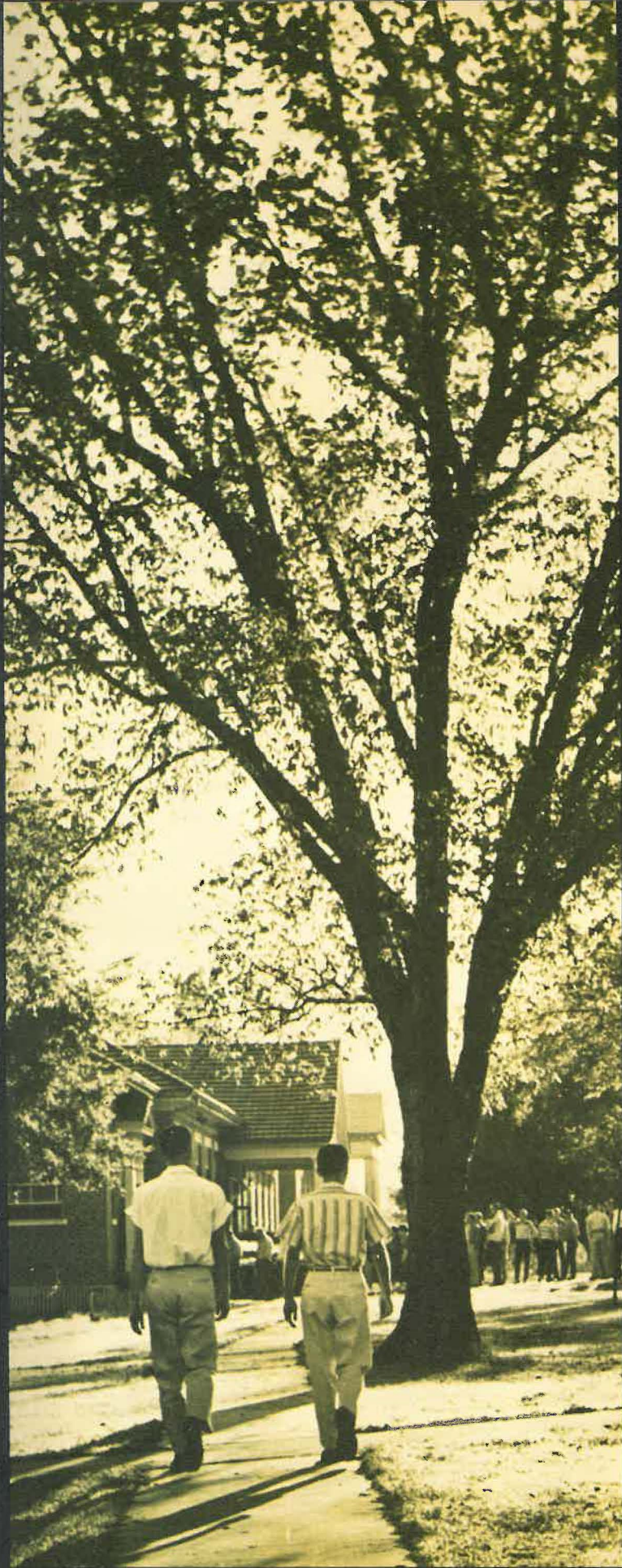

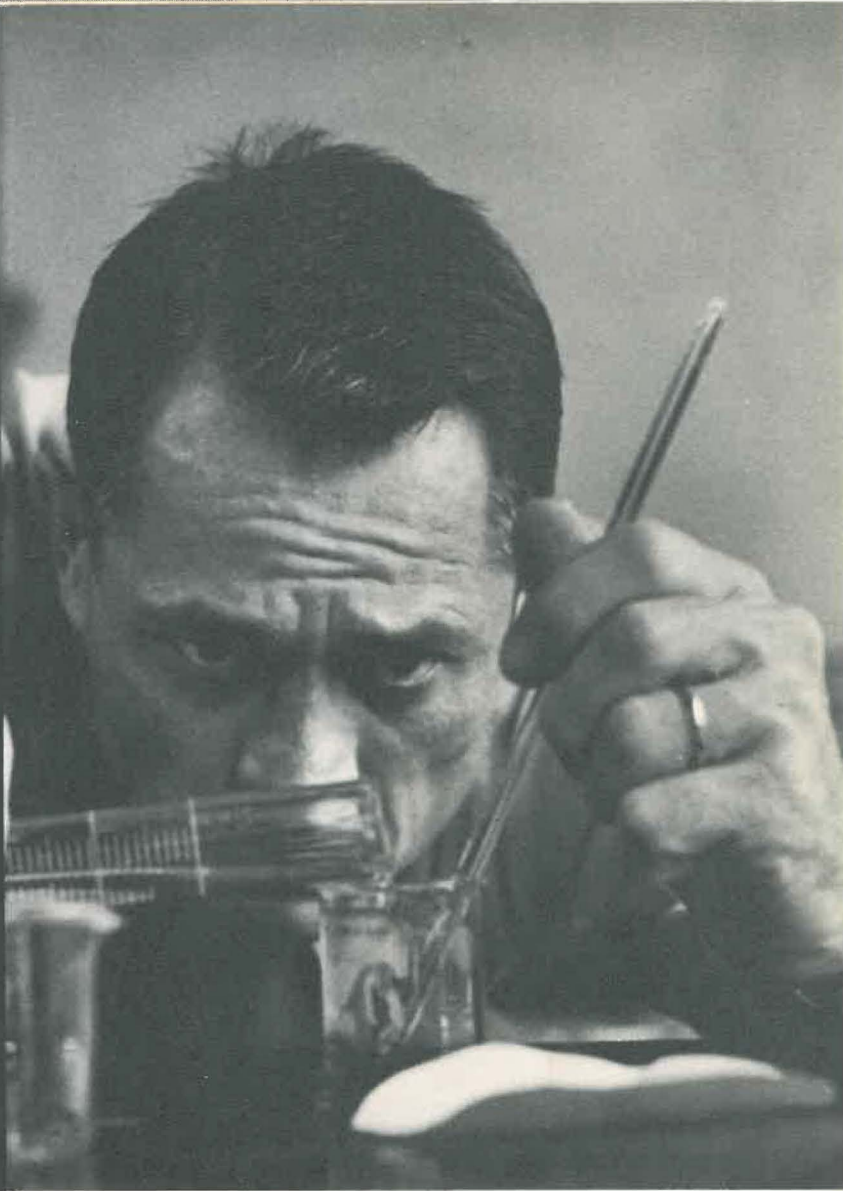

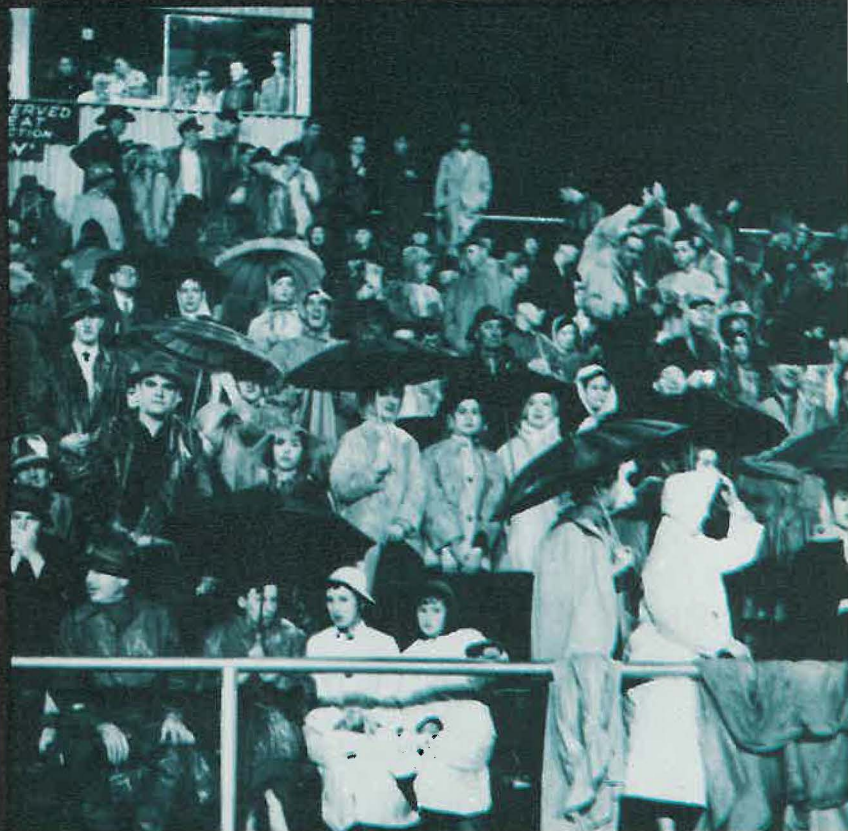

As we look back through our years of college there will be many things that we will want to remember.

