## John Tucker

If you are a relative Johnny-Come-Lately, and are not closely connected with Arkansas Tech, then John Tucker may be just a name to you — a name dropped in awe by people who saw him as a football player, or who watched his teams from one to two decades later. If you are now or ever have been a student of chemistry at Arkansas Tech, the name John Tucker is synonymous with excellent instruction.

As a husky Russellville youth of seventeen, John Tucker came to Tech to continue his education, and to make athletic history. From the time Tucker made both touchdowns and both PAT's to lead the Russellville team to a 14-0 defeat of the Jonesboro Aggies, he was a rampage on Arkansas Gridirons. John Tucker was a member of the original Wonder Boy team which, in a five year span, won thirty-one games, lost only three, and tied only four.

In 1929, John Tucker entered the University of Alabama and was a member of the famed 1929 Crimson Tide which won the Rose Bowl on January 1, 1930. In 1931, he received his bachelor of science degree and returned to Arkansas Tech to become dean of men, head of the chemistry department, and assistant grid coach.

From this time on, John Tucker has been a loyal and prominent leader for all connected with Tech.

In his present position as Director of Athletics and Director of Student Affairs, John Tucker has proven to be a most capable leader of youth, and has been and still is, loved and respected by all who know him.

It is with deep gratitude and pride that we dedicate this 1965 "Agricola" to Mr. John E. Tucker, the Original Wonder Boy.

