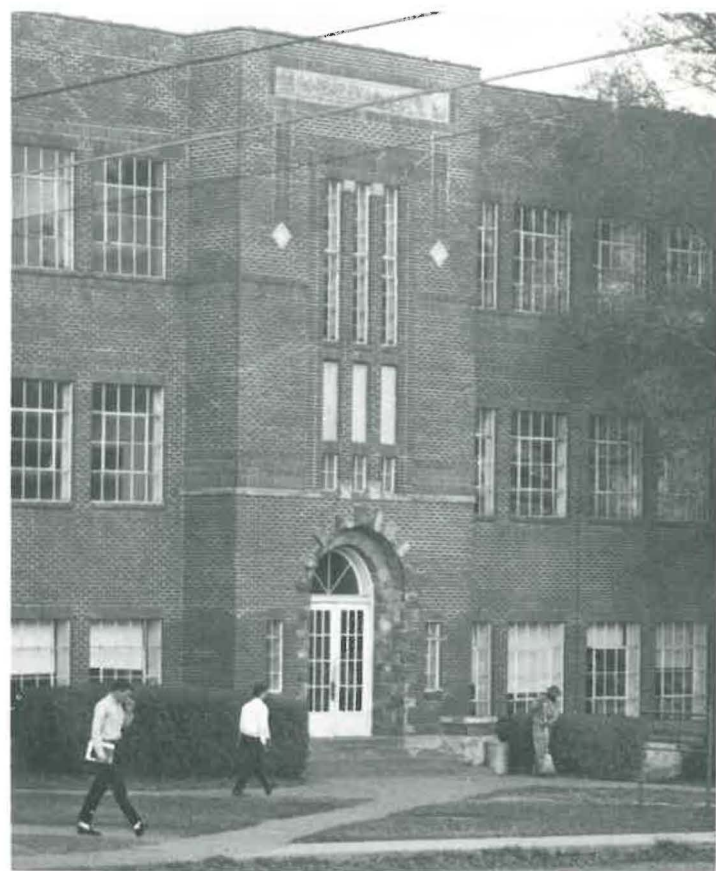

They are secondary education, elementary education, physical education, and the newly formed department of recreation and parks administration.

Patricia Gordon, who holds a masters degree from the University of Oklahoma, and Eva Harrell, who has her BSE degree from Ouachita Baptist University, are new additions in the department of physical education. Gus C. Zaso, who received his doctorate from the University of Indiana in January, is the assistant professor in the new recreation department.

The high point in all the four-year programs is the nine week period of practice teaching. During this period, students gain practical knowledge of teaching and of the problems encountered in the classroom, by assisting teachers in public schools throughout the state with their duties.

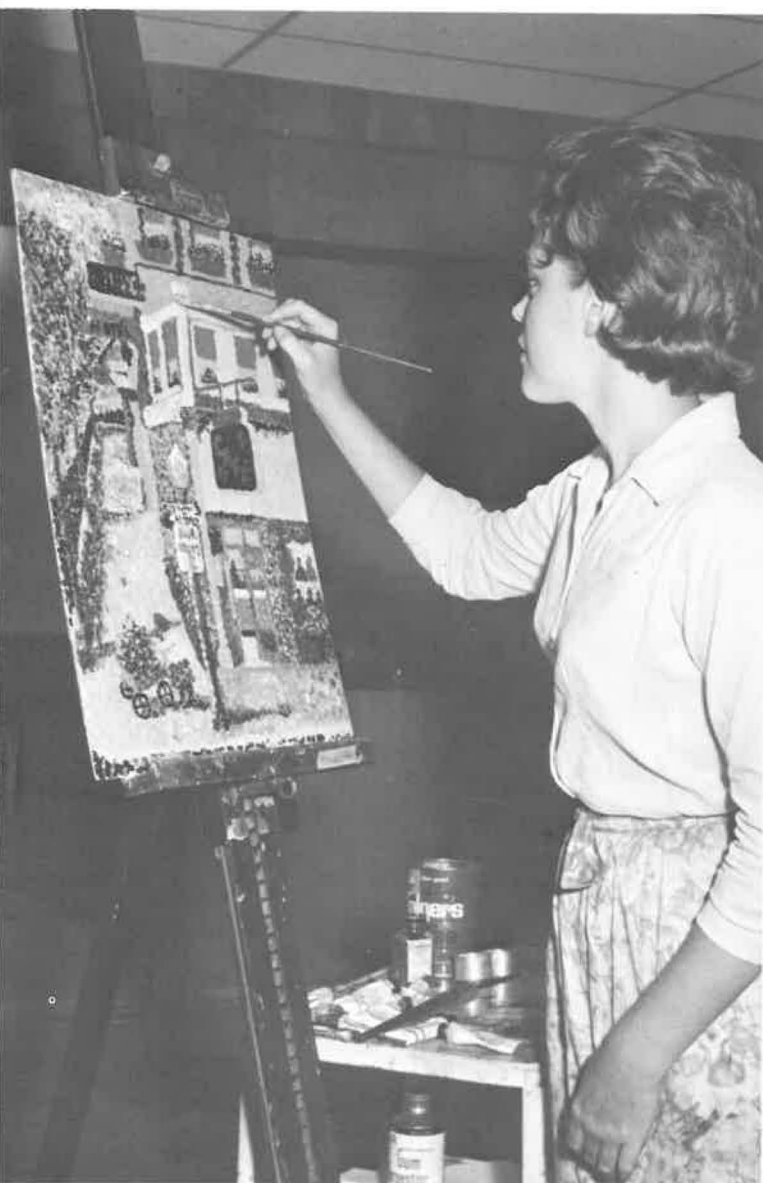

All freshman and sophomore men eligible for military service are required to participate in this program. Additional courses are provided for junior and senior men which lead to a commission of Second Lieutenant upon graduation.

Lt. Colonel Harold Broudy has been assigned as head of the department by the Department of the Army. He has just completed a tour of duty as an advisor to the Italian Army. He is a former professor of military science at Bowling Green University.

Captain Sammy T. Cox is also new to the Tech campus. He is an assistant professor and will teach junior level courses.

To provide social atmosphere and common interest association, the ROTC department sponsors the Military Honor Society and a chapter of the Scabbard and Blade. Other activities include the precision marching Drill Team and the Rifle Team. The major social function is the Military Ball.