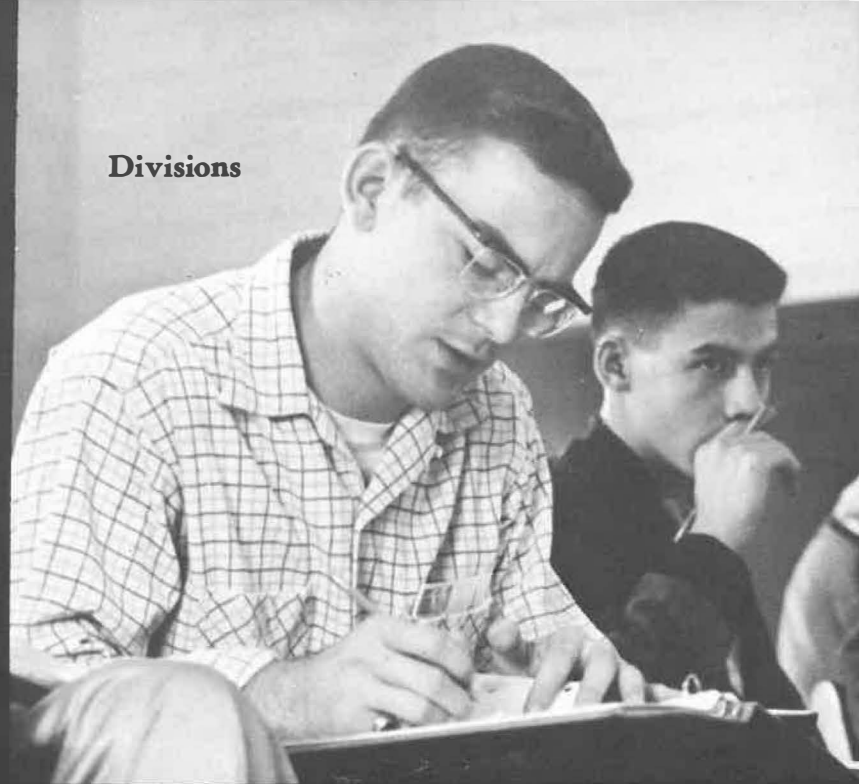
The big things will stand out. But there were little scenes and happenings—holding fond memories—which would be lost forever if not recorded.