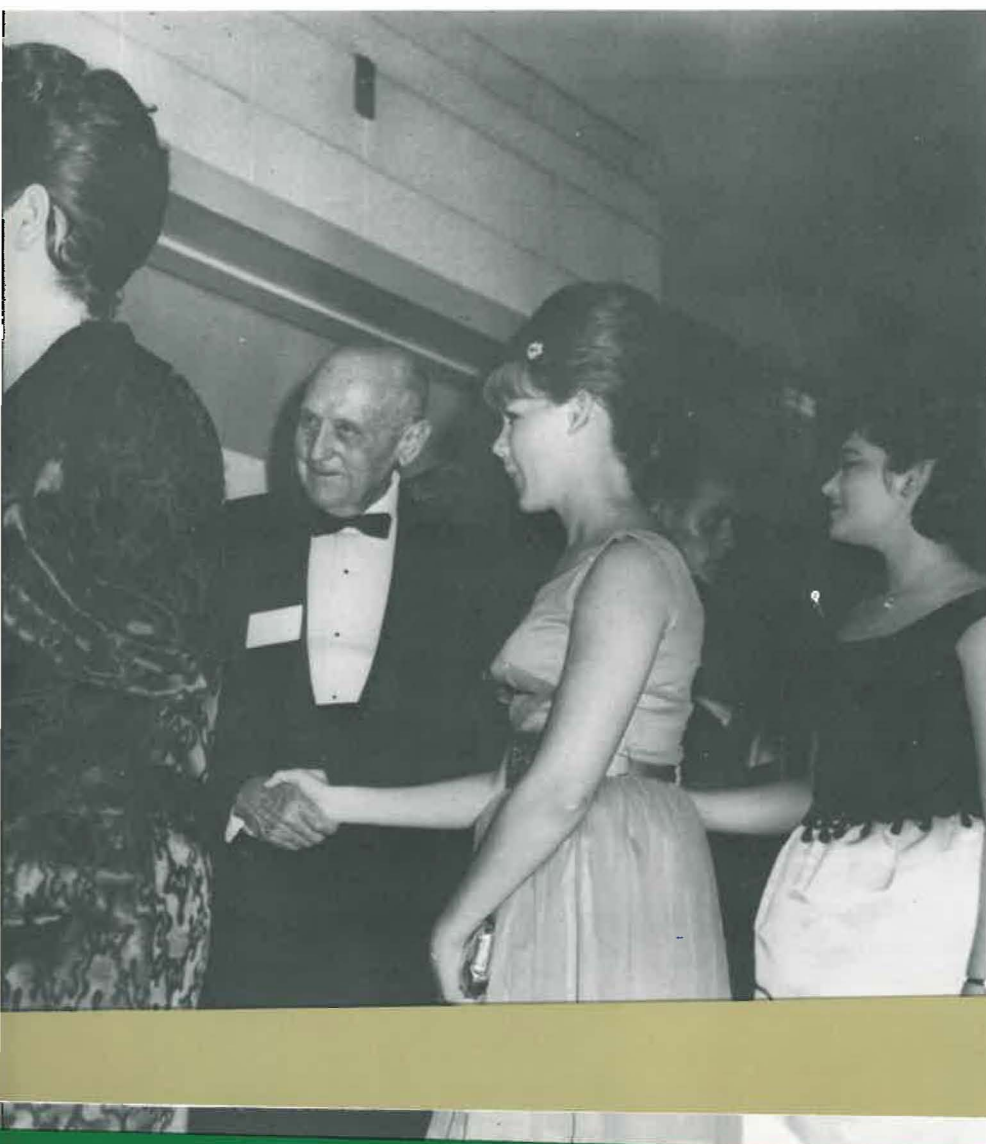

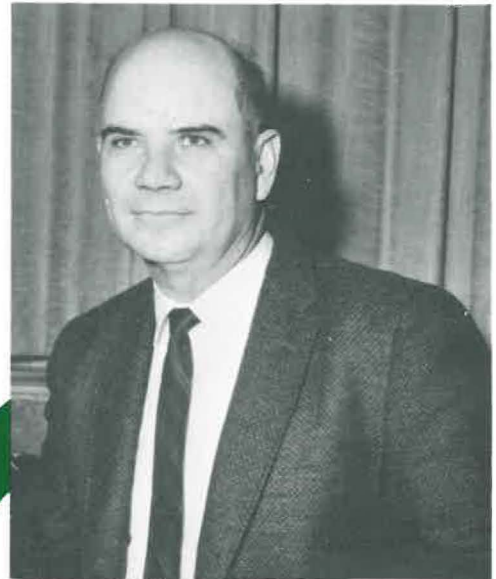

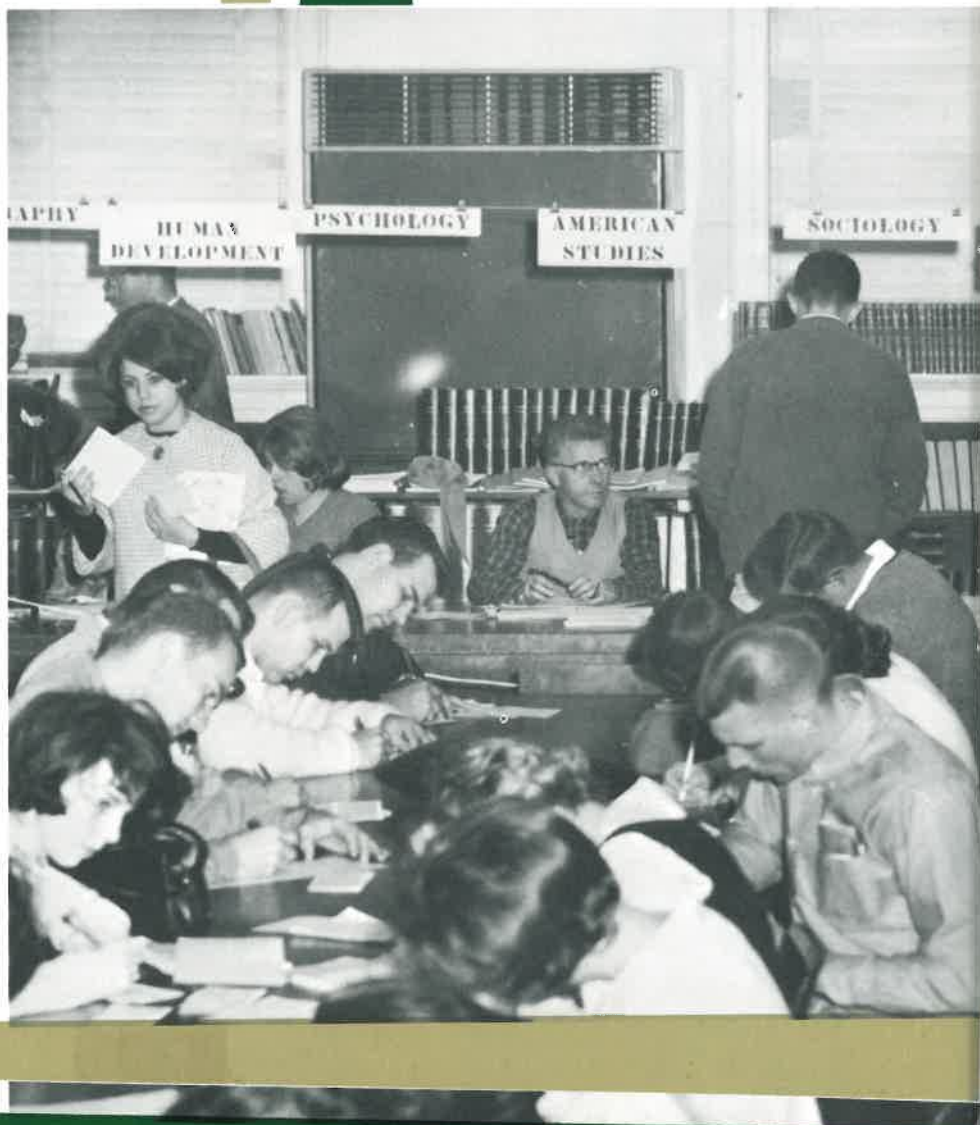

The Division of Business Administration, under the chairmanship of Roy Weedon, is composed of four major departments. These are general business, accounting, secretarial training and business education.

General business emphasizes such subjects as the techniques of ownership, management, marketing and selling activities.

Accounting majors select courses destined to furnish training in the technical and professional aspects of general accounting and eventually leading to preparation for CPA examination.

Secretarial, stenographic and clerical training is provided in a two year program of study. Often students in this area seek other courses in the division and thus graduate with a degree in general business.

In addition to providing practical training in clerical and secretarial practice, the business education curriculum also enables those who choose this course of study to obtain a Bachelor of Science degree.

A major purpose of this division, which is the largest at Tech, is to provide students with a well-rounded general education designed to enrich their lives.