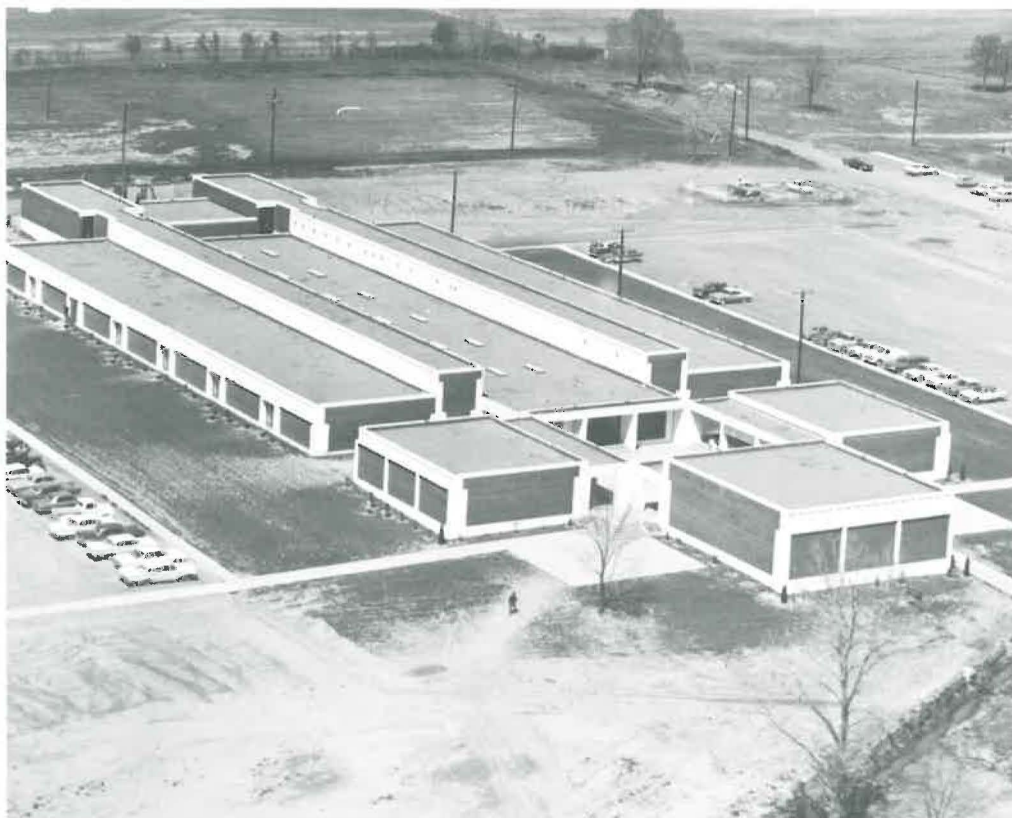

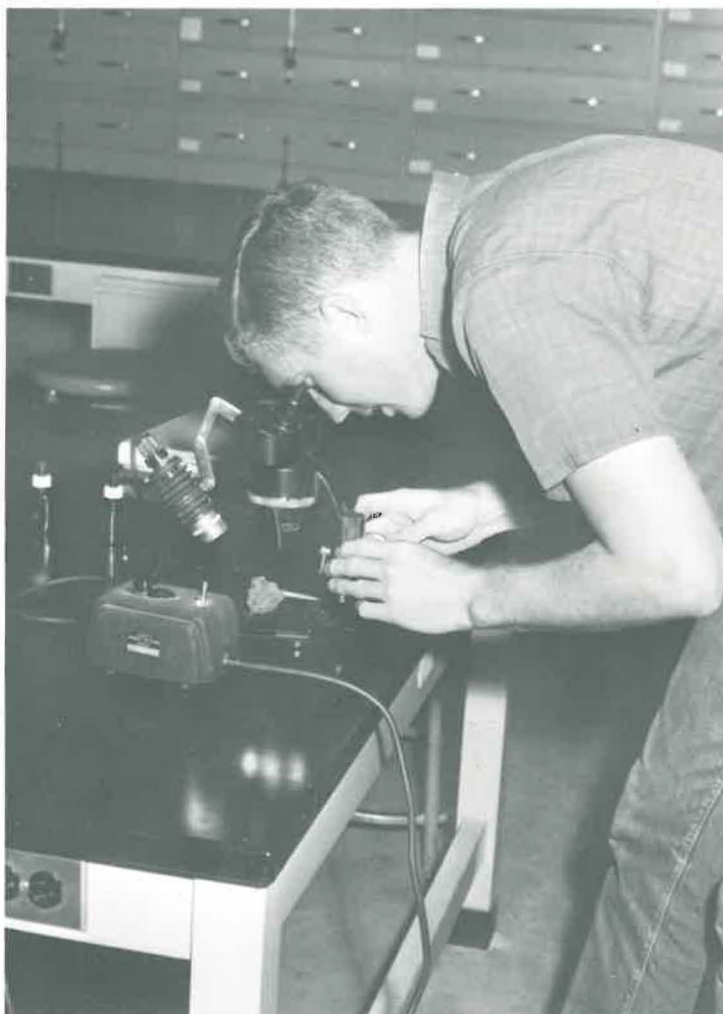

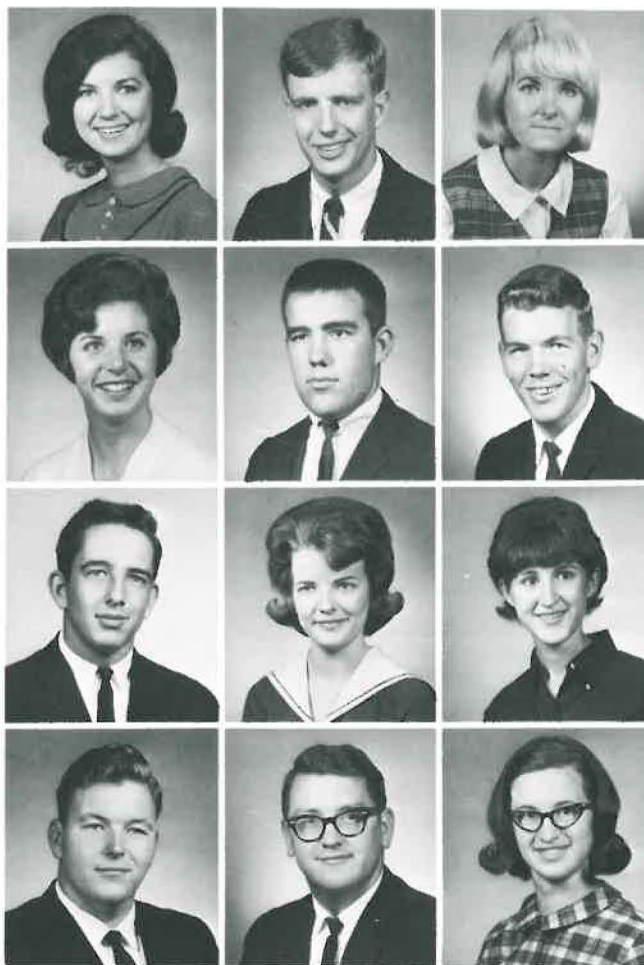

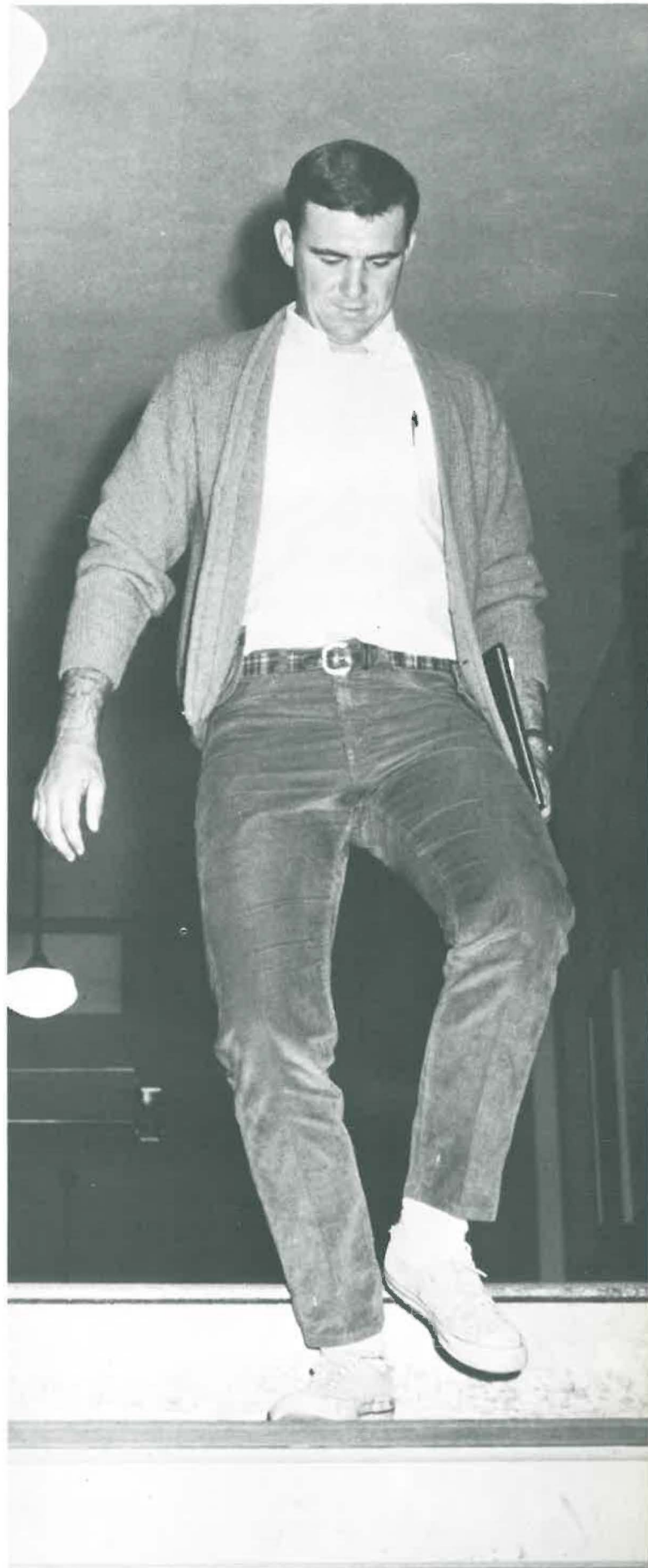

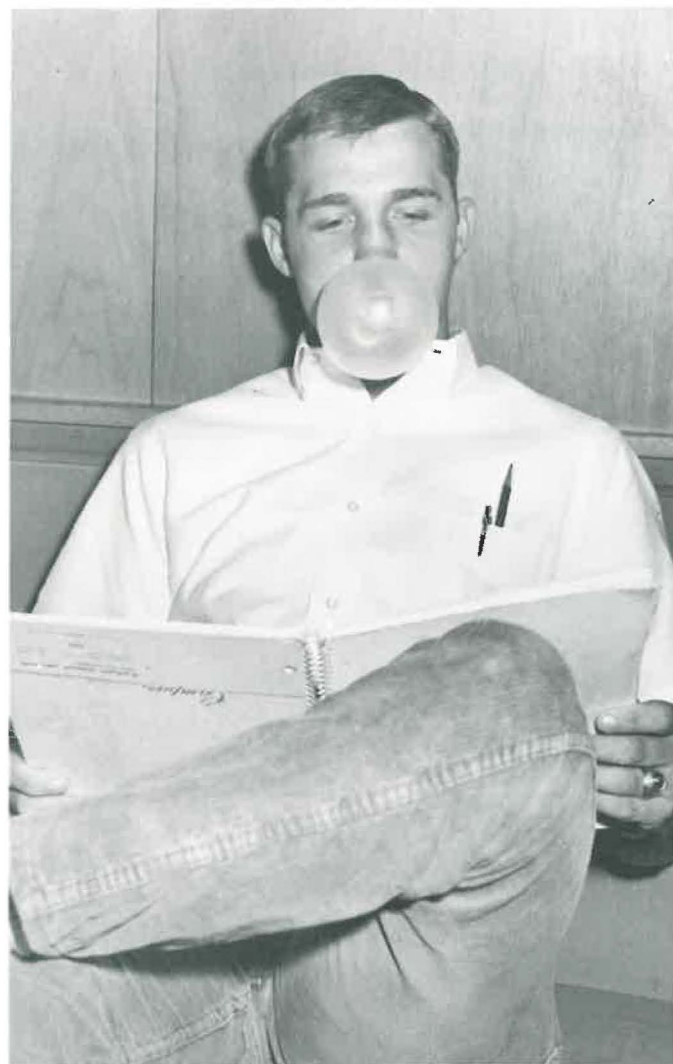

