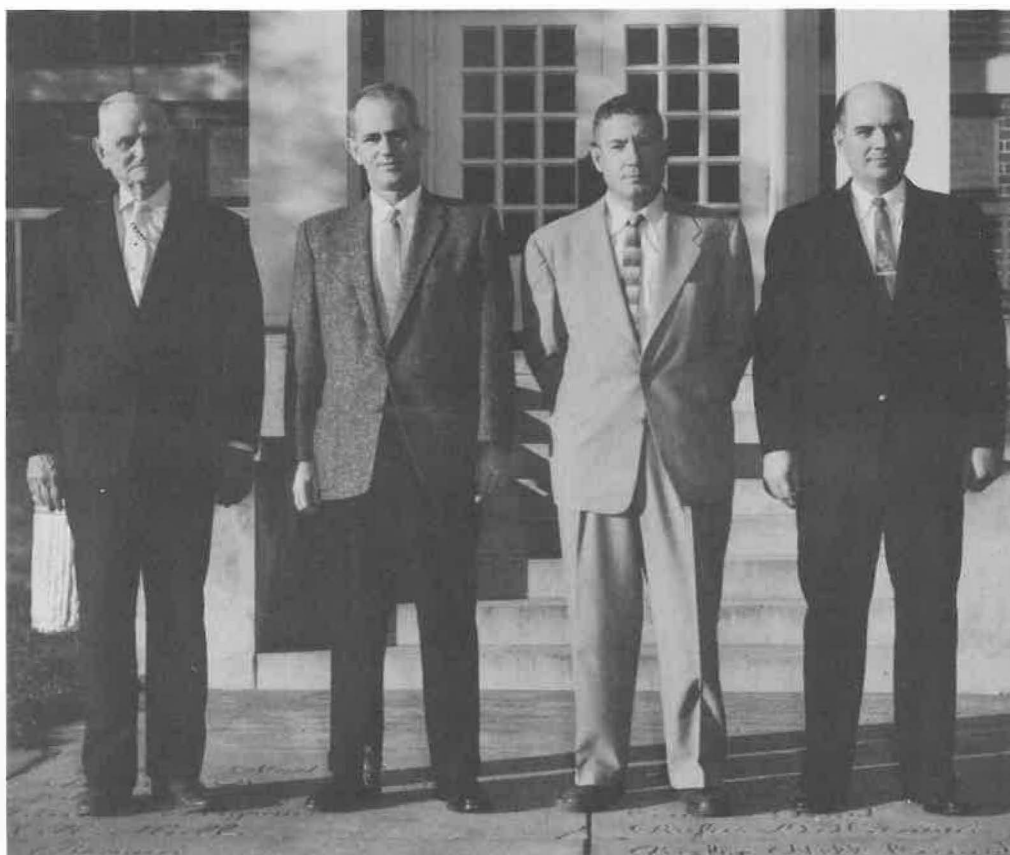

"PRESIDENT'S LETTER"

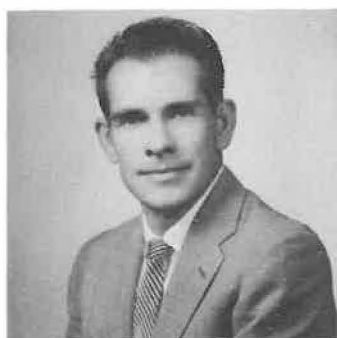


BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION

Graduates with a major in physical education may go into many fields, including teaching physical education, coaching, physical therapy and social work.