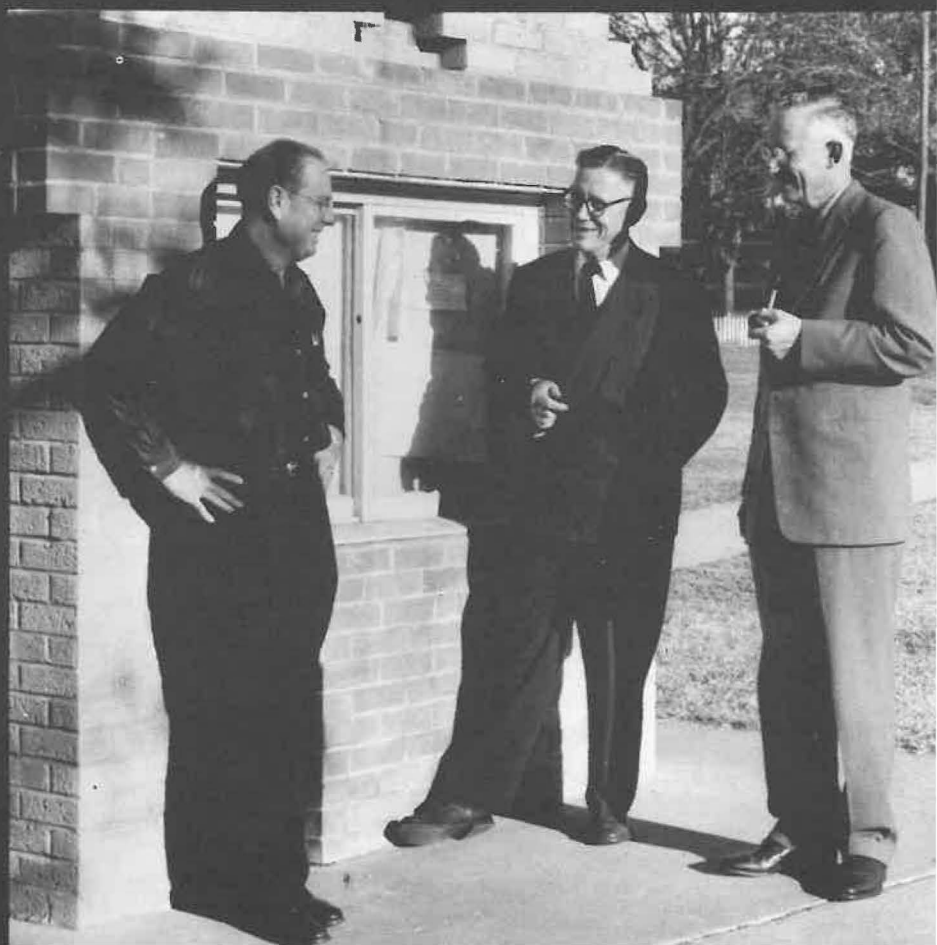

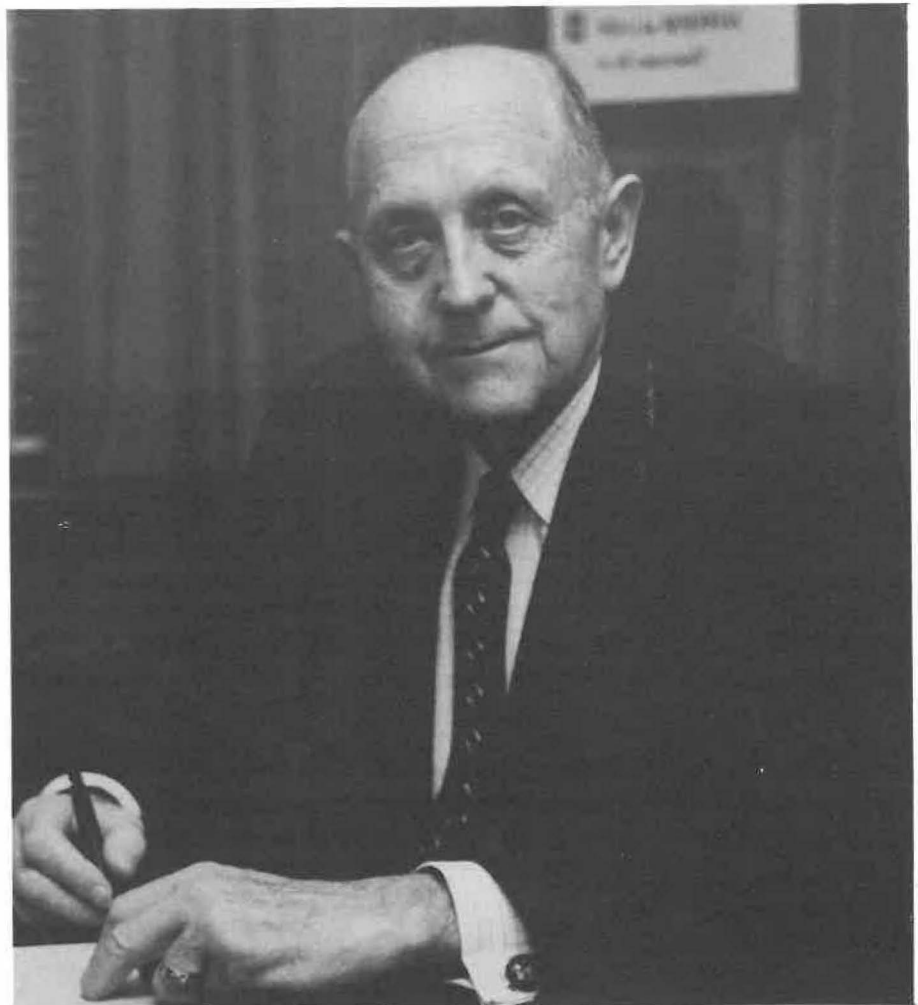
P R E S I D E N T

In Mr. Hull as in no one else is exemplified the "Spirit of Arkansas Tech."



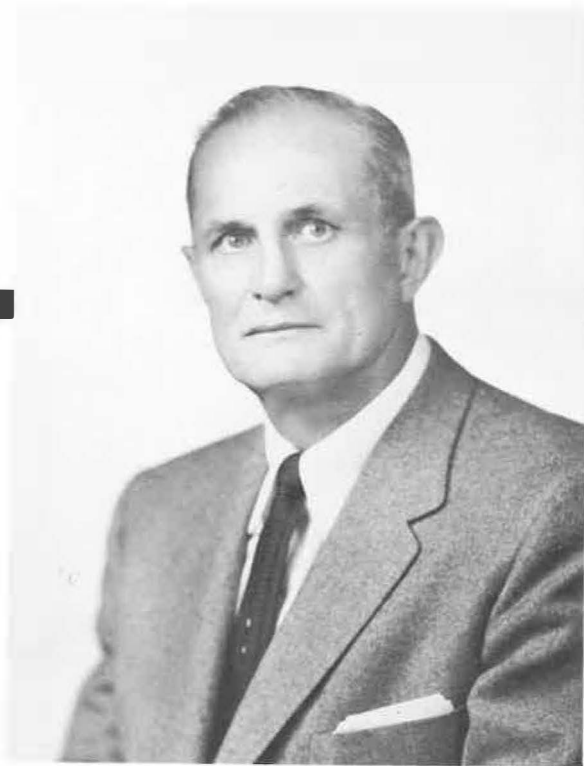
DEAN

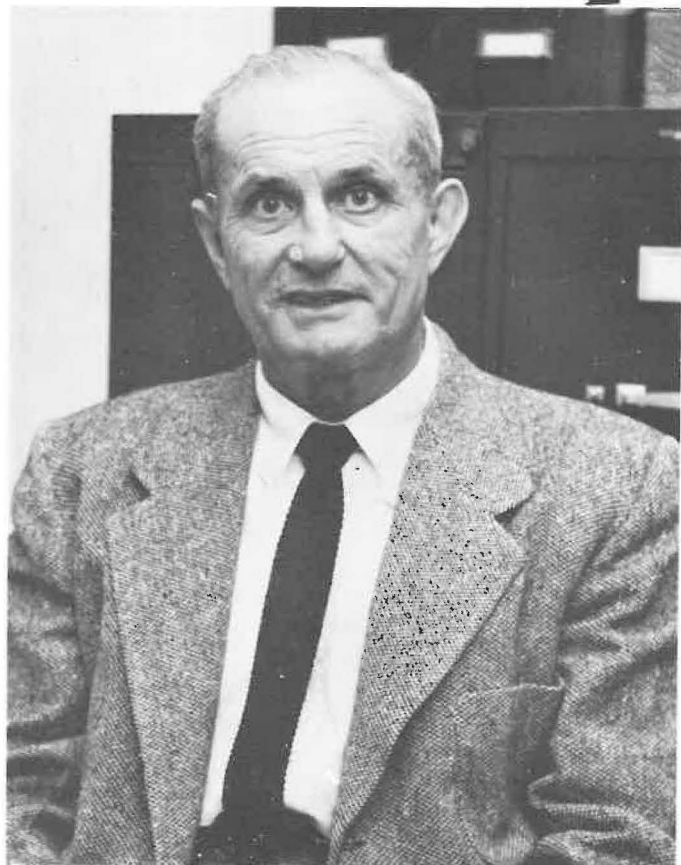


DIRECTOR OF STUDENT AFFAIRS

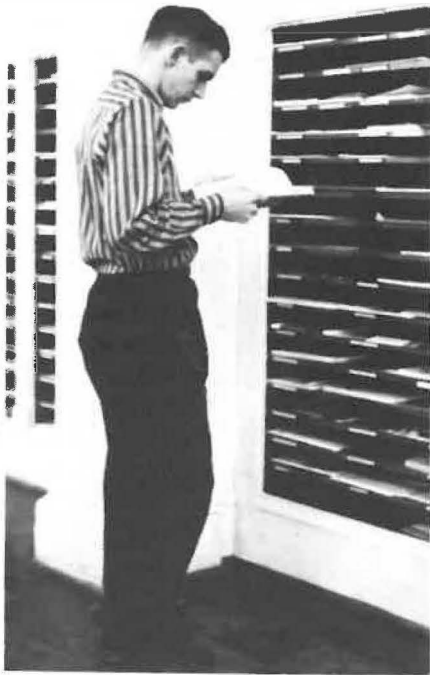
In further parallel to the brain, Old Main provides a seat of learning through its various classrooms; and entertainment via the Little Theatre.