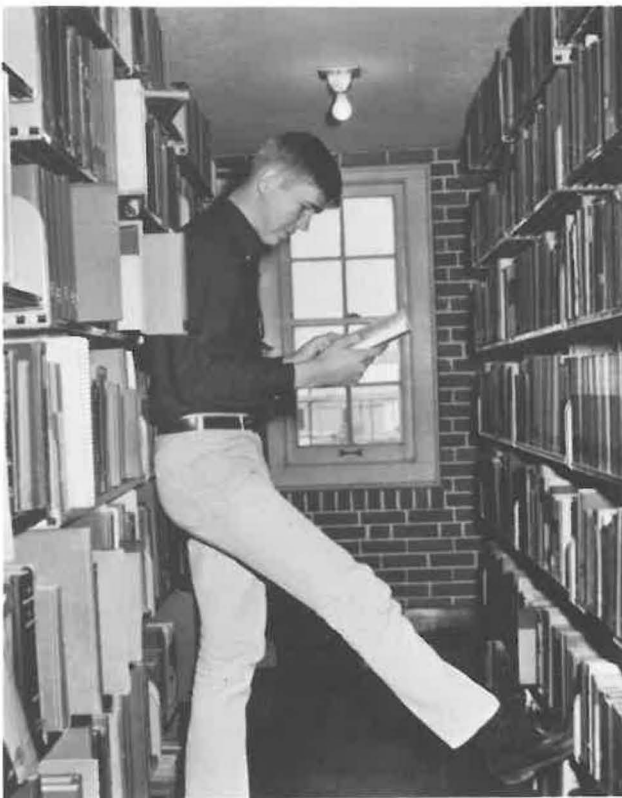

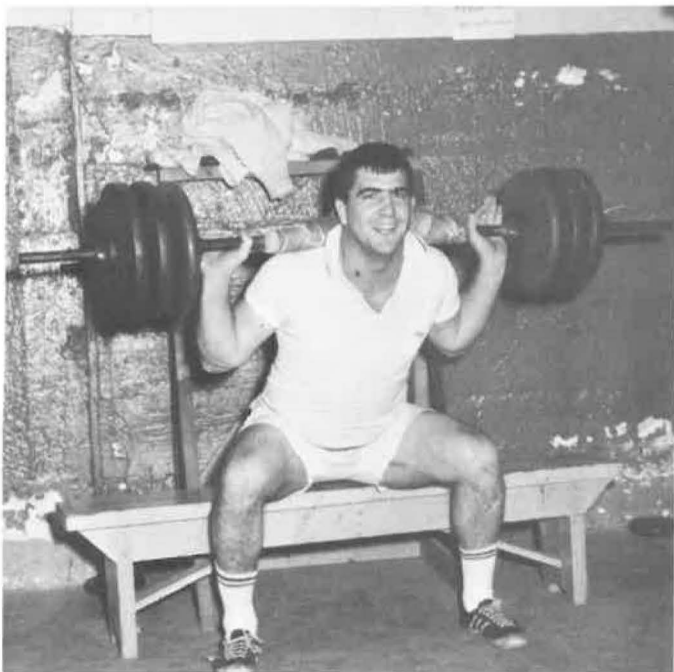

# Tech drops opener to Redmen 21-7



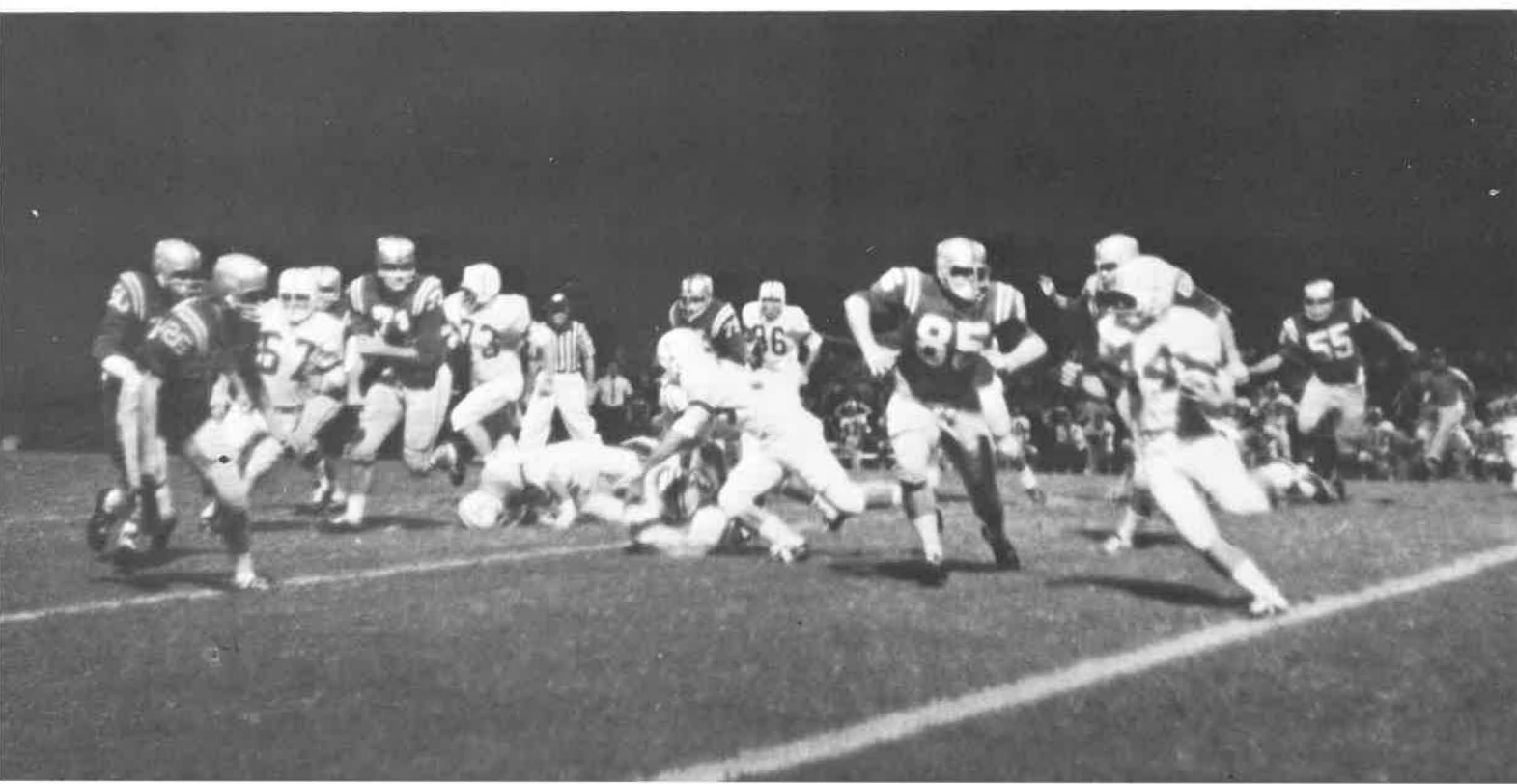

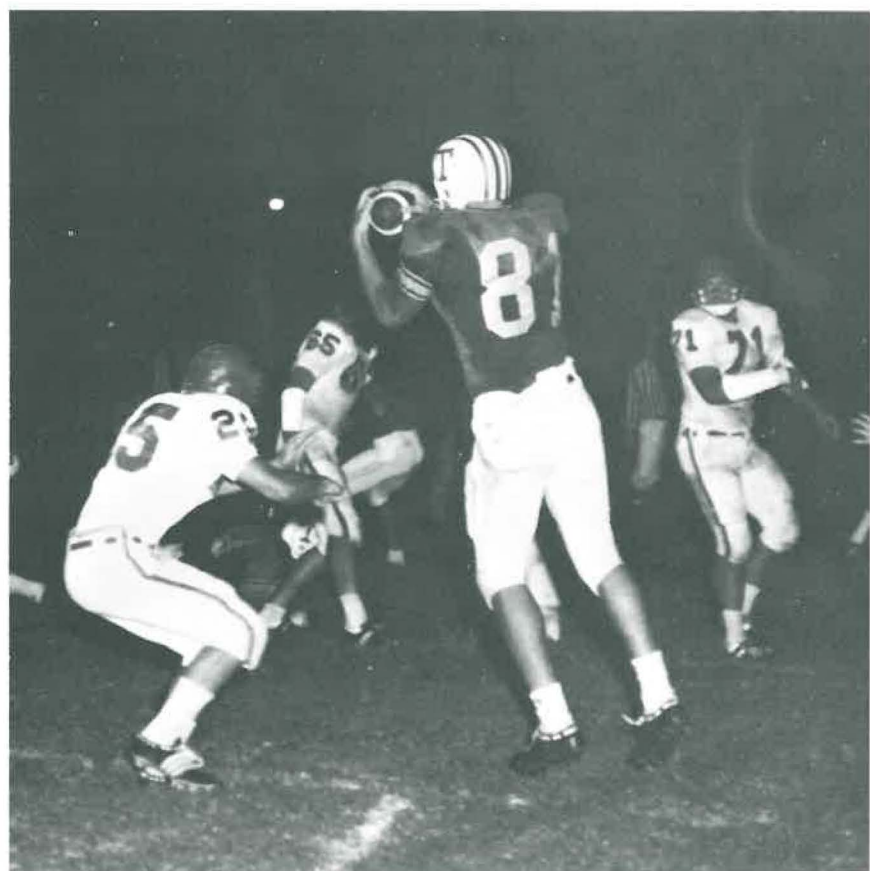