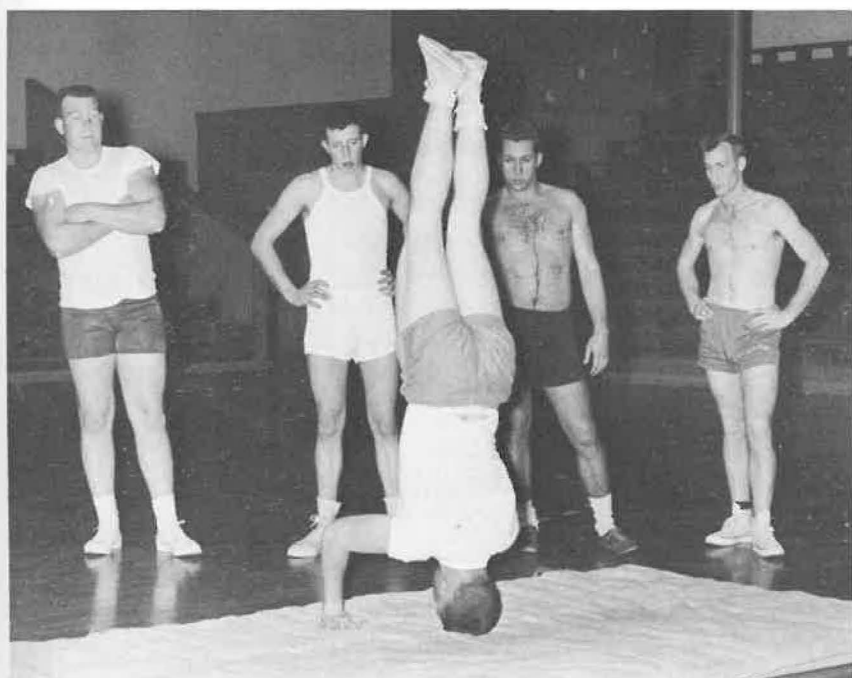

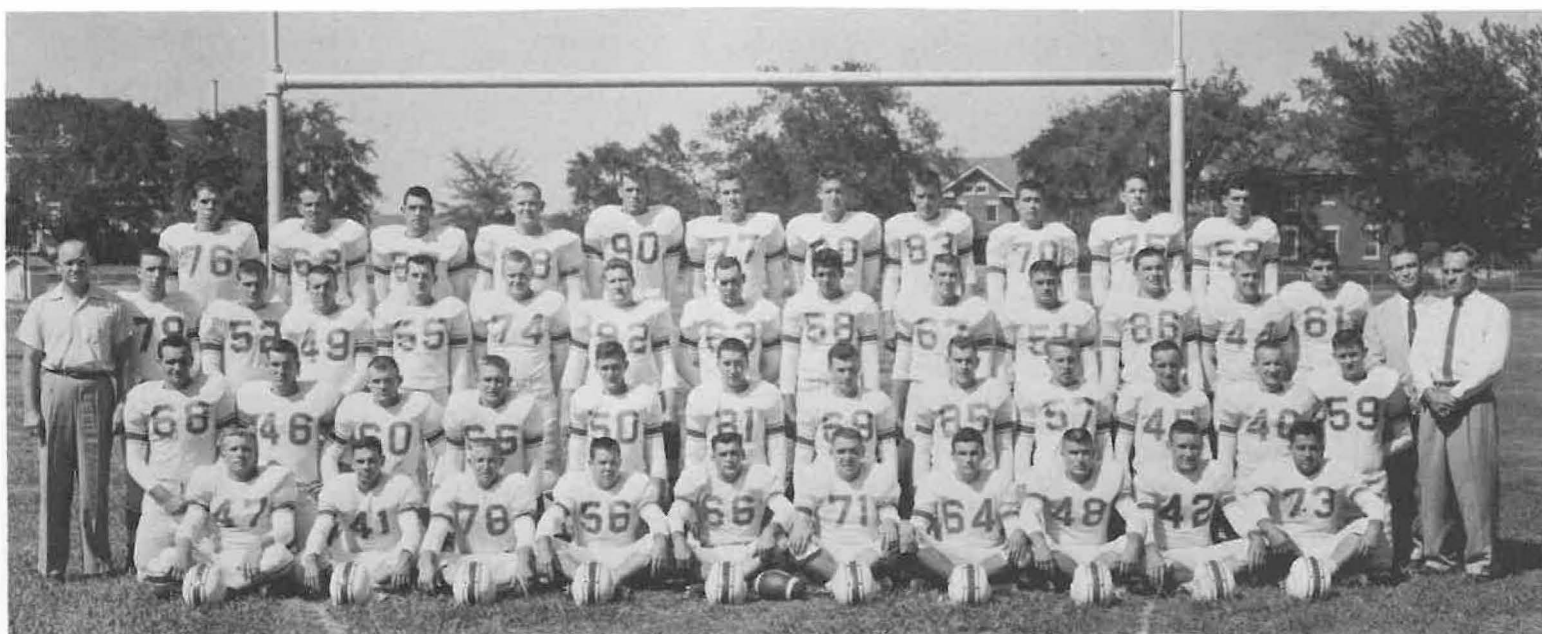

A graduate course in swamp control couldn't have helped the Wonder Boys fight off the scourge by demonic inhabitants that hover in the Louisiana bayou lands.