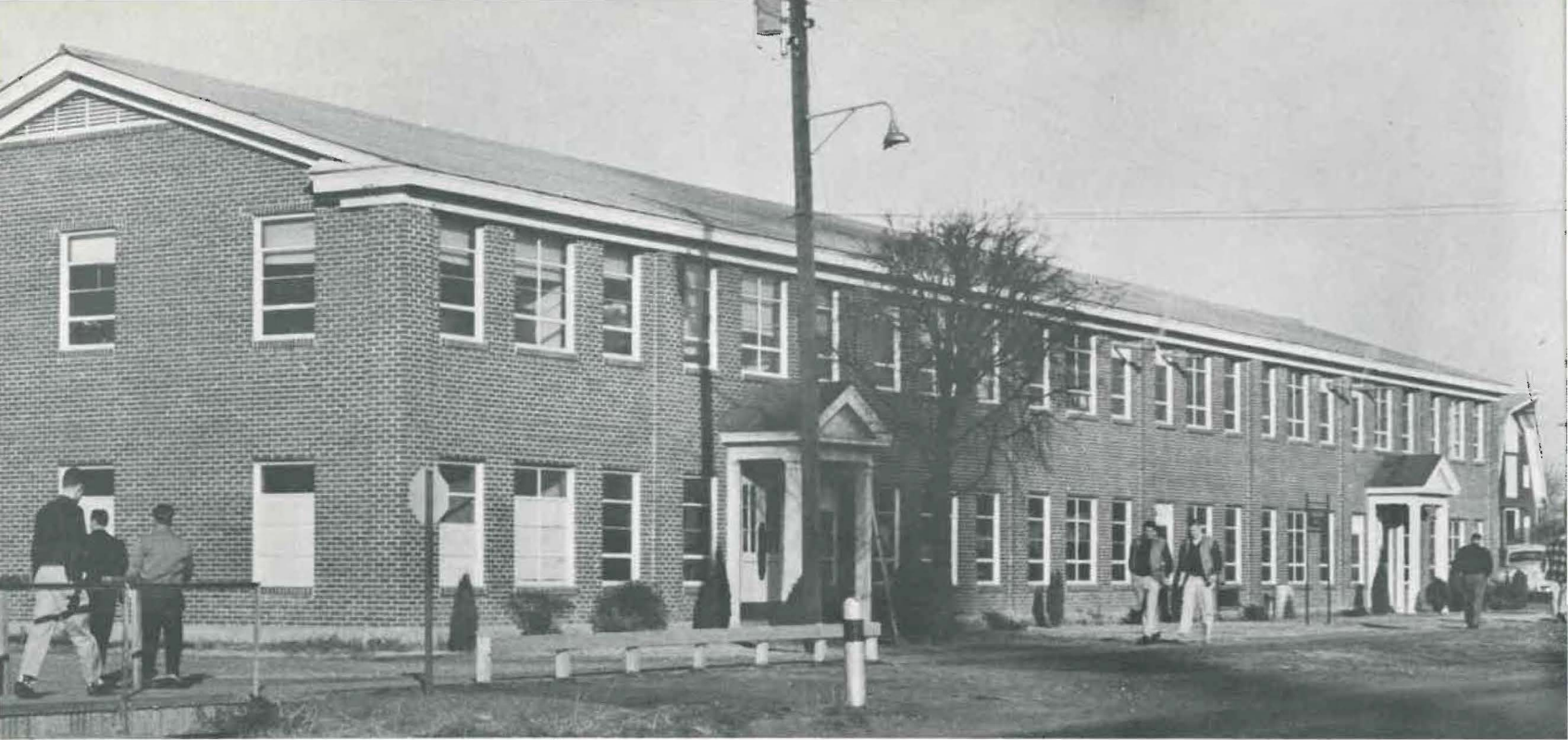


Techionery

If a person were to observe this building for a few hours, he would truly be watching a cross-section of Tech for nearly everyone makes at least one stop here each day.