## Wonder Boys bow to A & M 20-14

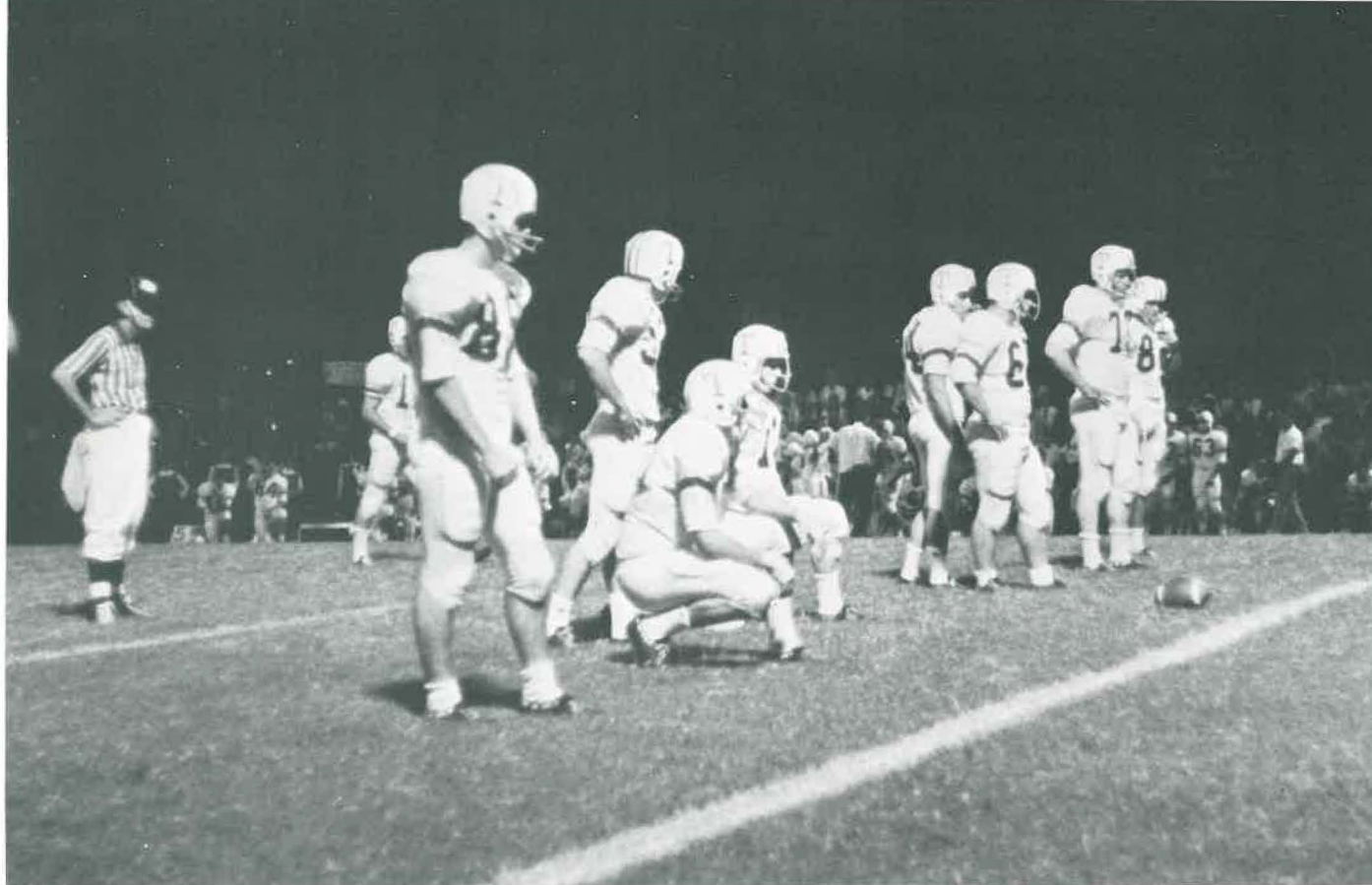

The Arkansas Tech Wonder Boys trampled over the College of the Ozarks Mountaineers for a 38-7 victory for their second win of the season.