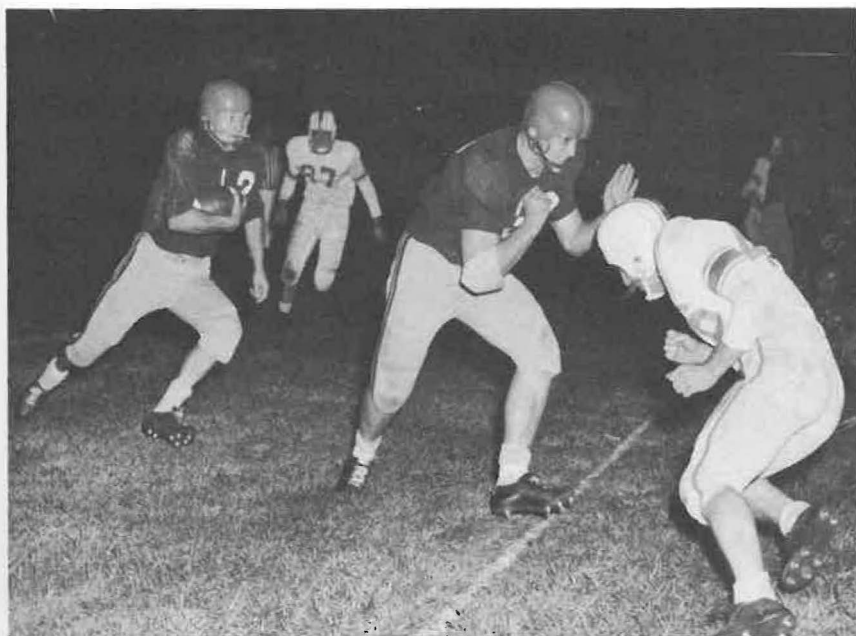

Little Frank Mobley, one of the best backs in the Mid-South, was the big gun for the 'Cats, scoring two touchdowns and adding an extra point.