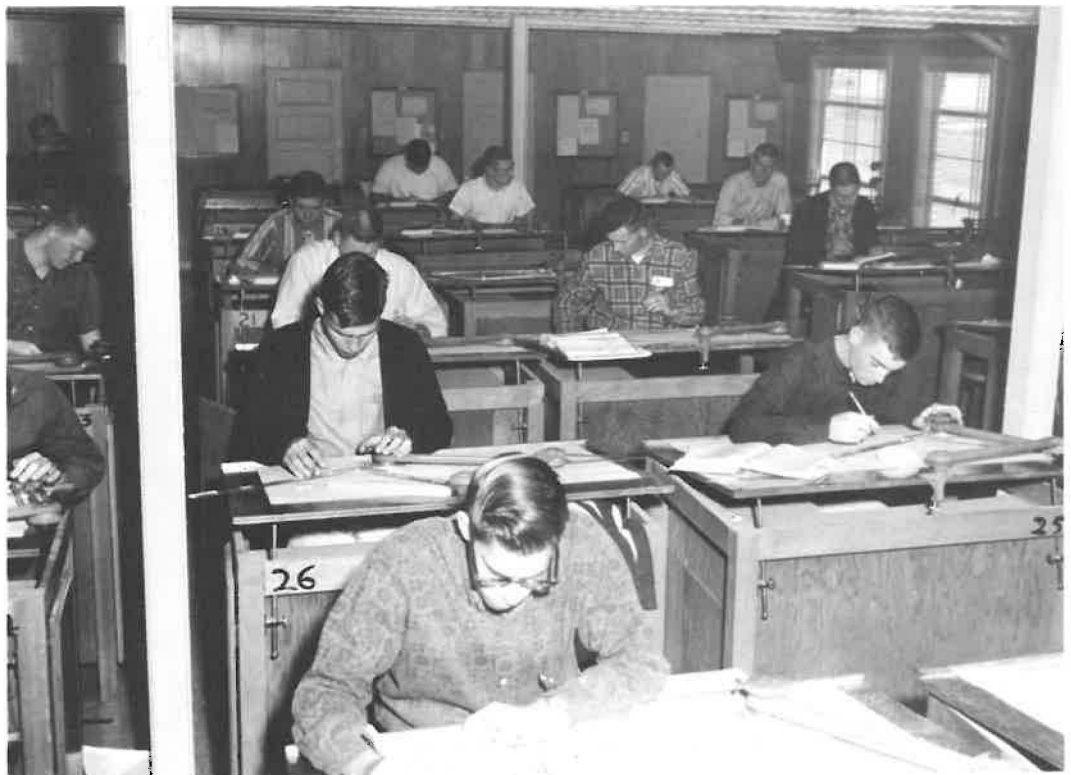

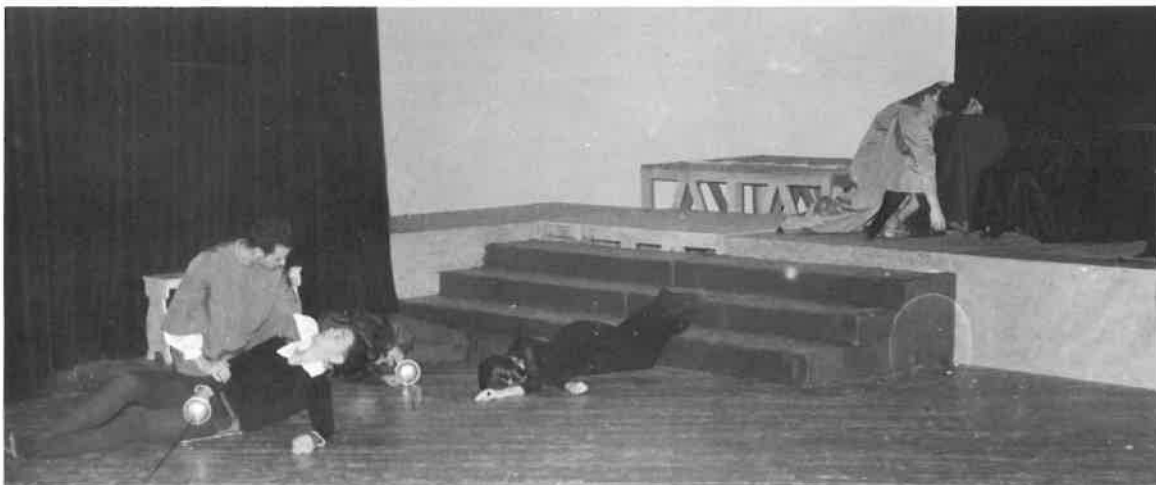

# ROTC Provides Military Training

Established in 1952 and maintained by the federal government, Tech's Reserve Officer Training Corps was created for the purpose of producing future officers possessing the qualities necessary for continued progress in the Reserve Officers' Corps and the Regular Army.

Goals of the program are developing an appreciation of the national military organization of the United States and producing within the student those traits of leadership so necessary for success in any field of endeavor.

All freshmen and sophomore men who are eligible for the draft are required to take Military Science. To receive a commission in the Army, it is necessary to take the advanced course, consisting of a four-year course in Military Science plus a summer military camp between the third and fourth years.

The Division of Science is composed of the departments of biology, chemistry, geology, and physics. The objectives of the division are to acquaint the student thoroughly with fundamental principles and theories which should enable him to understand the application of these principles to physical phenomena and life processes. Through emphasis on experimental procedures and the application of the scientific method of approach, the student has the opportunity of broadening his concepts and extending his competence in his chosen field. The inter-relationships of the fields of science other than the chosen major field are stressed.

The planned program is such as to provide adequate scientific training for students who may elect the study of medicine, pharmacy, dentistry, nursing and medical technology.

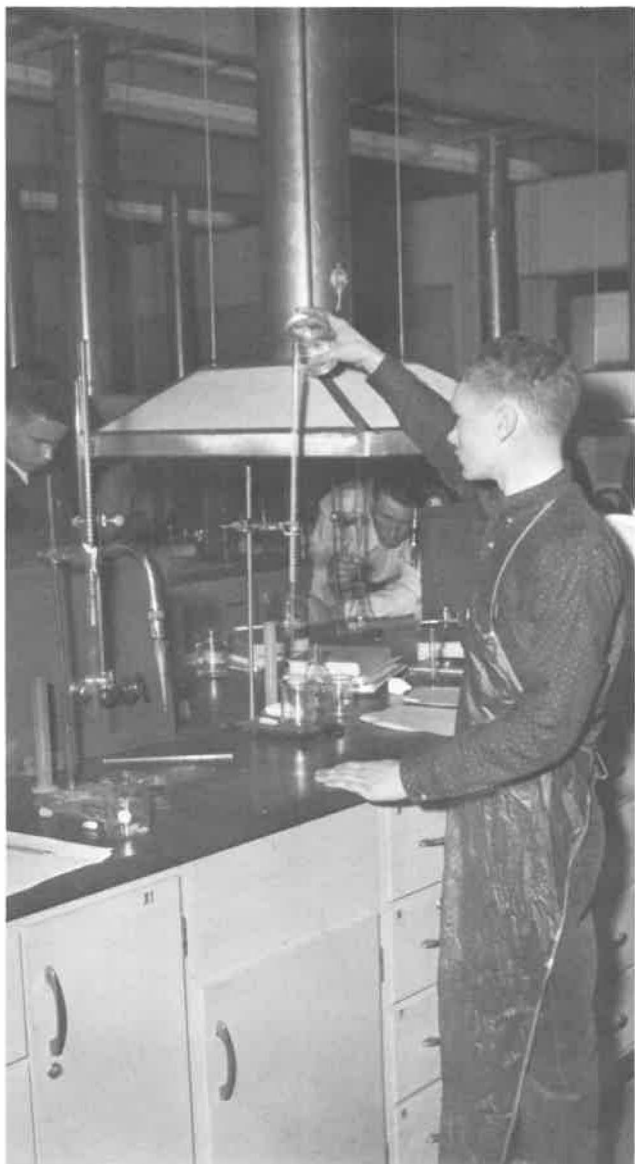

The Delta Xi Chapter of Kappa Pi International Honorary Art Fraternity was chartered on January 8, 1964 at Arkansas Tech.