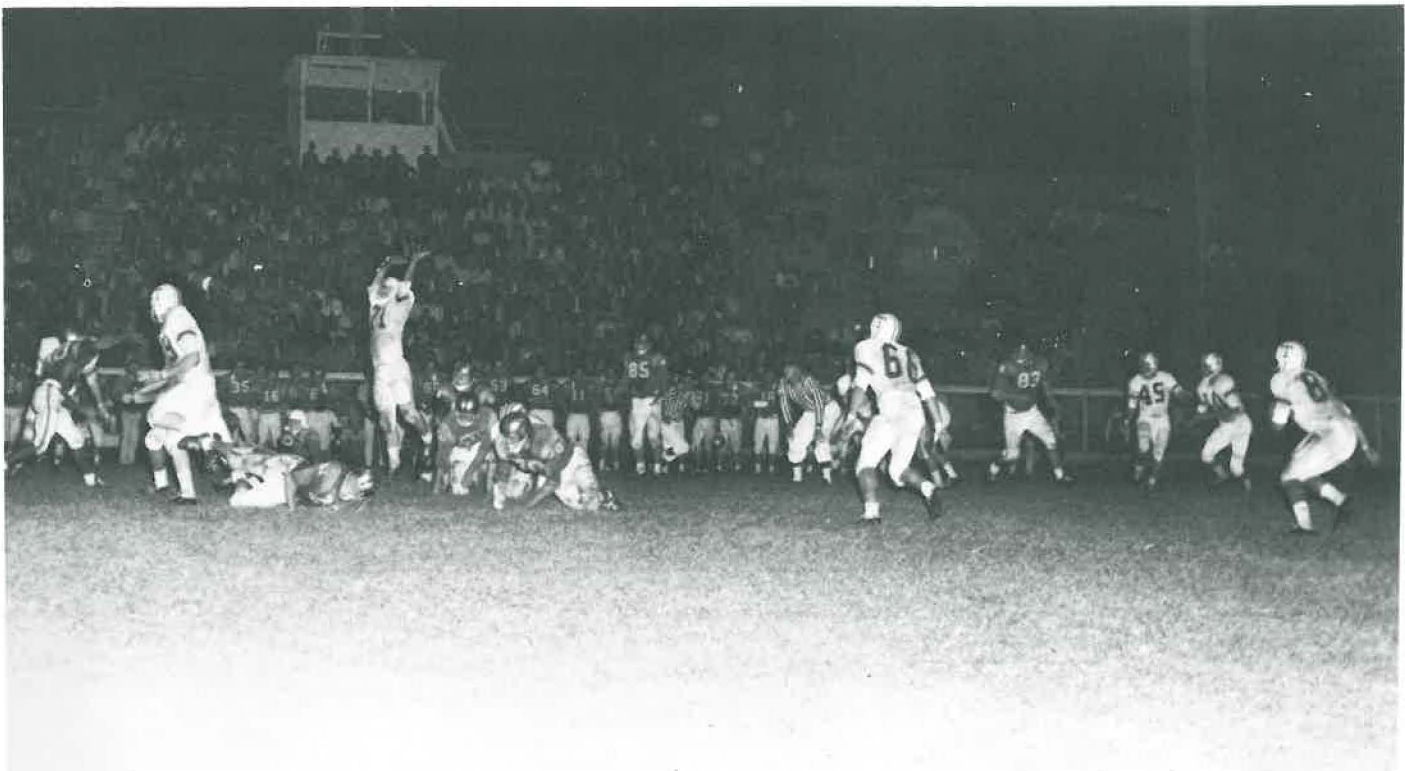

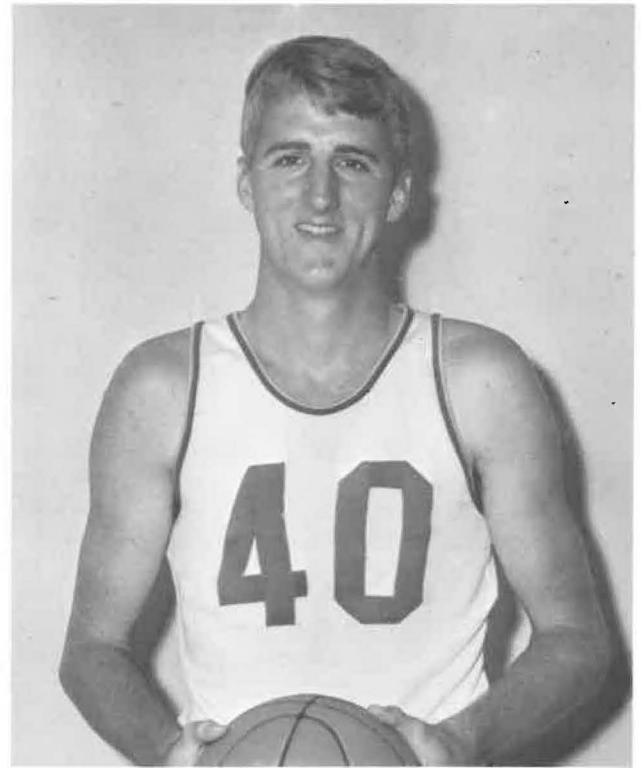

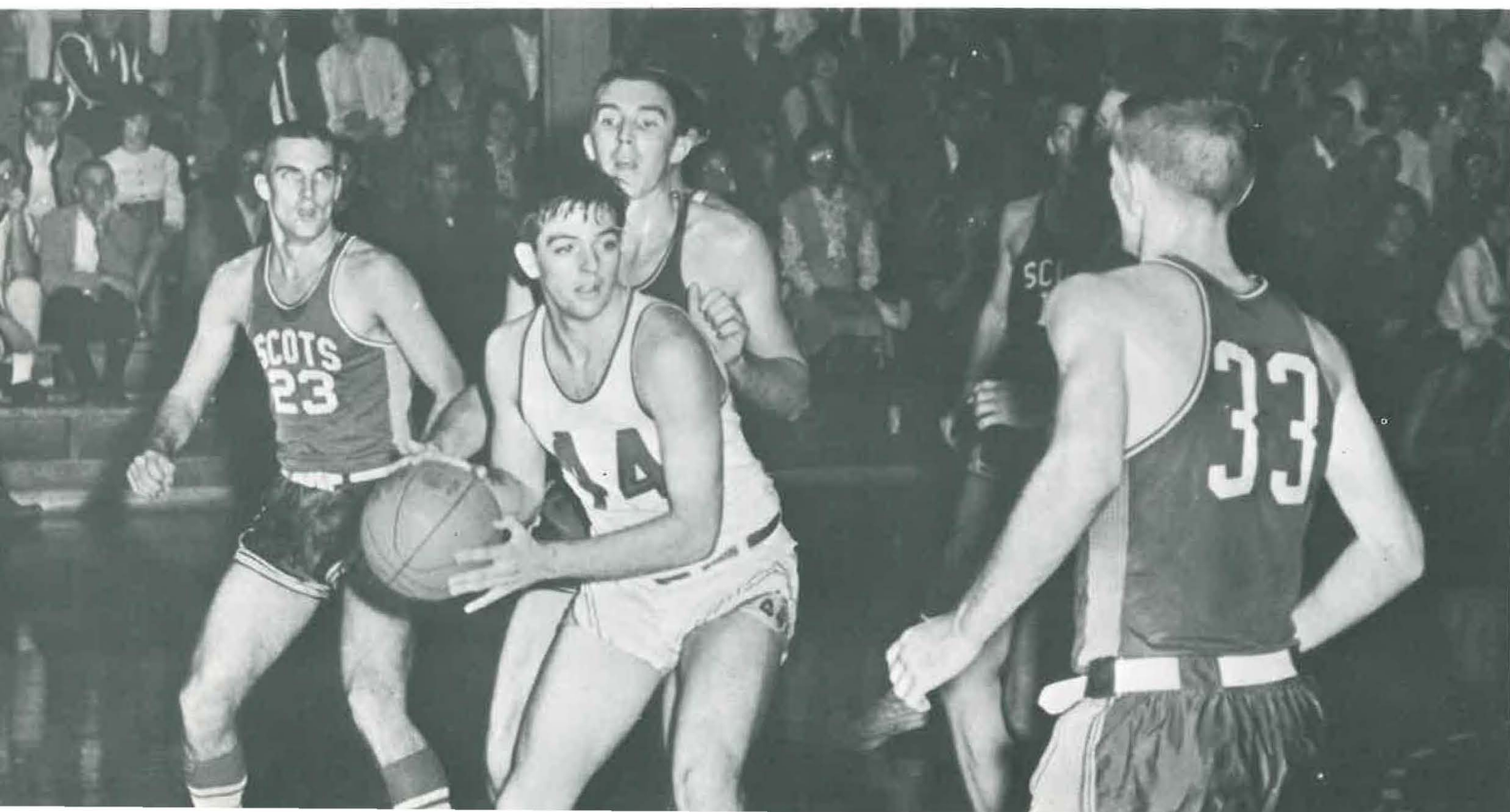

SOUTHERN STATE 81 — TECH 70. Jerry Gatling and Doyle Baker were the key men in the upset-minded Wonder Boy attack in the first half. Baker, who finished the game with 17, fired in nine early in the half, while Gatling, who finished with 16, fired in 11 for the Wonder Boys.

ARKANSAS A & M 97 — TECH 83. Although Tech managed to nab one more rebound than the 50 picked off by the Aggies, A & M followed Tommy Key to a victory over the Wonder Boys. Leading 31-20 at the half, A & M allowed Tech to pull within two points 38-36 after a rally by John Needham. The Aggies rallied and pulled ahead to stay. Needham led Tech with 21 points.

ARKANSAS STATE TEACHERS 89 — TECH 67. Trailing by only four points with 11:34 to go, the Wonder Boys couldn't find the basket and it was 5:46 to go when Terry Horn dropped through a Tech free throw, but they were down 58-72. Tech pulled to within 10, but were down 14 as the game ended. Jerry Gatling was top scorer with 18 points.