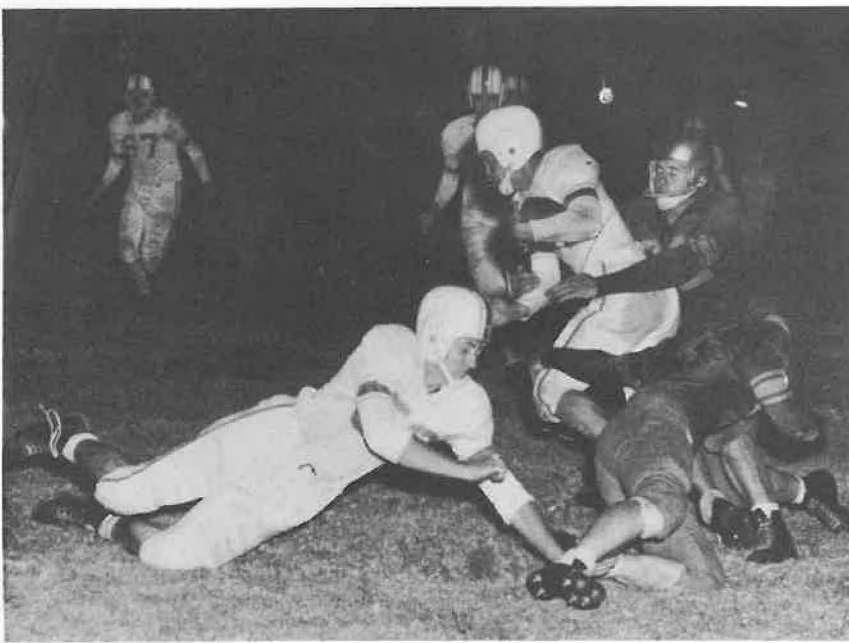

TECH 19 SOUTHEAST MISSOURI 14

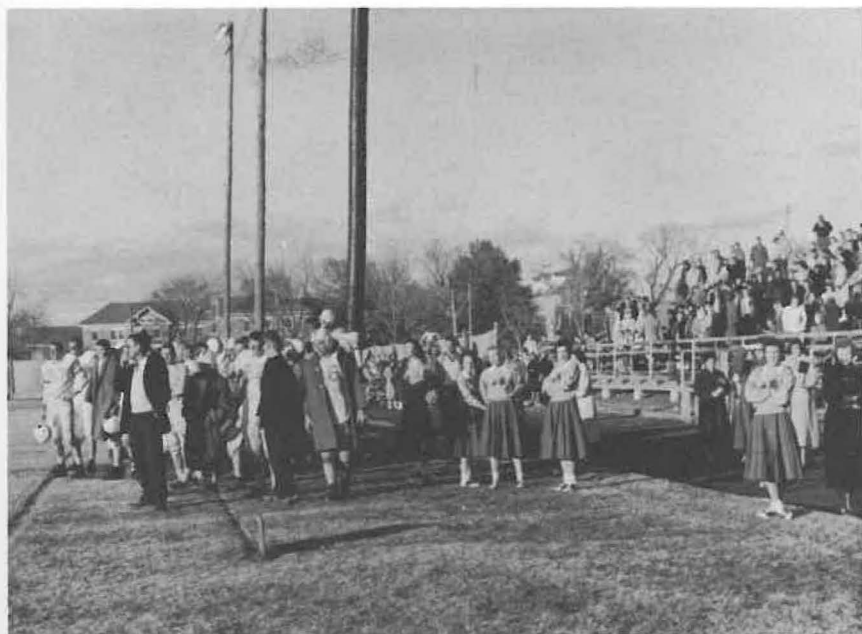

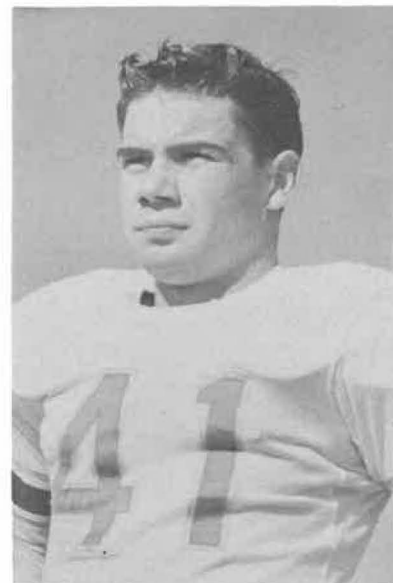
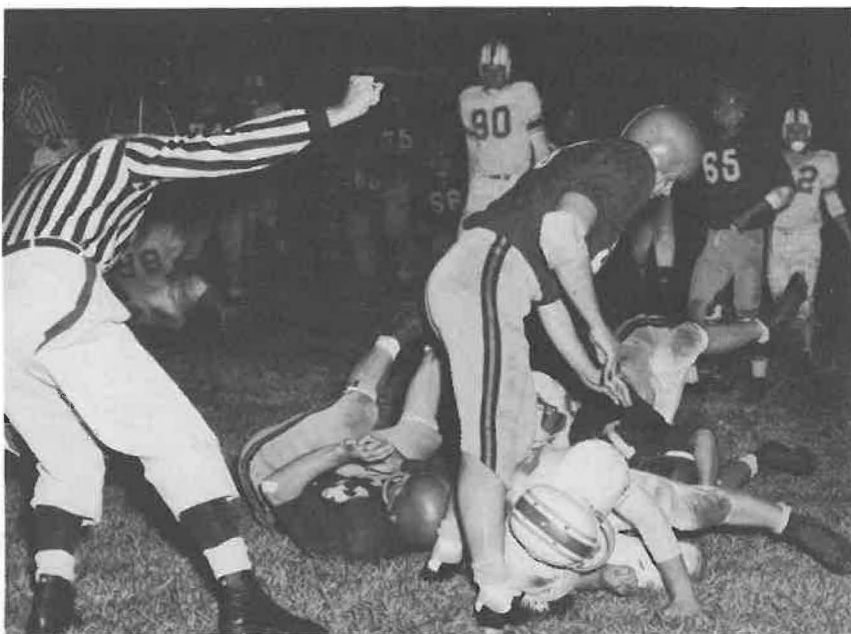
After Tech failed to complete a drive in the first quarter the Rangers took over to score twice in the second period to grab a 14-0 halftime lead.