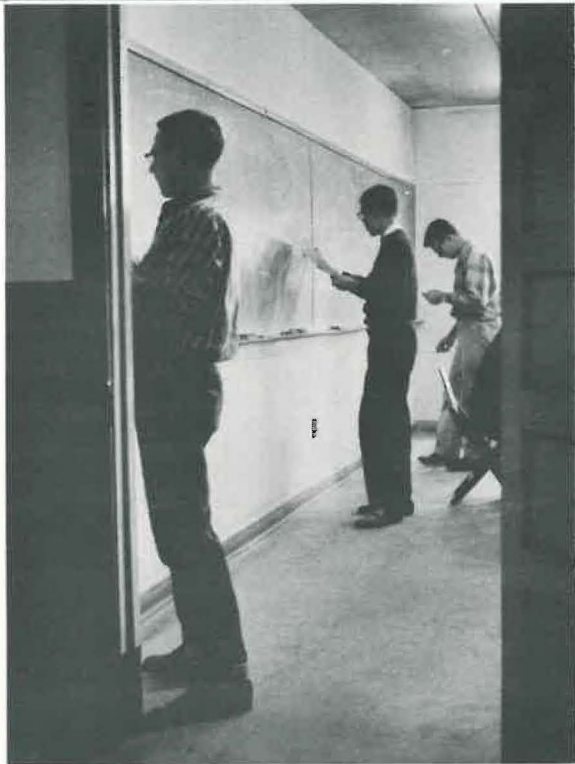

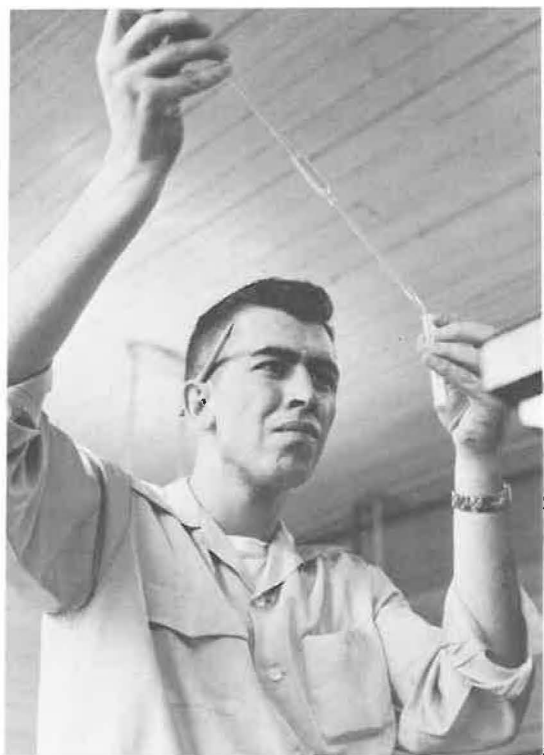




Dean Hall

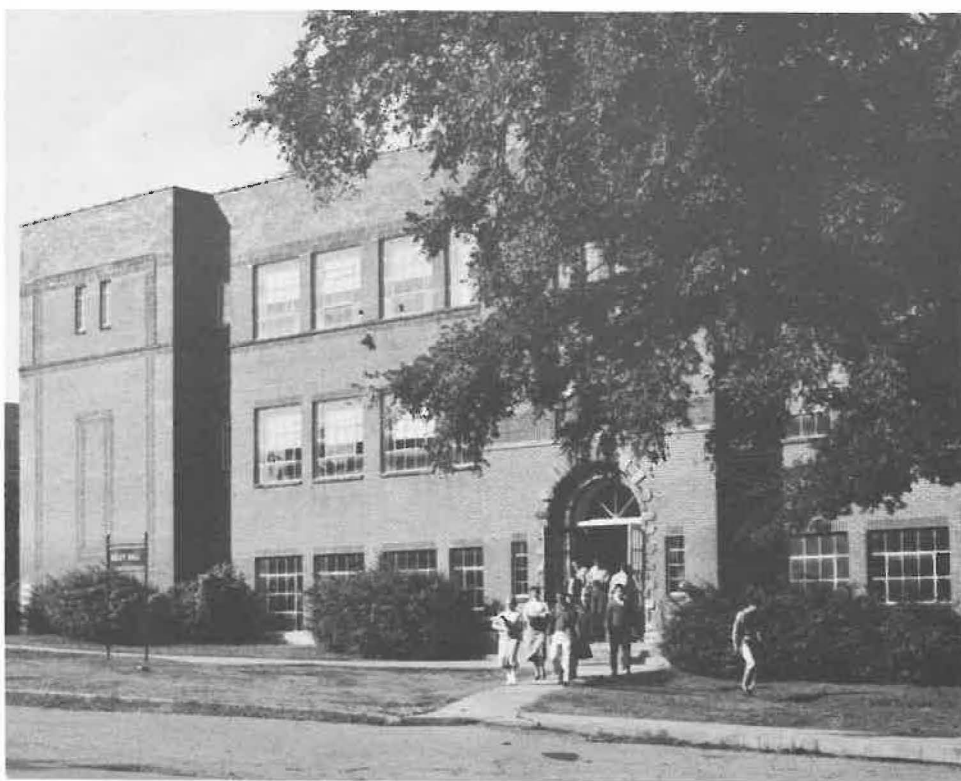




Bailey Hall

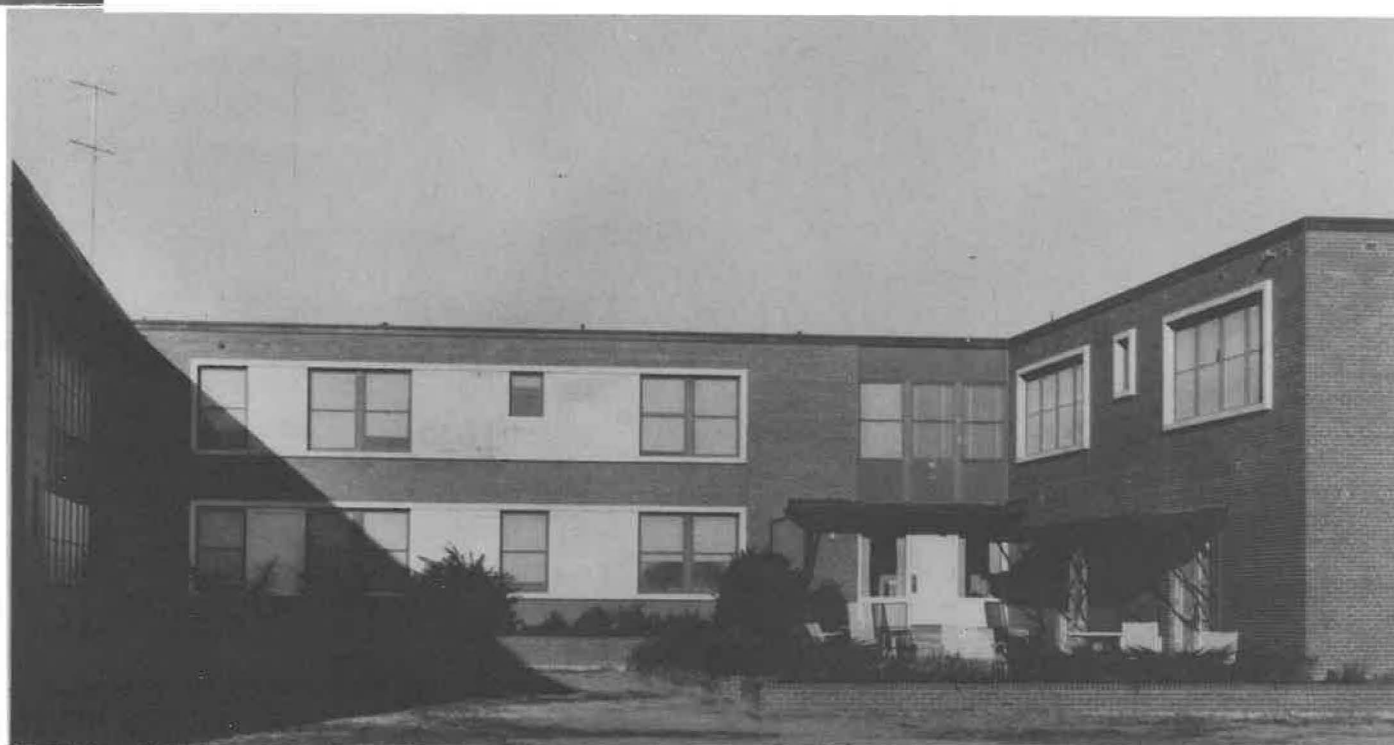




Bryan Hall

After we are seated, eating becomes secondary to whatever happens to be the latest conversational piece.