Tech was as cold as the outside temperature, hitting only 35 per cent. Top scorer for the Wonder Boys was Terry Horn with 13 points followed by Tom Rawlings with 12.

**ARKANSAS COLLEGE 81 — TECH 51.** The Scots built up a 33-24 half-time advantage and then proceeded to put the game out of reach for the visiting Wonder Boys as they rolled up a 72-41 lead late in the contest. Doyle Baker led Tech with 12 points. He was followed by Jerry Gatling with 11 and Paul Hill with 10. The game caused the Wonder Boys to fall deeper into the conference cellar.

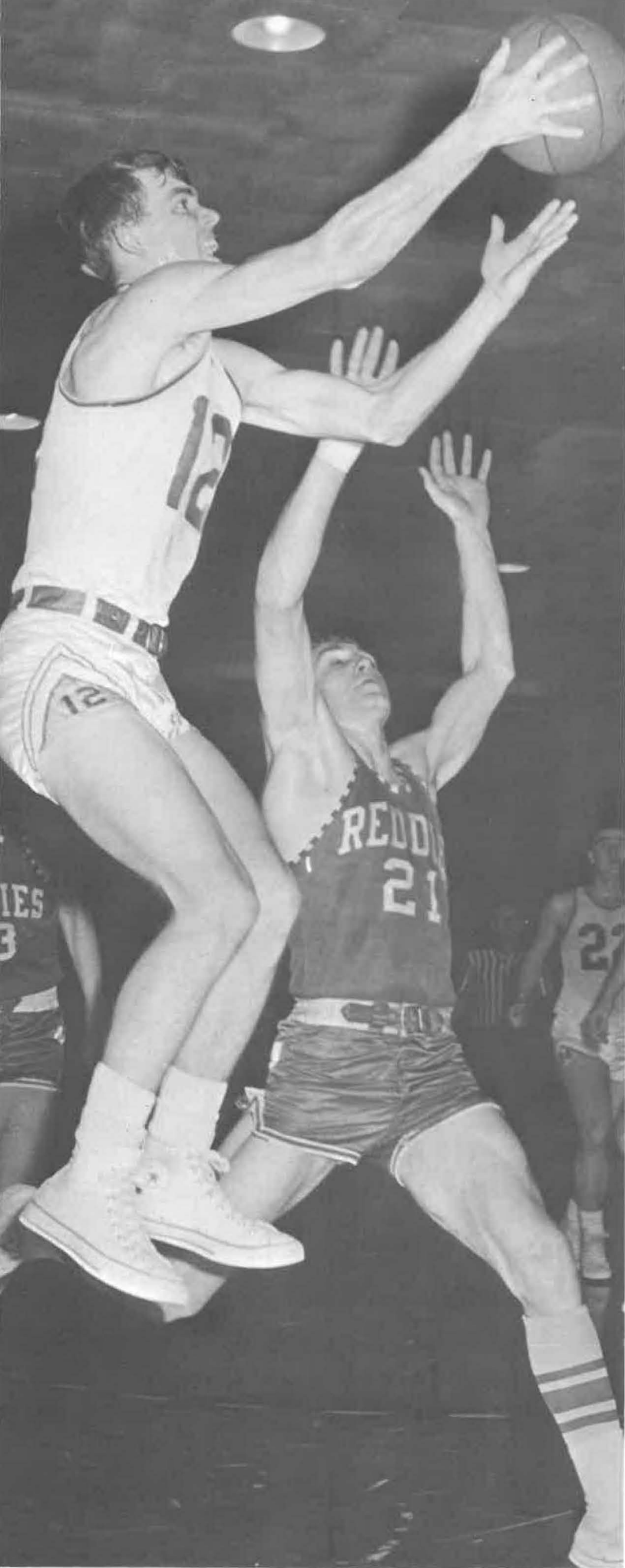
**OUACHITA 64 — TECH 57.** Jerry Gatling, who scored 21 points for Tech, paced the Wonder Boys to a 31-30 half-time advantage. However, a cold streak early in the second half gave Ouachita a chance to move into an eight point lead. **HENDRIX 72 — TECH 63.** Kenny Johnson of Hendrix proved to be the deciding factor in Tech's loss to the Warriors. Johnson did everything for the Warriors but sell tickets as he grabbed eight rebounds and pumped in 33 points to lead Hendrix to victory. The Wonder Boys' John Needham hit 15 points to pace the Tech attack.