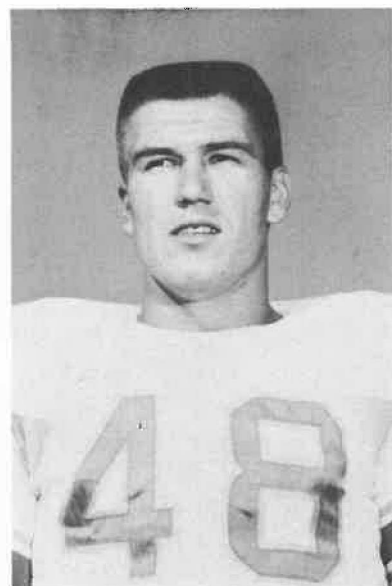
A safety, which the Techsters gave up on a gamble, brought about the breaking of a tie.

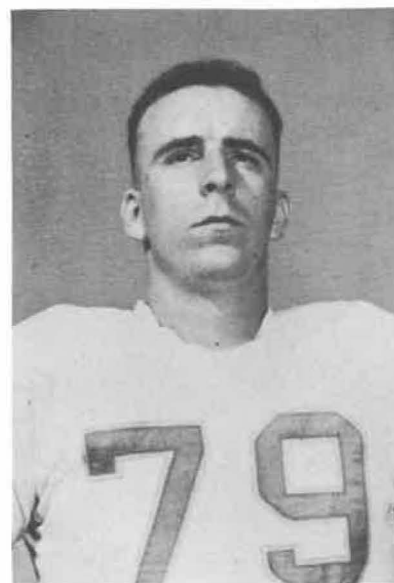

TECH 32 DELTA STATE 34

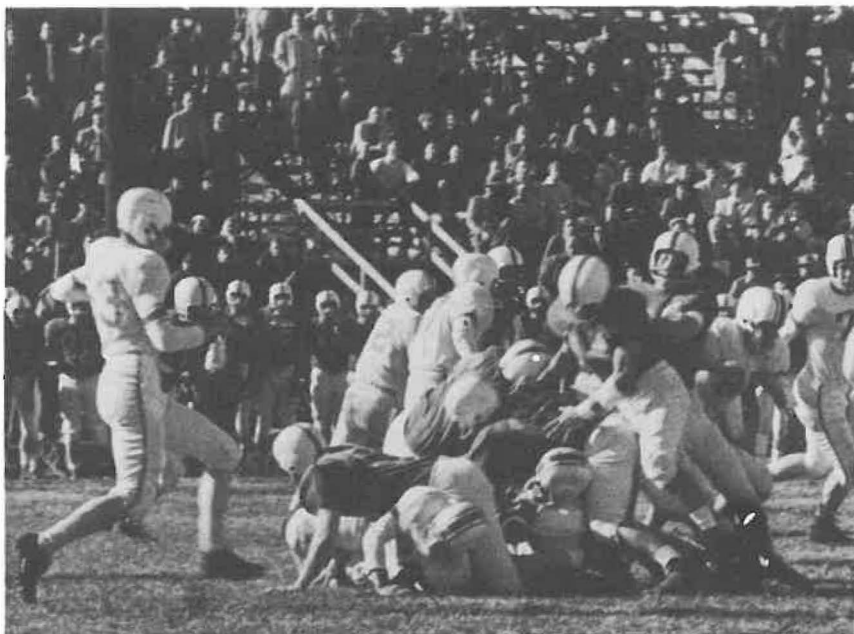

The Statesmen were the first to attack and stayed barely in control as the Wonder Boys countered constantly with air power to keep the battle on even terms for most of the tilt.