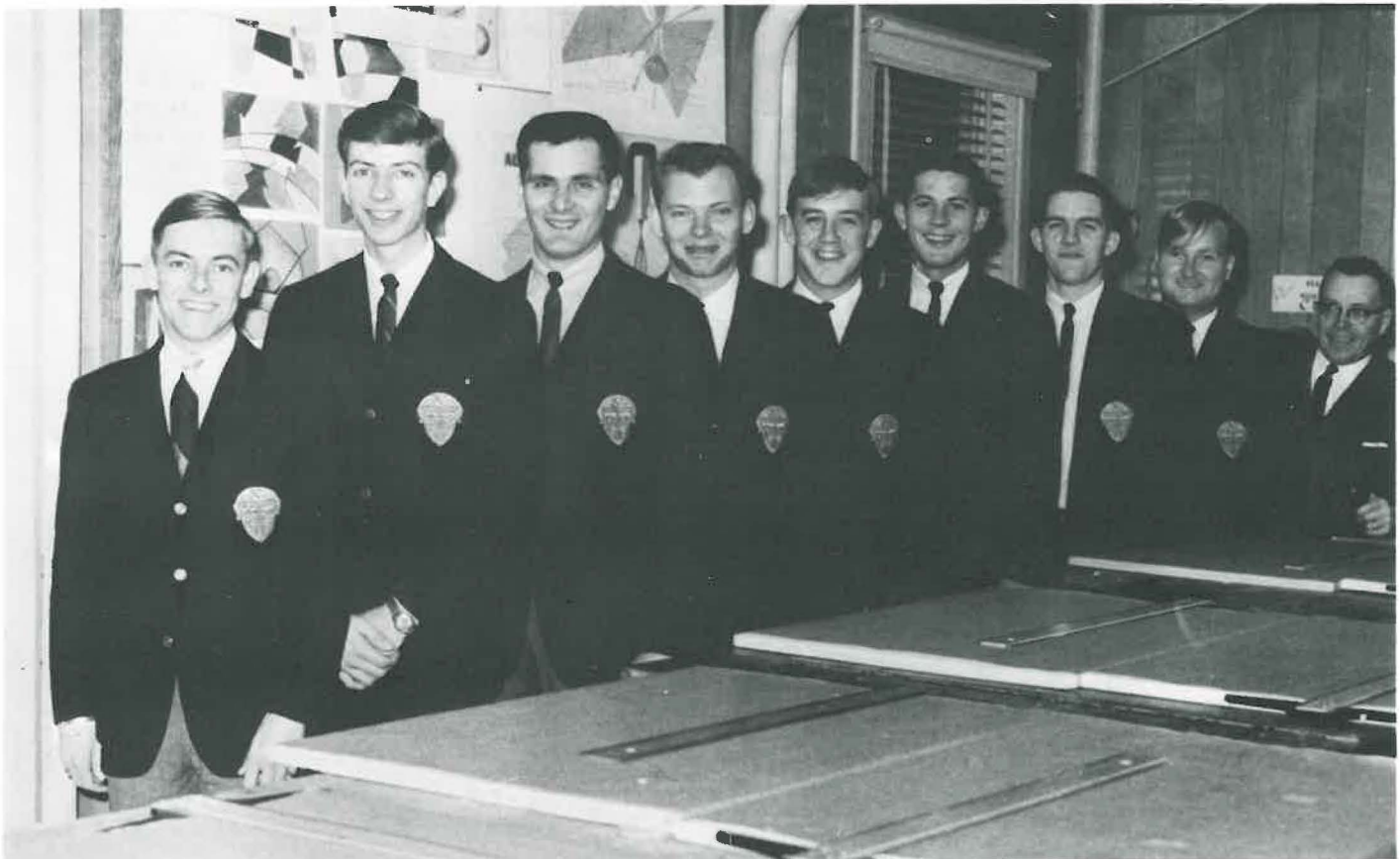

The first semester the Delta Xi Chapter won second place in the category of clubs and organizations in the homecoming display.