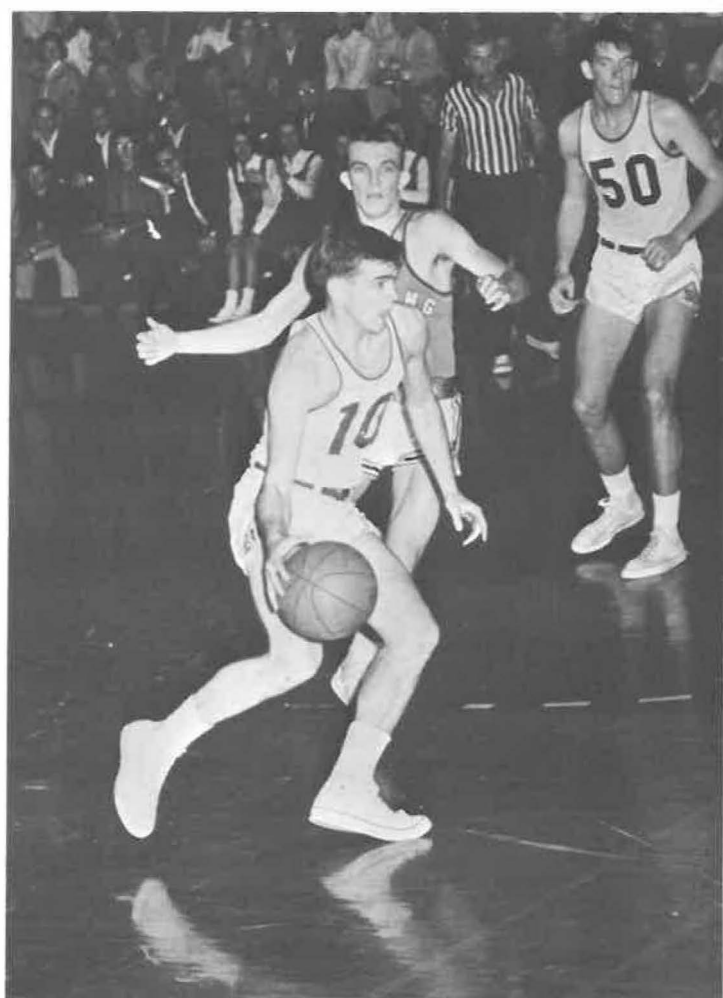

In the second half the lead slipped back and forth until with 33 seconds left, Gatling scored on a three-point layup to give Tech a 92-88 lead when he hit the free throws. Harding tied the score 92-92 to send the game into overtime. Gatling and Needham accounted for all but two of the 17 points in the overtime, as the two seniors had their best night of the year.

**TECH 77 — HENDERSON 74.** The Wonder Boys, down 39-28 at the half, came back on the shooting of Terry Horn — he hit 10 of 12 in a row — to tie the game at 43-43 with 14:31 to go. Horn tied the game at that point with a set shot. With 3:52 remaining, Paul Hill sank two free throws to put Tech ahead for good.

**SOUTHERN STATE 61 — TECH 52.** Southern State clinched a tie for the AIC title by defeating Tech. Donnie Denton put the Riders ahead to stay at 28-27 with 30 seconds left in the first half. Tech never got nearer than eight points the rest of the game. John Needham led Tech with 17 points, while Terry Horn added 12 and Jerry Gatling 10.

**TECH 55 — ARKANSAS A & M 52.** Tommy Key threw in 28 points, but it wasn't enough to overcome Tech's balance, and the Wonder Boys eased past the Aggies in the second half of the round-robin. Gatling put in 20 points and grabbed 14 rebounds to pace Tech. The contest was deadlocked 28-28 at the half and remained a nip-and-tuck affair through the second half. Tech went ahead to stay at 48-47 on Jerry Gatling's 20-footer with 4:48 to go.

They never trailed again, and with eight minutes to go the ASTC reserves took over completely. Terry Horn had 12 points for Tech.

TECH 76 — ARKANSAS A & M 75. The Wonder Boys came from behind a 16-point deficit in the first half to beat the Aggies in the AIC basketball tournament. Jerry Gatling was the big boy for Tech in the game by scoring 25 points and hauling in 18 rebounds. He hit 7 of 17 from the field and scored a free throw with four seconds to go to break a 75-75 tie, and give Tech the victory. Gatling was followed in the scoring column by David Matthews with 17 points.

ARKANSAS STATE TEACHERS 76 — TECH 54. Tech led early in the game 4-0, but neither team could hit, and it was with five minutes gone before the Bears closed to 4-3. The Wonder Boys put on a futile shooting exhibition for the entire game, although they trailed only 27-22 at the half. The loss eliminated Tech from the tournament.

The Arkansas Tech Wonder Boys completed the baseball season in fourth place in the AIC with a 6-6 record and a 12-10 season record. Coach Don Sevier's trackmen placed third in the AIC track meet, but the Wonder Boys set three of the twelve new records which were chalked up during the meet. Tommy Maddox set a new 220 dash record on the curve of 22.3. The 440-relay and 880-relay teams also set new records with the 440 team running the distance in 41.8 (old record 42.5) and the 880 team taking their run in 1:27.2 (old record 1:29.0). Maddox, Louis Besancon, Mike Smith, and Gene Brown were the members of both teams.

"I thought we had a relatively good season," stated Coach Sevier. "We set 10 new Tech track records and three in the AIC." Maddox set or helped set eight of 13 new records for the Wonder Boys. At Tech he set a new 100 yard dash mark of 9.7, a new 220 mark of 21.9, and he was on the mile relay team which set a Tech record of 3:22.2.

Other records set were: shot, Joe Ricker of Plainview, 47-5½; broad jump, Besancon, 23-6½; and cross country four mile run, David Hughey of Hughes, 25:00.