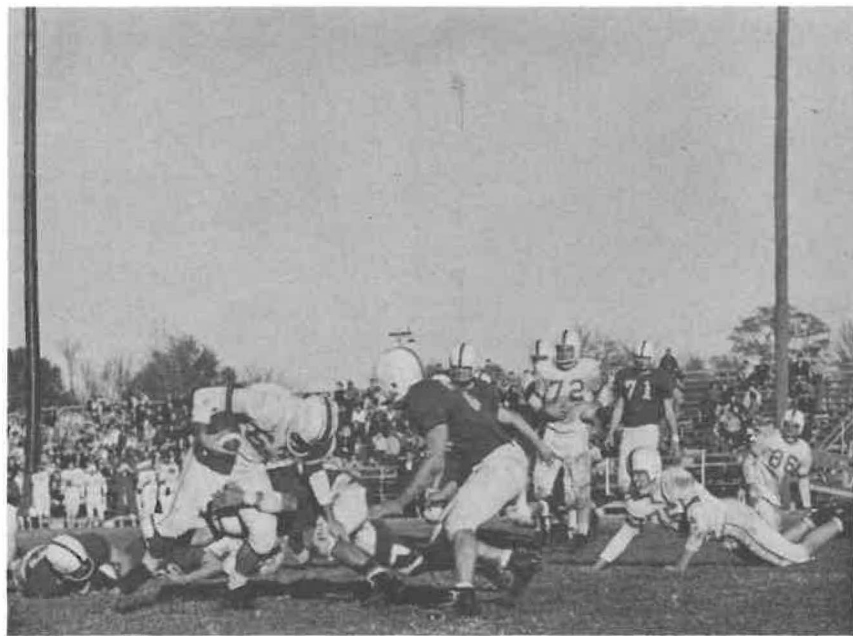

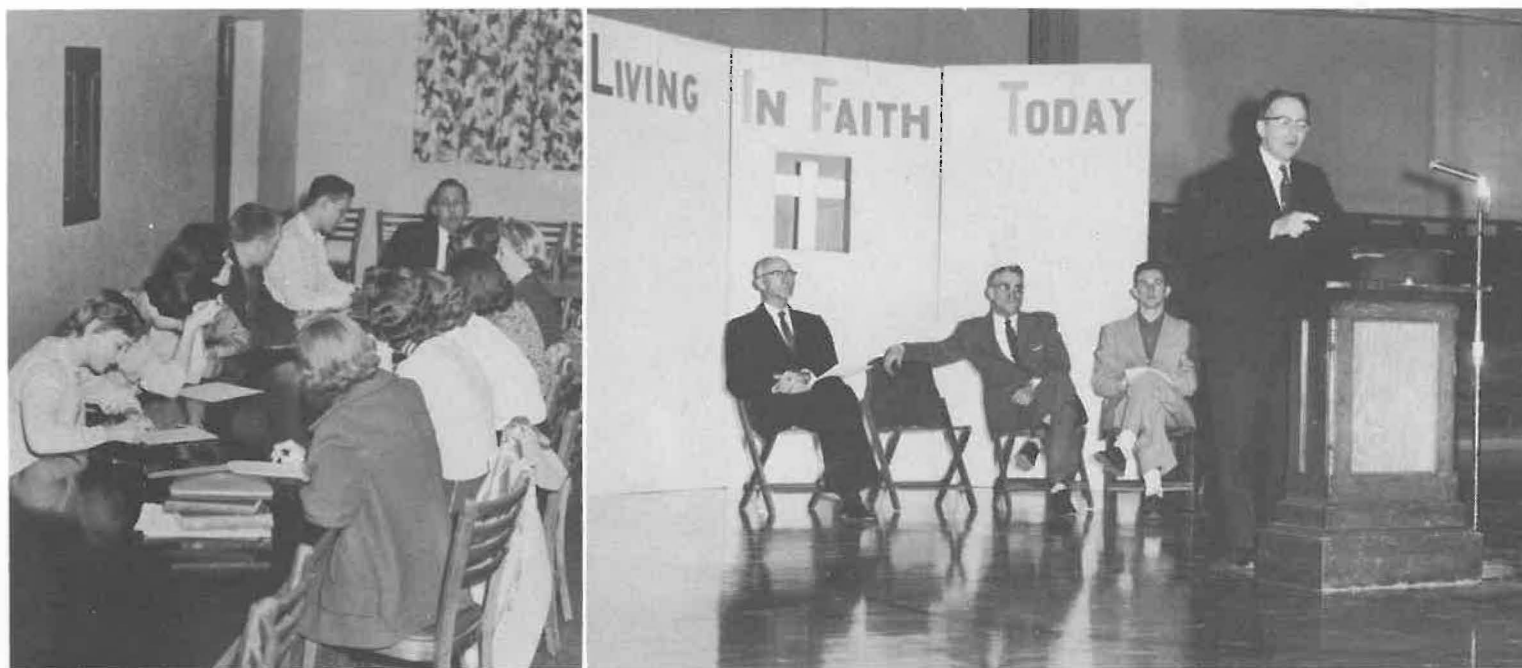
Student Christian Association

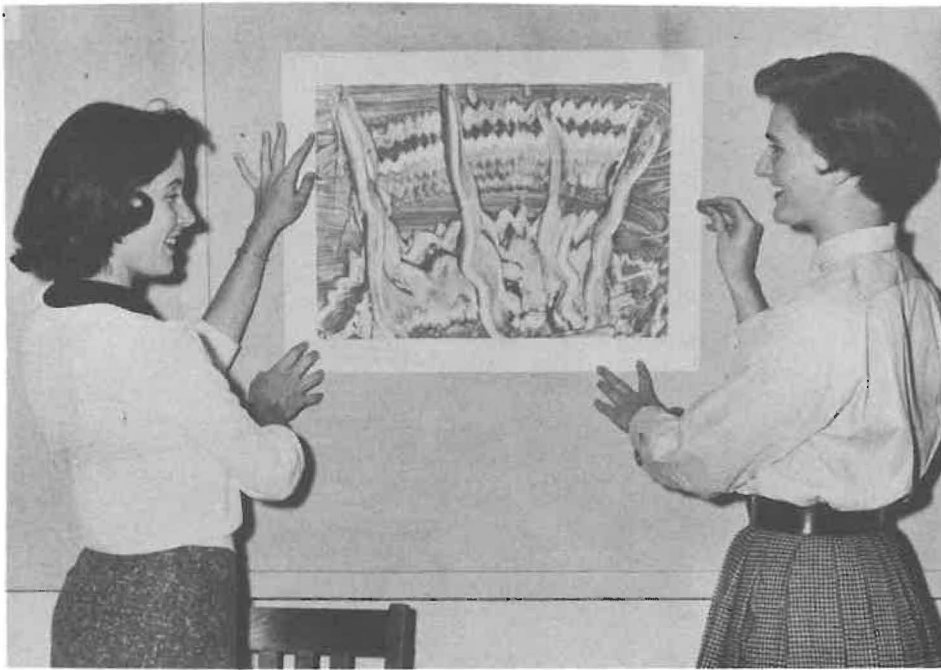