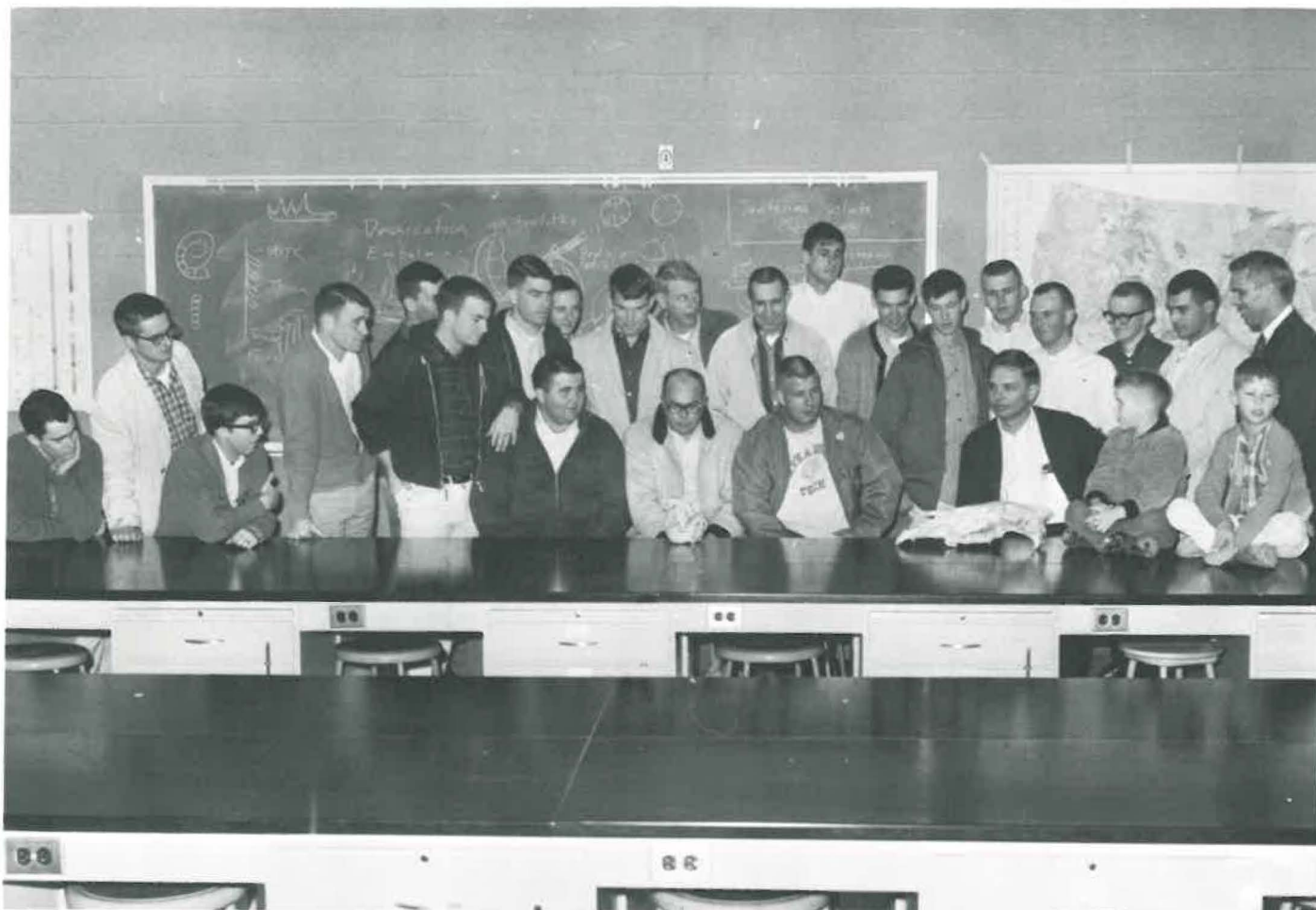

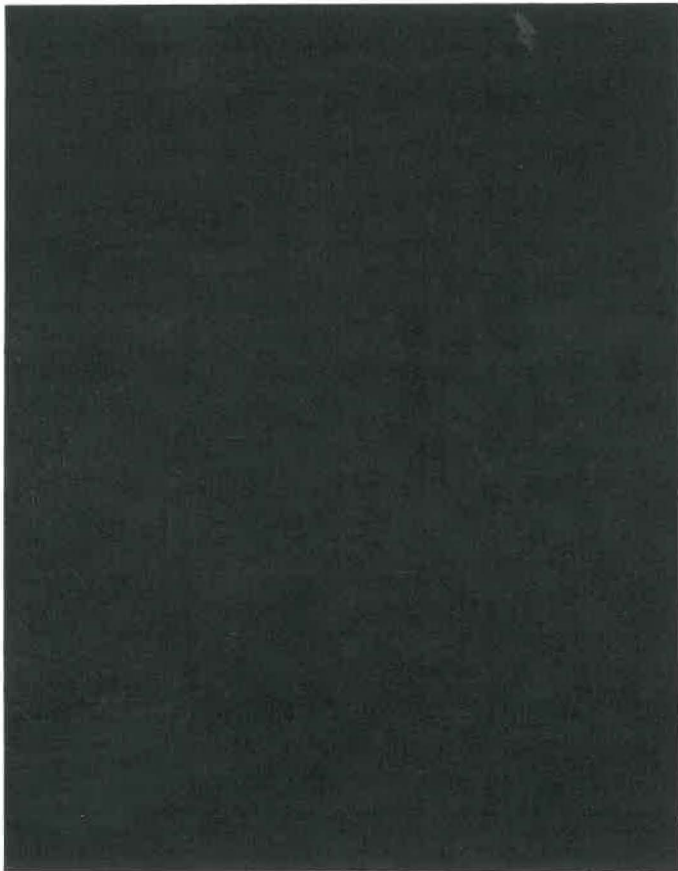

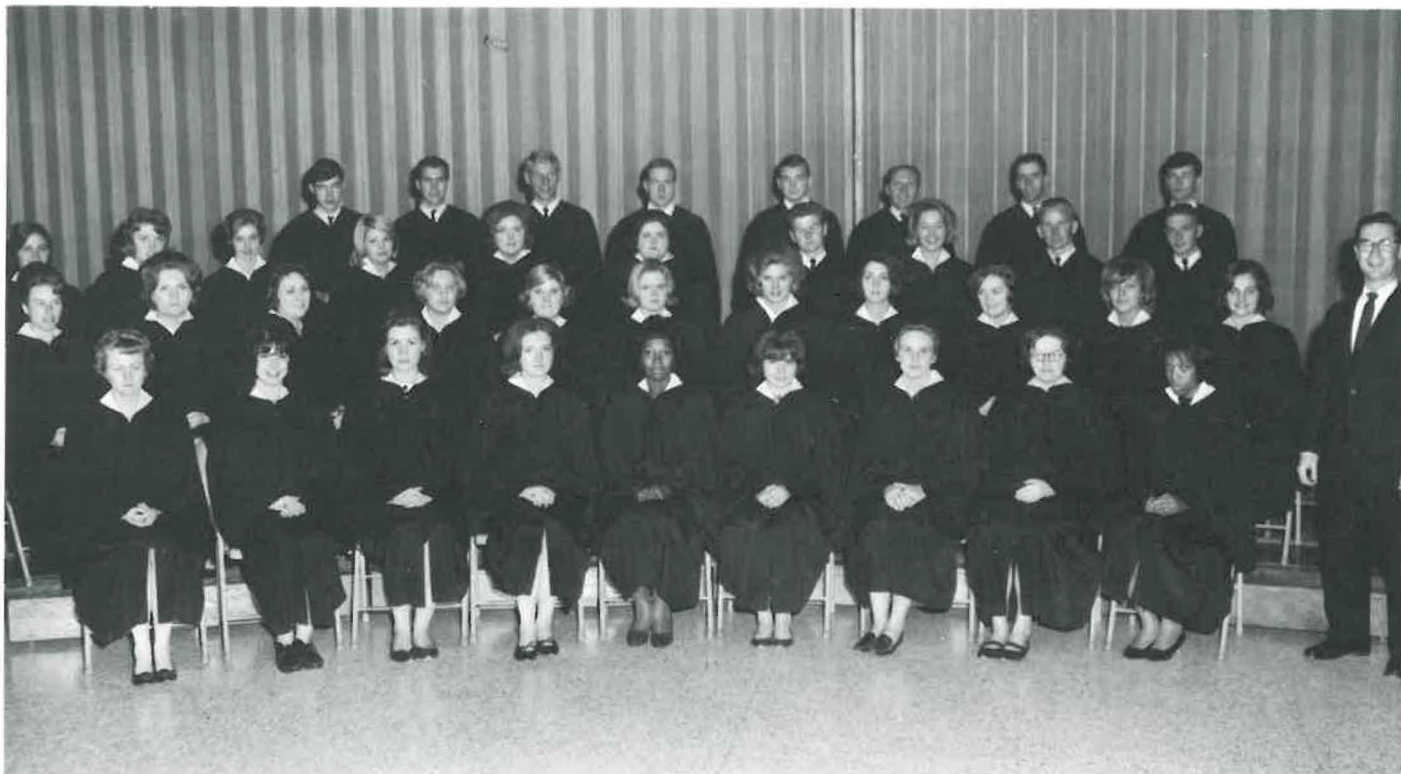

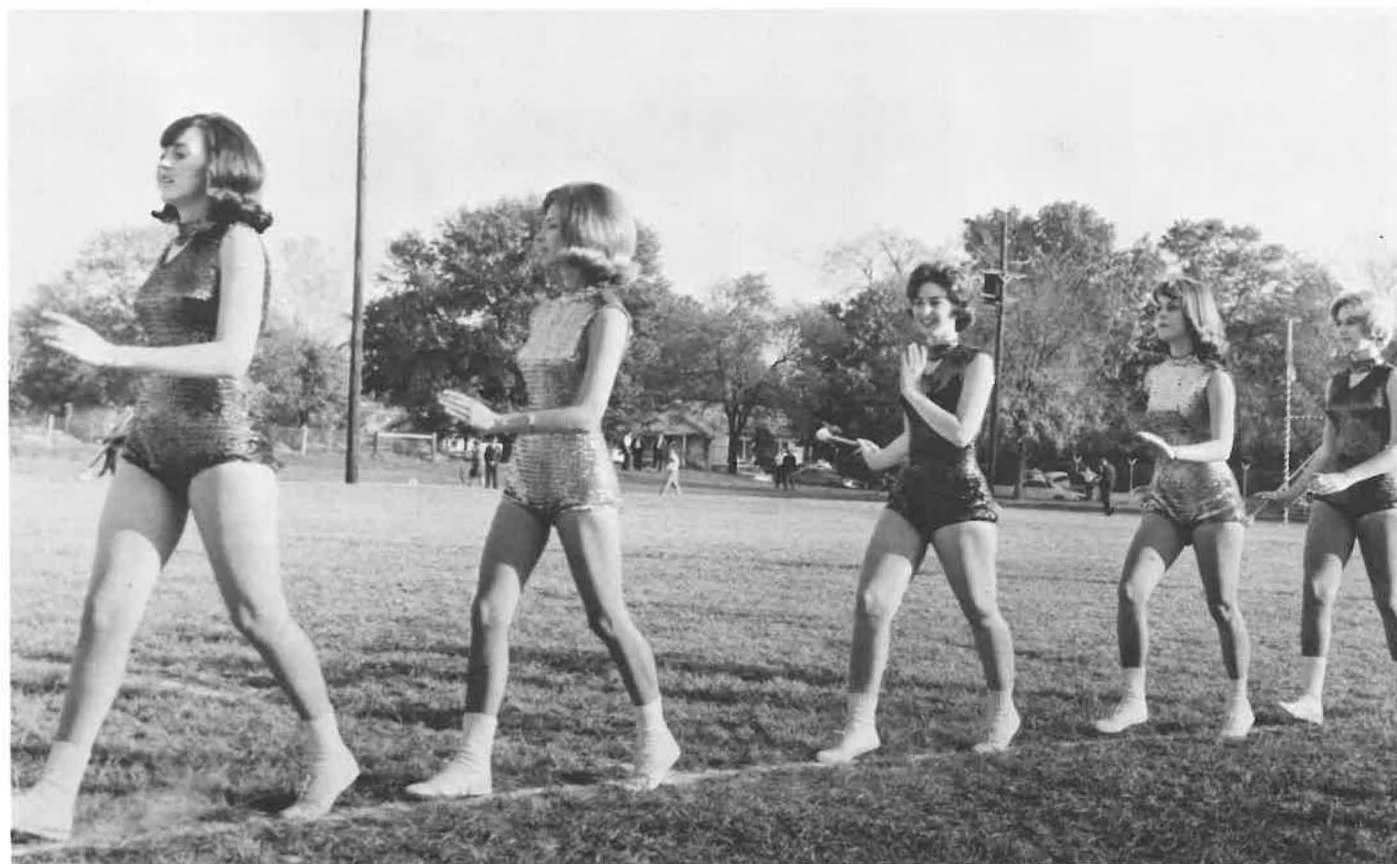

Tech, this year rated as the dark horse of the conference, started off slow but after they got started they showed everyone that they were the best. Led by defensive stalwarts such as Danny Gilbert, Tommy Holt, Phil Phillips and others, Tech held opponents to 22 points while they scored 122 in conference play. Outstanding on offense were Robert Marley, who led the league in rushing, tackle Danny Gilbert, quarter-back Barry Kincannon and many others.

Tech got off to a bad start against Northeast Oklahoma, losing 20-10. The only bright spot of the game was Kincannon's 36 yard scoring pass to half-back Higgins. After the opening loss Tech came rebounding back and stomped A & M, last years conference champs, 22-0. Tech's defense showed signs of great things to come against the Boll Weevils. After the fine game against A & M, Tech came back and played another superb game and shut out the Southern State Muleriders by a score of 13-0.

It is Dad's Day at Tech and the winless but always tough College of the Ozarks Mountaineers invade Buerkle Field before a packed crowd. From the very beginning everyone sensed it would be a very close game and that is exactly what it turned out to be. Tech didn't score until eight minutes to go in the half, but Ozarks turned right around and after Talley kicked to the Tech 37, Ozarks marched in for the score with only 4 seconds showing on the clock. The game remained deadlocked at 7-6 until the fourth quarter when Tech seemed to come alive and scored two quick touchdowns within 2 minutes. This win set up the game of the