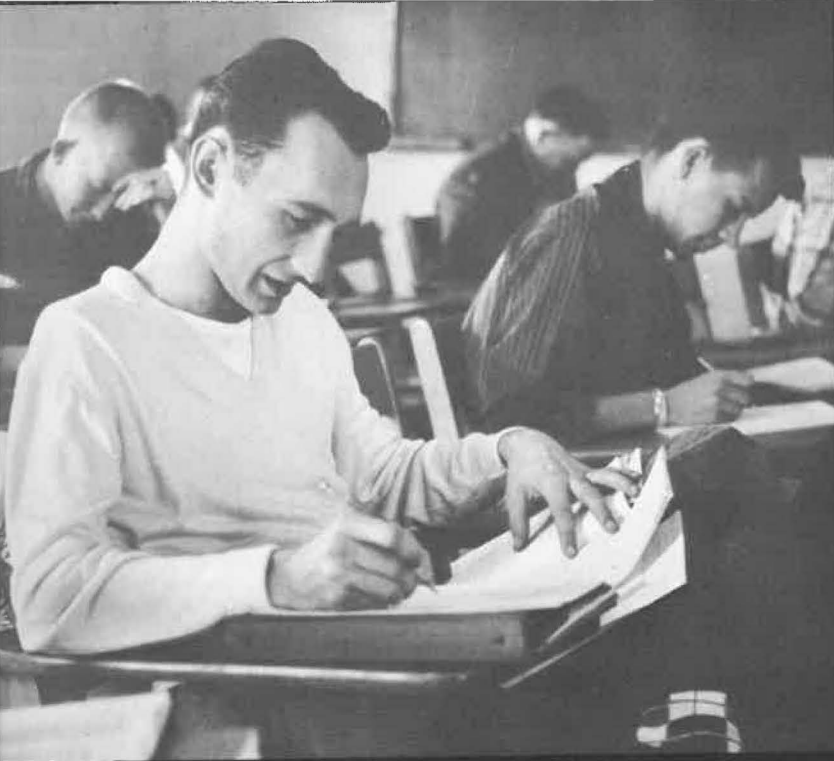
Turrentine Apartments

Here it is not unusual to see a young man hanging out the laundry while taking care of a baby or studying while his wife handles the domestic chores.