LES DANSEURS

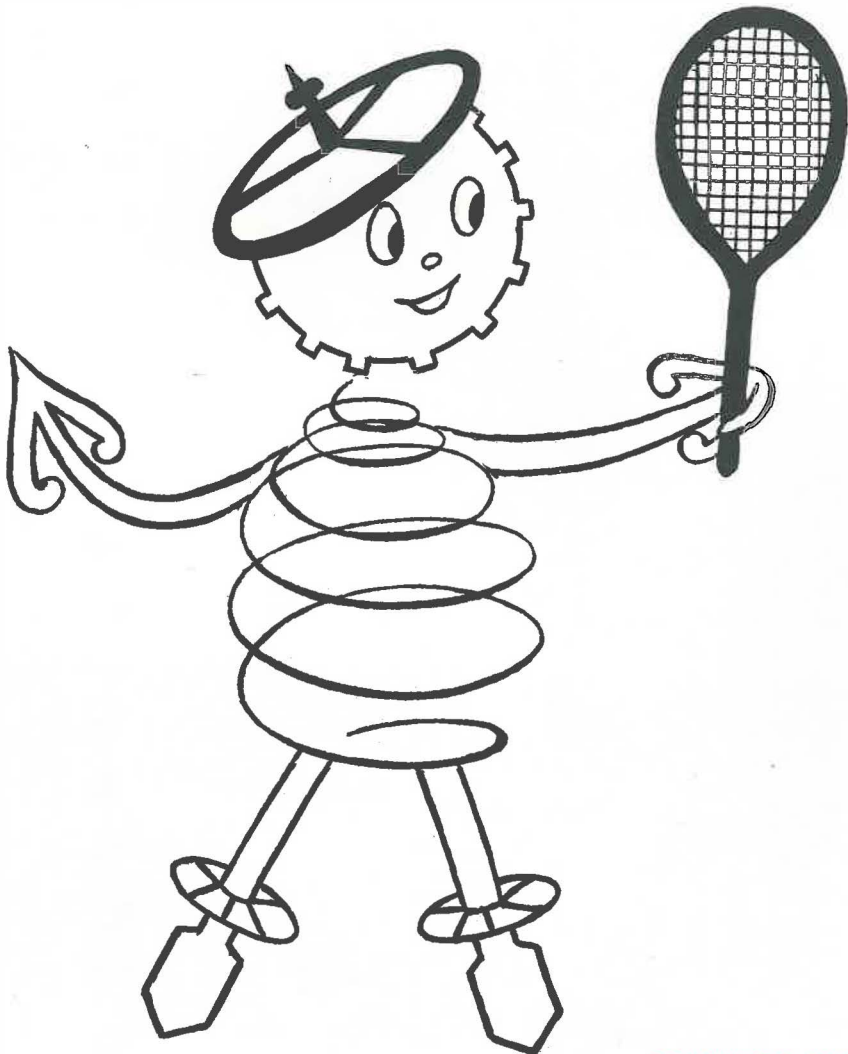

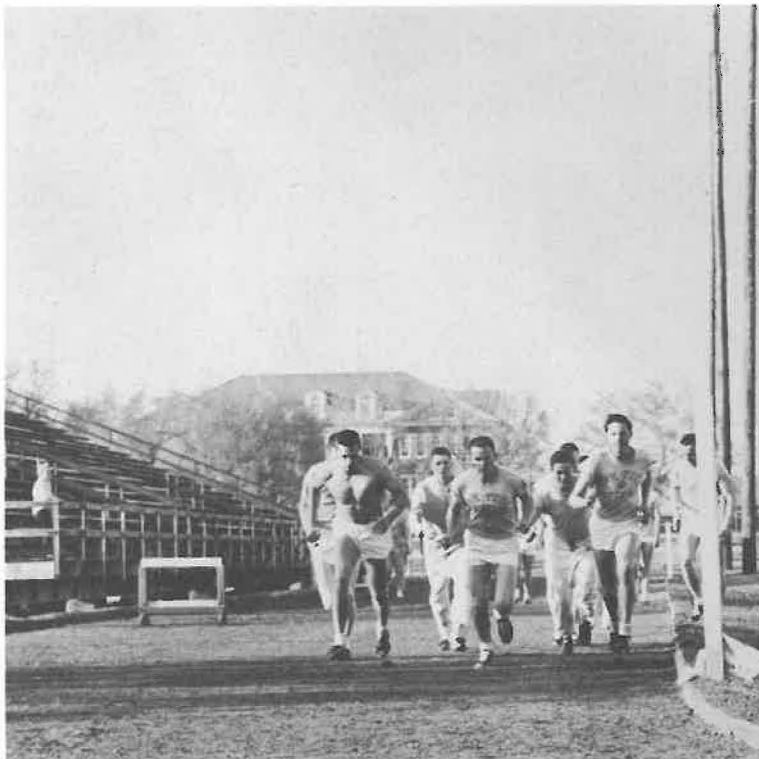


Track

Track is probably the oldest of the sports, possibly having its