year in the AIC, Tech versus Teachers. Teachers got the game going by marching 60 yards in 13 plays to take a 7-0 lead and this stood up through the first half. As the half ended Tech coaches were seeming to have a little trouble with the refs but I think they got everything settled. With the opening of the second half Tech got back in the ballgame with a 85 yard kick-off return by Jerry Lawrence. From then on Tech dominated the game and scored their final touchdown midway in the third quarter when Tommy Holt recovered a fumble and Tech scored in three plays.

Tech next journeyed to Texas where they beat Tarleton State College 16-7. Tech used a never-say-die defense and a steamrolling ground game to whitewash Henderson Reddies before a sell out Homecoming crowd. Tech took the opening kickoff and promptly marched 69 yards to get on the scoreboard. Early in the second half Tech again marched in for the score, this time it took only 5 plays. Tech next journeyed to Ouachita taking a 6-1 record with them. Ouachita scored first on a field and took a 3-0 lead in at halftime but Lawrence again broke the game wide open with a 88 yard kickoff return to open the second half. From then on out it was Tech all the way.

Tech went to Harding with a chance to wrap up the AIC if they could just get by Harding. There may have been doubts before the game but by the time Tech got started there were no doubts left in anybody's mind as Tech walloped the Bisons 27 to 6.

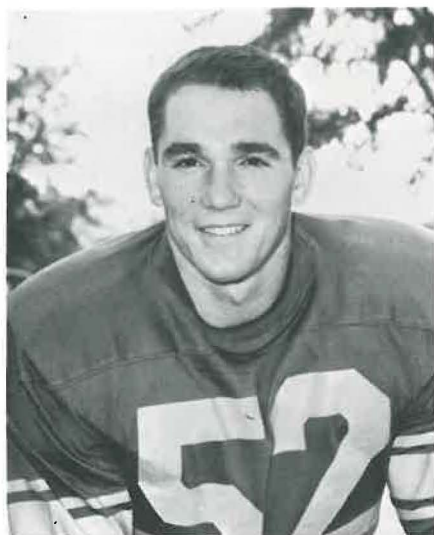

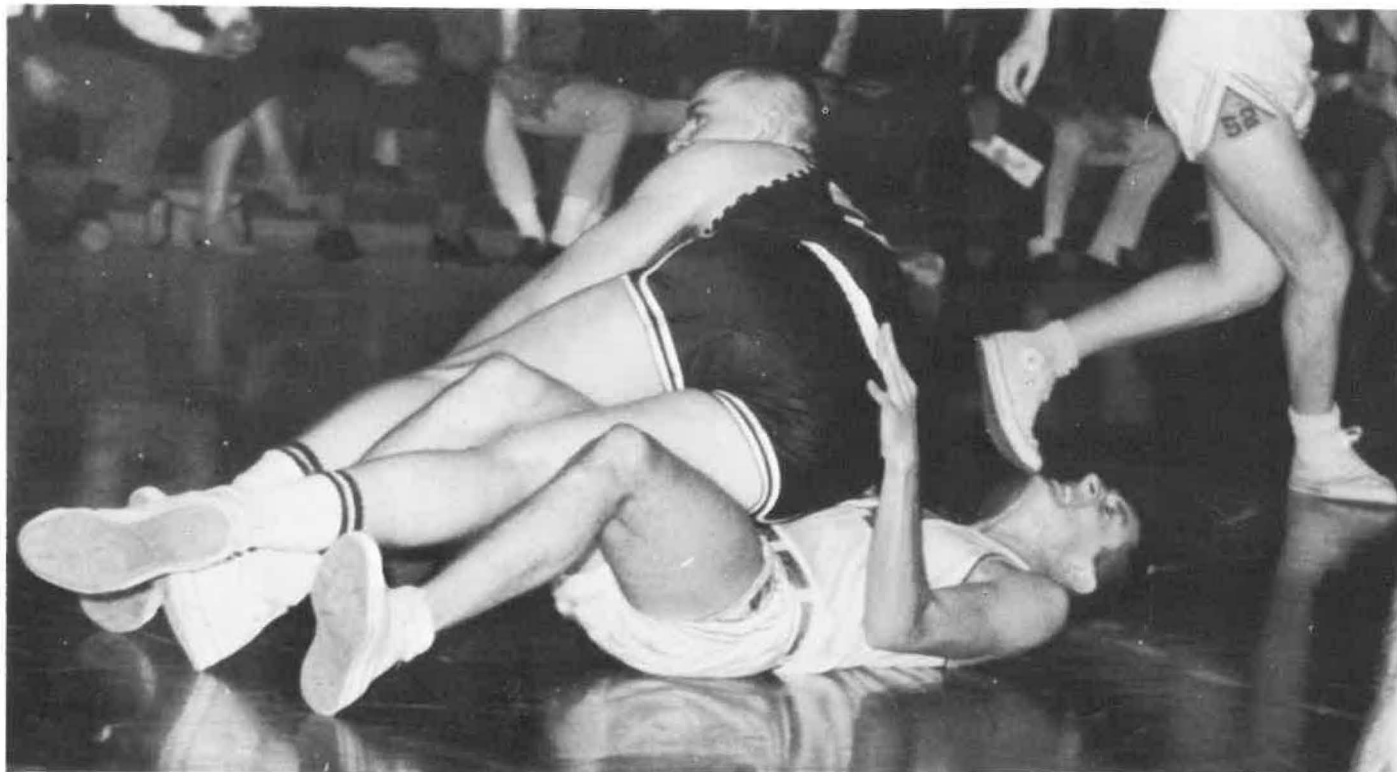

Coach Don Dempsey's baseball team had an overall record of 14 wins and 7 losses and an AIC record of 8 wins and 4 losses. This was good enough to share the AIC crown with Arkansas A & M.