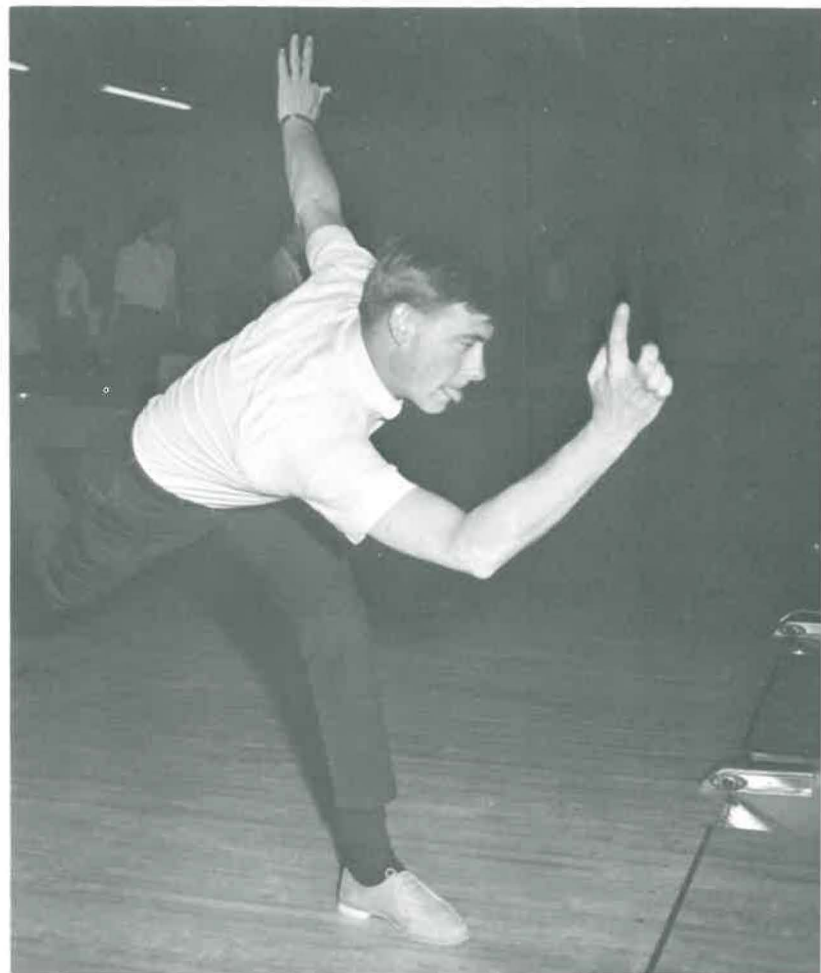




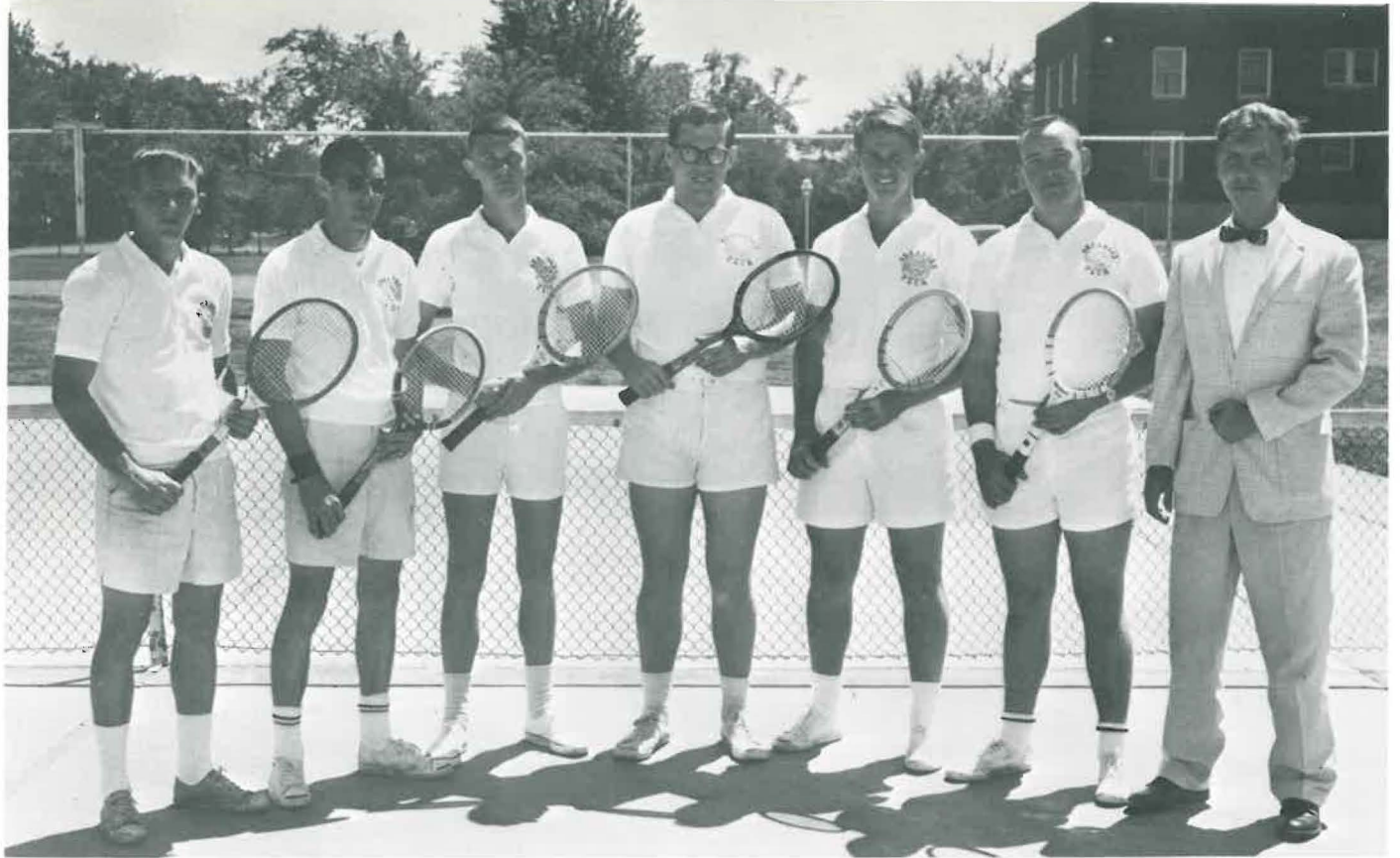

Terri Buchanan, Arka-Tech editor, admits that there are problems in publishing a paper — some of hers center around the Agris.



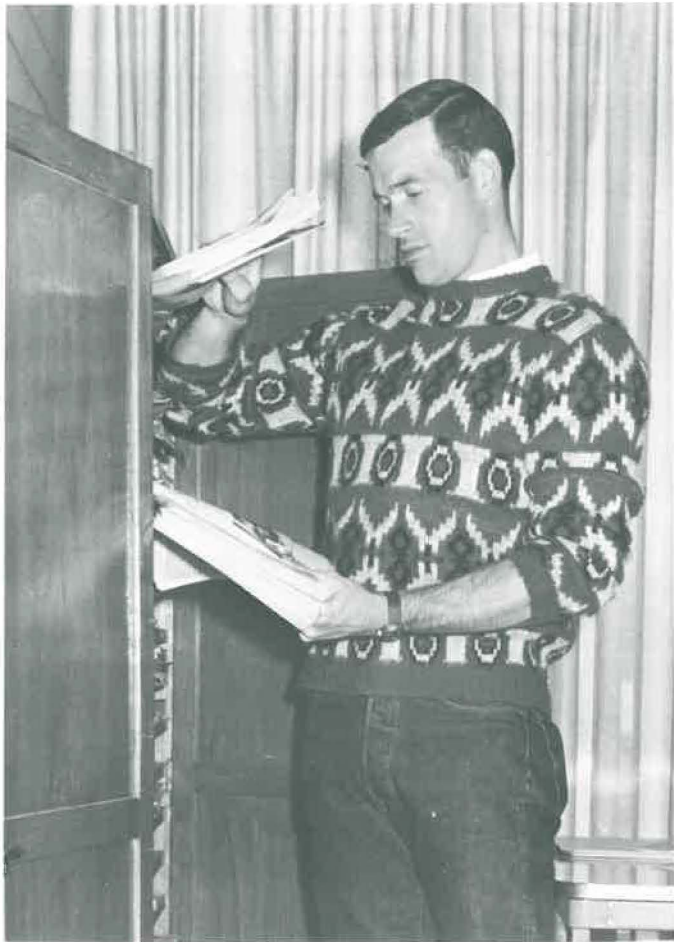