beginning when prehistoric man competed to see who could run the fastest, jump the highest, or throw a rock the farthest.

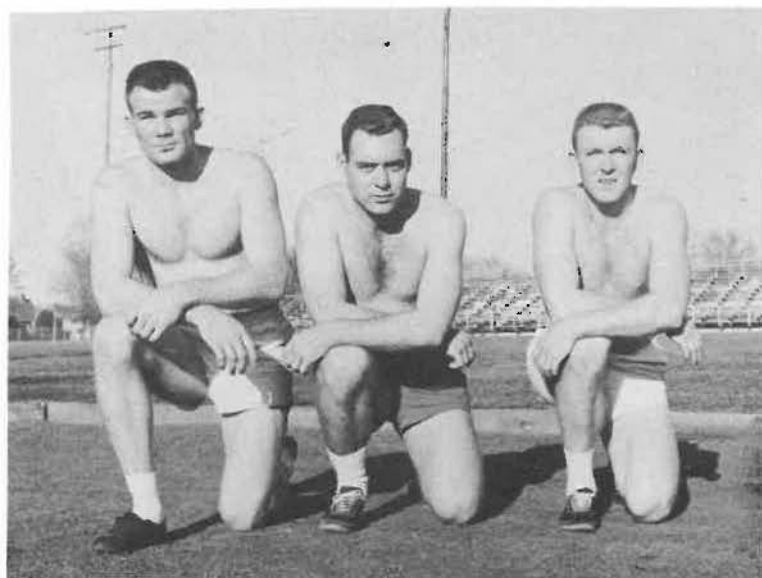