This year Tech is figured to finish about third in the AIC. One of the reasons for this is due to graduation and the great number of inexperienced players that we have this year.

Arkansas Tech returns only seven lettermen, who are Barry Kincannon, David Robinson, Jim Simpson, Tommy Holt, James Talley, Mike McGaugh, and Ronnie Higgins. They lost one of their best pitchers, James "Red" Cole, to the St. Louis Cardinals. Tommy Holt is a three-year letterman; Jim Simpson is a three-year letterman; and James Talley, a two-year letterman. These will be some of the men that Coach Dempsey will count on to bring Arkansas Tech through.

Dempsey has scheduled twelve days of play with several double headers plus a couple of practice games. Practice for baseball started about March the first, and they continue playing almost to the end of the year. Rainy and snowy weather haven't helped to get the season off to a good start.

Tech played its first practice game against Harding March 13 and then played Teachers the following Saturday.

Coach Don Sevier's track squad finished fourth in the AIC track and field meet in 1964, and seven of those participants are back to help this year's squad. In the meet Arkansas State Teachers finished first; Arkansas A & M, second; Harding, third; and then Tech fourth.

This year, with the seven lettermen back, Tech's squad will have some experience but will lack considerably in depth. Tech's strength this year will be in the relays, shot, discus, and distance events.

Jim Simpson holds the school shot record with a distance of 46-6, and Larry Taylor, the mile run with a 4:26.6.

Among last year's record holders in the mile relay — Barney Phillips, Louis Besancon, Jim Rush, and Jerry Dickinson — Phillips was declared academically ineligible, but he will be back next year to help the team.

Arkansas Tech will have only four home meets this year with the season ending with the AIC meet during the first part of May. Tech started working out for track on March the 1st and mostly indoors because of the inclement weather. Tech is picked to finish about fourth again this year, but we hope they finish first.