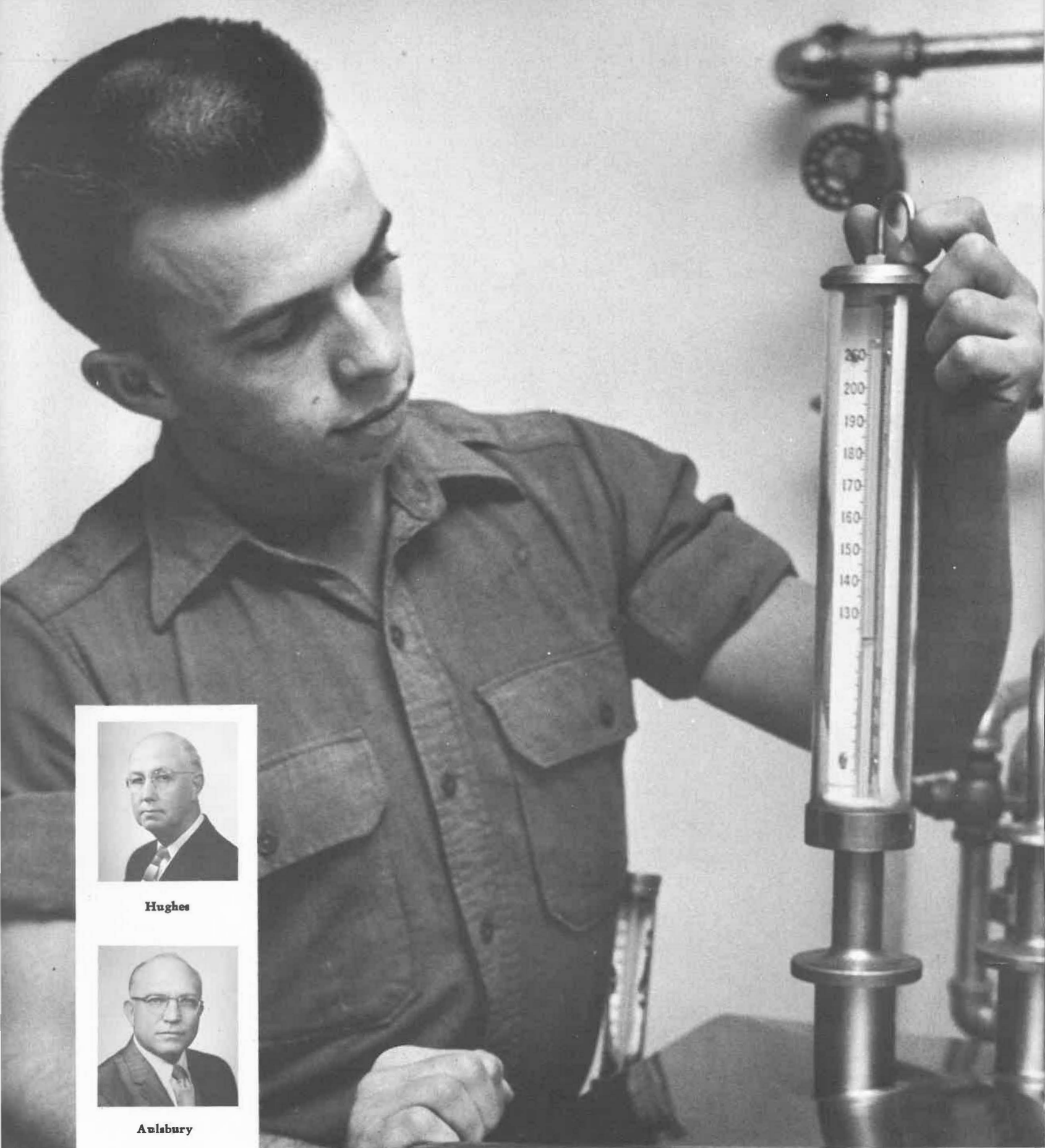

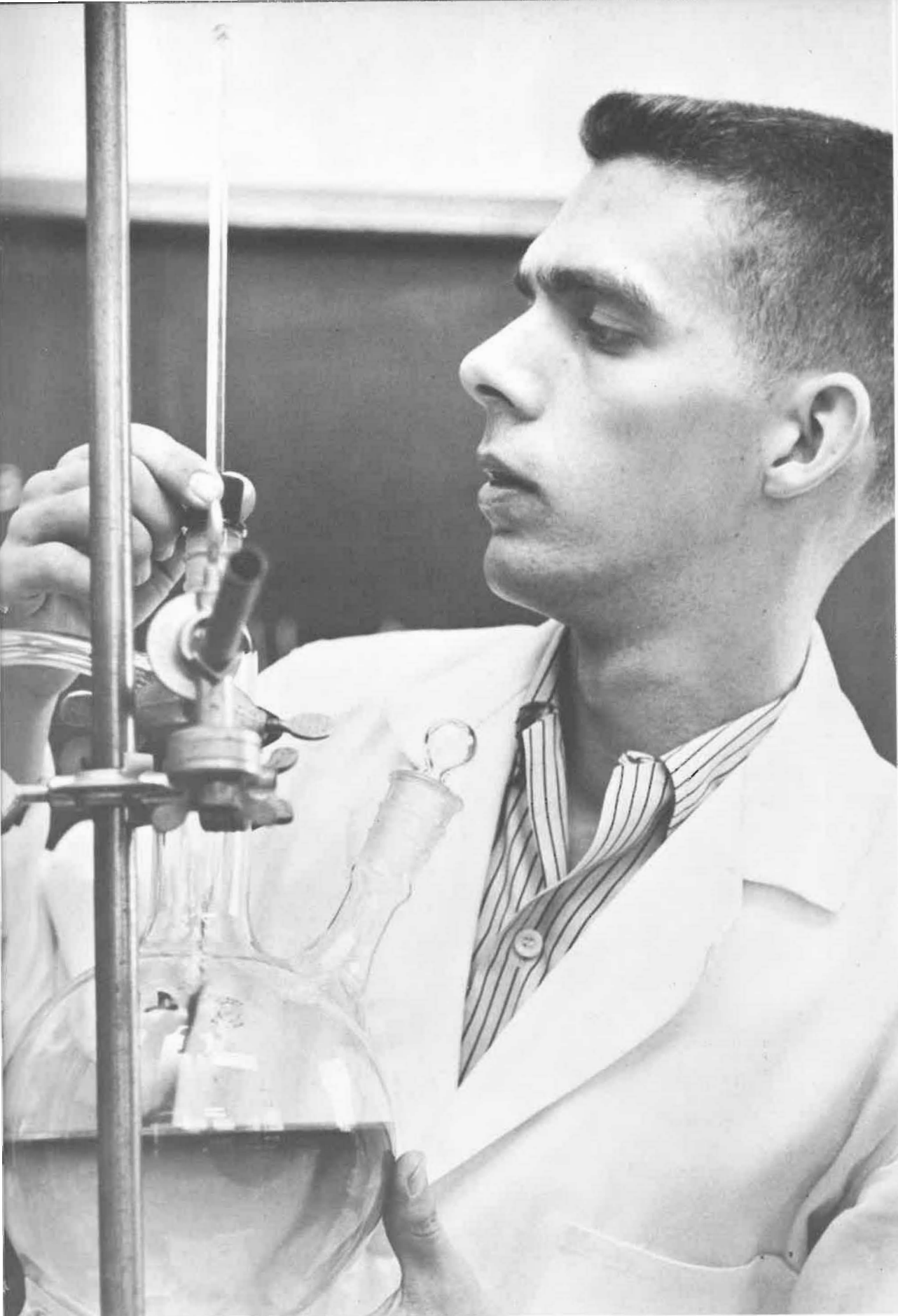


PHYSICAL EDUCATION

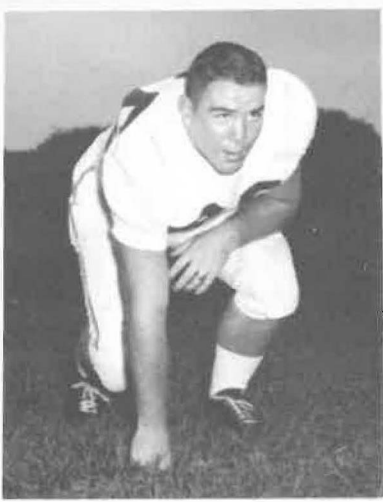
Tech Loses Only State Game To Southern State Muleriders

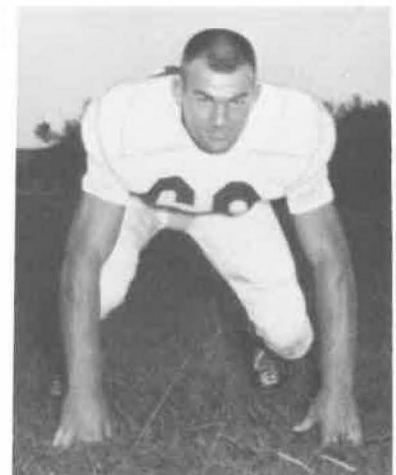

Techsters Lose Fourth Straight

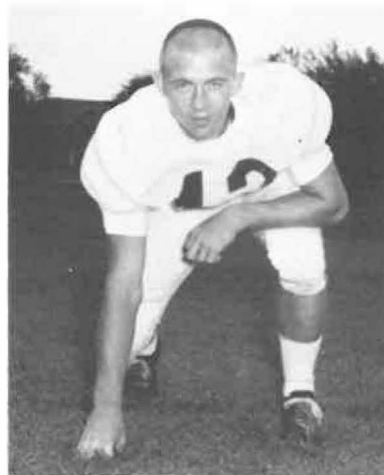

Early in the 1957-58 basketball season, coach Sam Hindsman was looking over his prospects. After watching a couple of rangy freshmen drop in shot after shot from the free throw line he prophesied, "We're going to have a good team."

As the year wore on it became evident that Sam knew what he was talking about.

Mixing some outstanding freshmen with an impressive list of veterans, he began fashioning his first two-platoon group since the 54-55 aggregation. As expected, the lack of experience in the first year men told and the team lost three of the first four games.

But then the Wonder Boys hit their stride and lost only one more regular season contest, winning 16.

Nevertheless a fired up group of Wonder Boys played 20 minutes of basketball that would have beaten any team in the meet. It was only in the second period that the flu began to take its toll, and the already over-extended men in green relinquished their lead with five minutes to go.

So ended the tournament. But people in Kansas City are still talking about one of those rangy freshmen. And people in Russellville are saying that next year is Tech's year to win it.