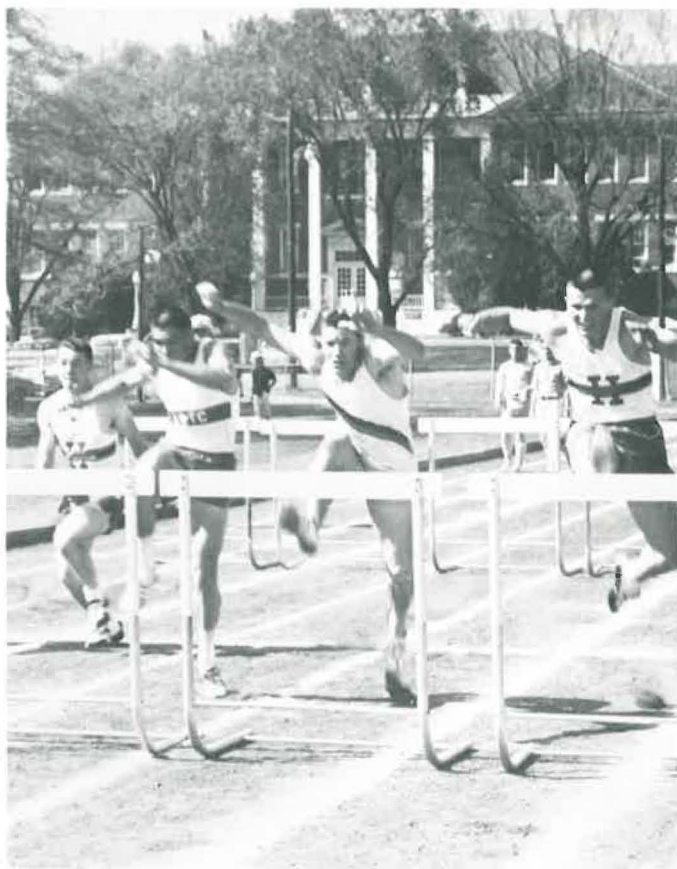

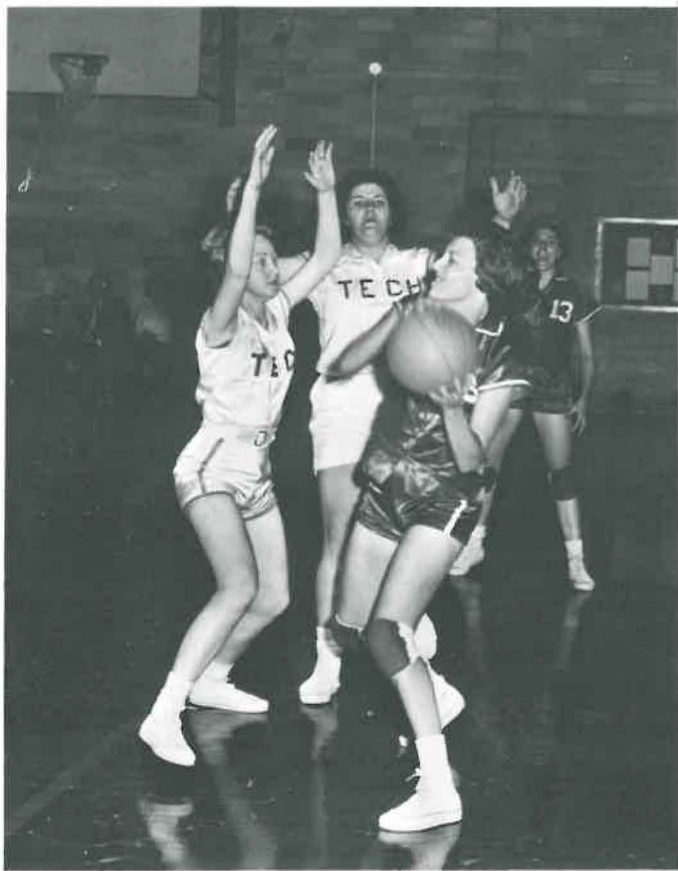
## Tech's Wonder Girls

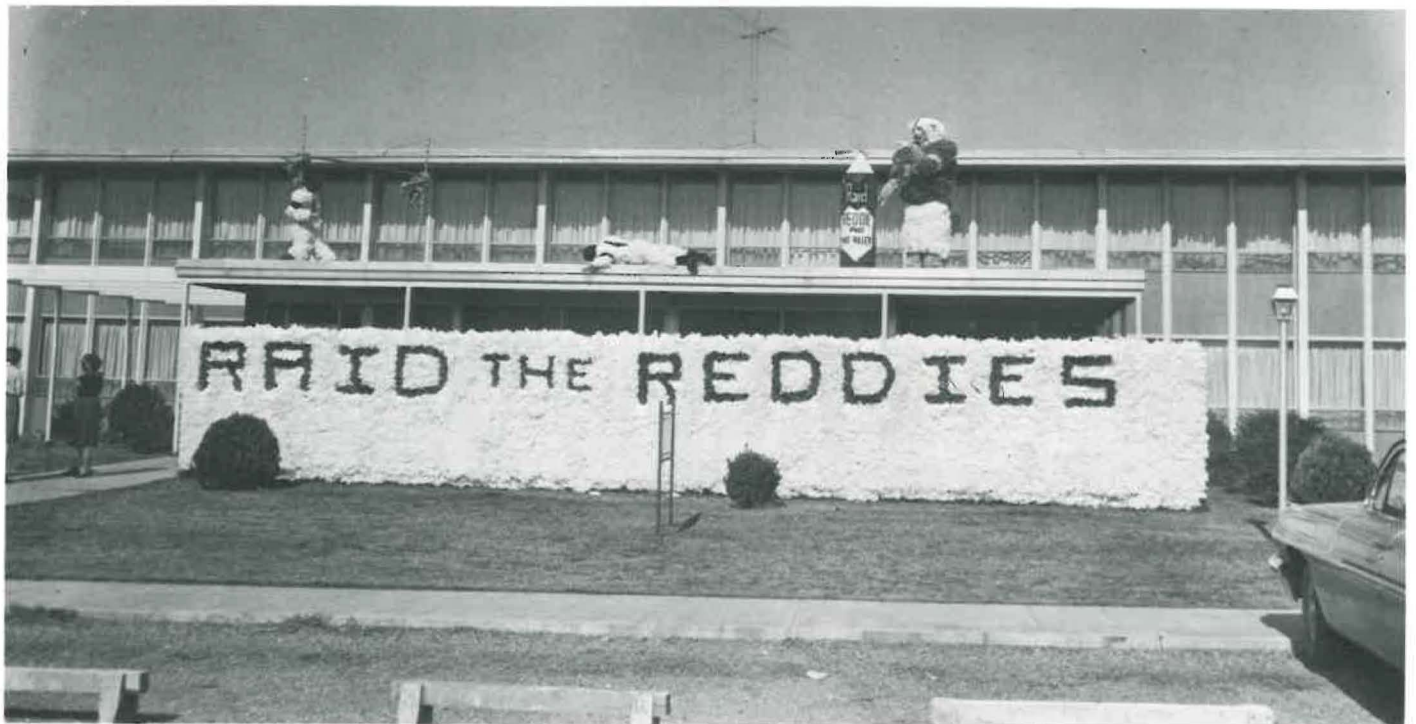

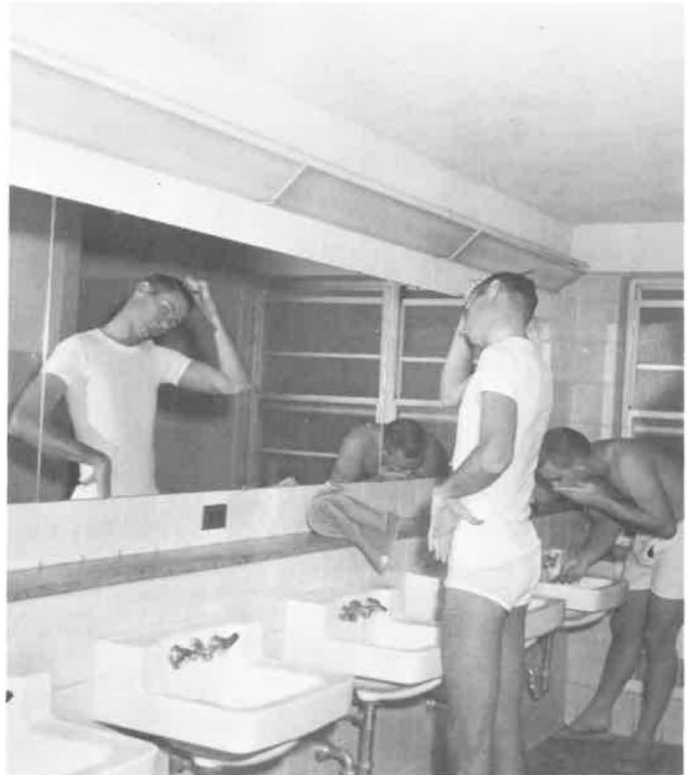

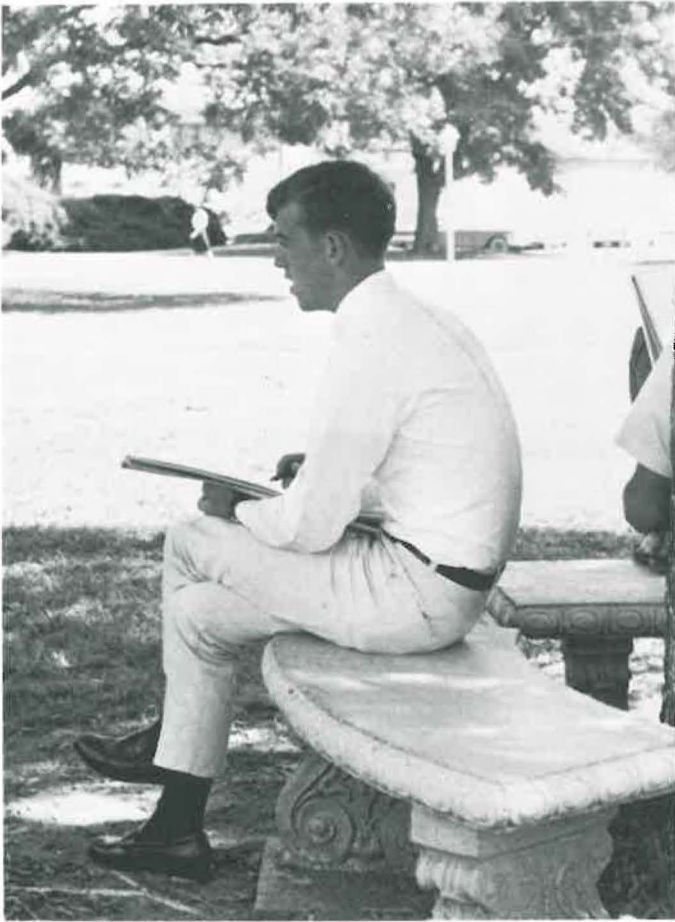