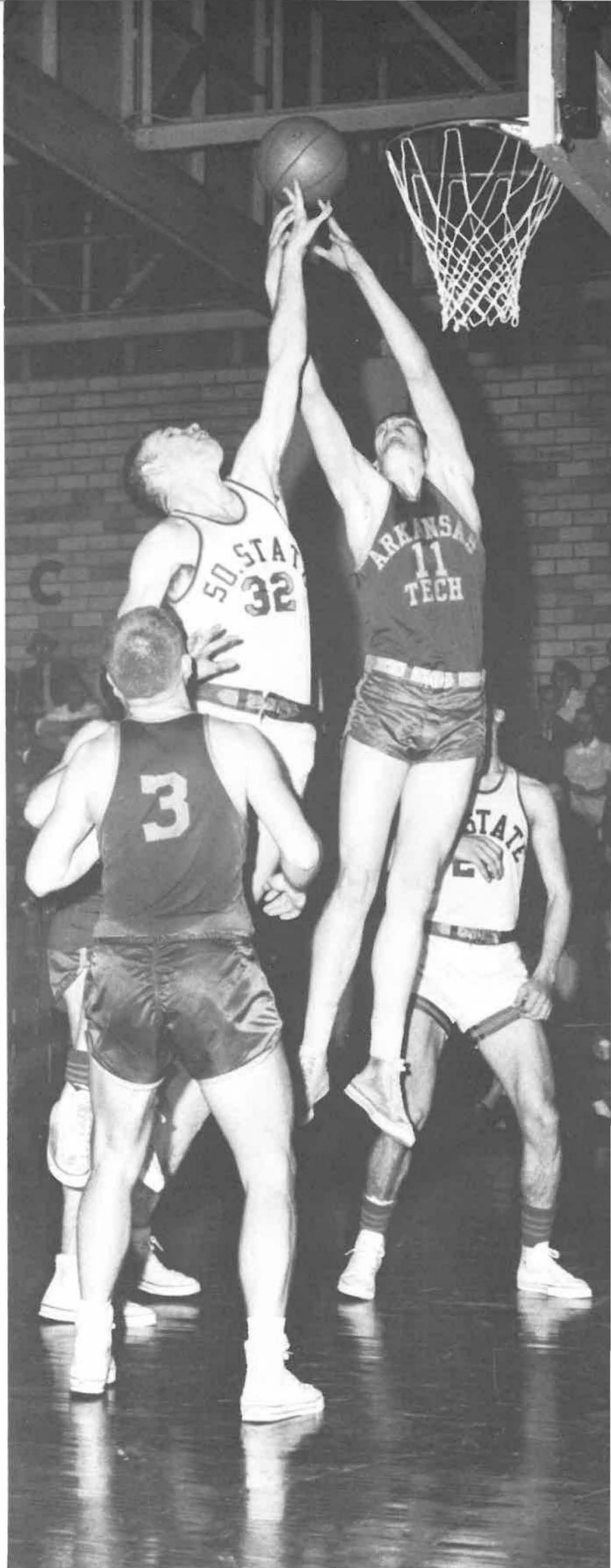

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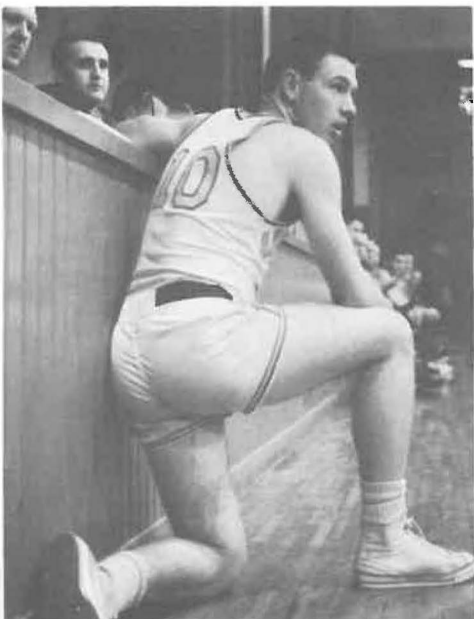
BASKETBALL AT TECH

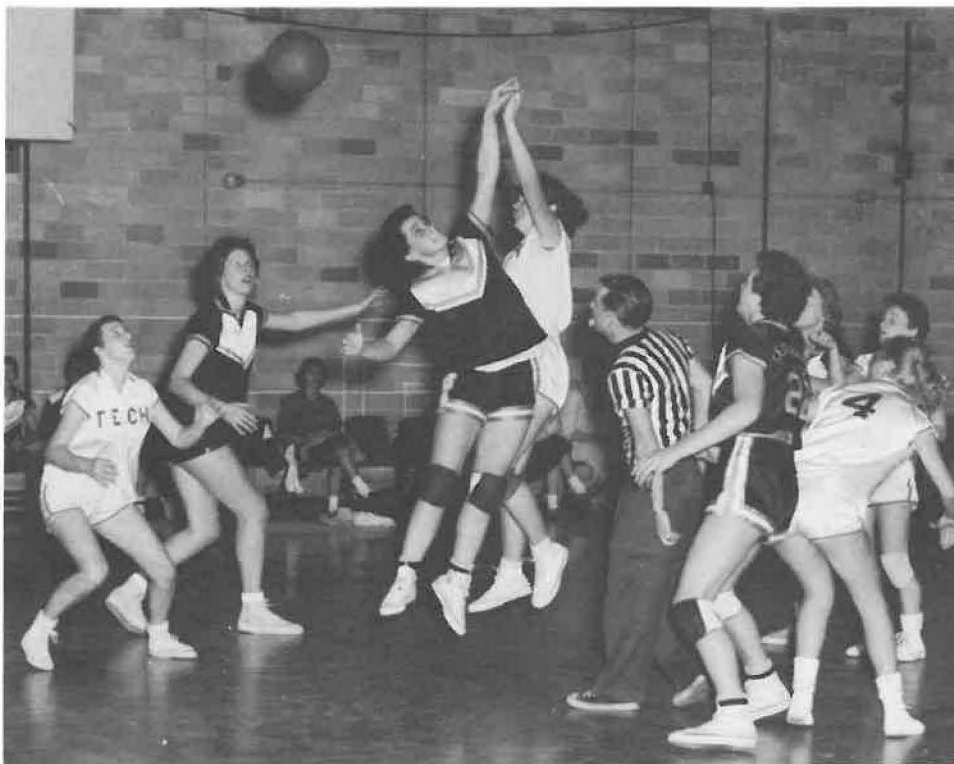

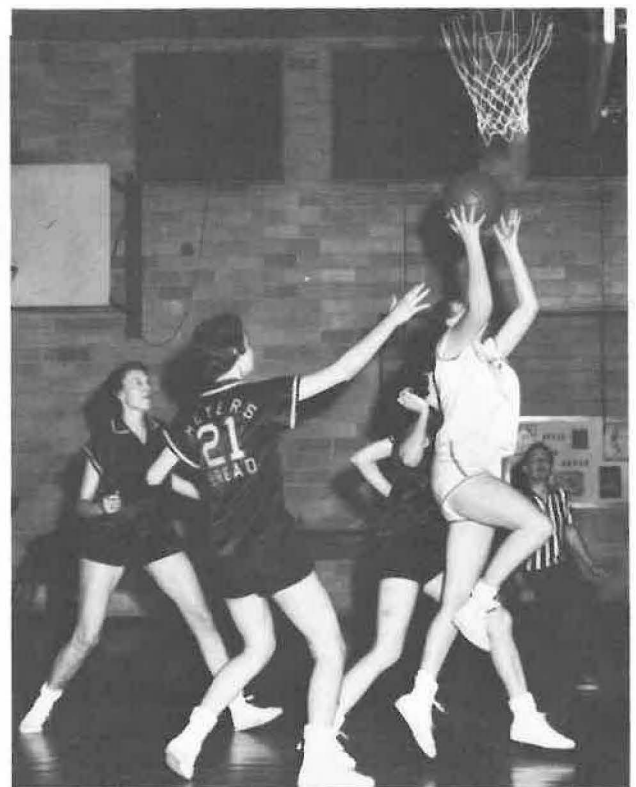

The 1957 squad took second in the state meet even though they had only three meets during the regular season. With many veterans returning, this year's squad should be strong contenders for the conference title.



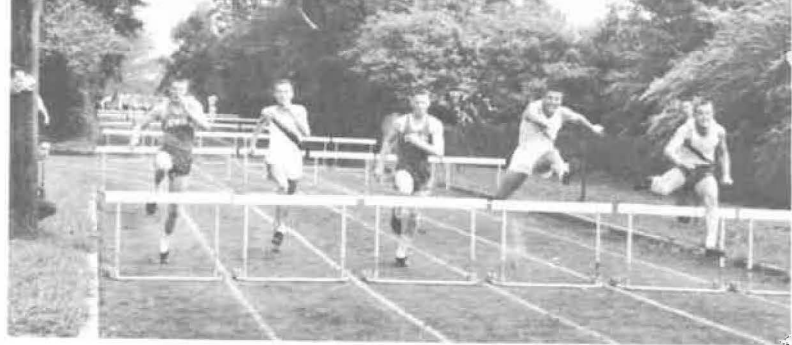

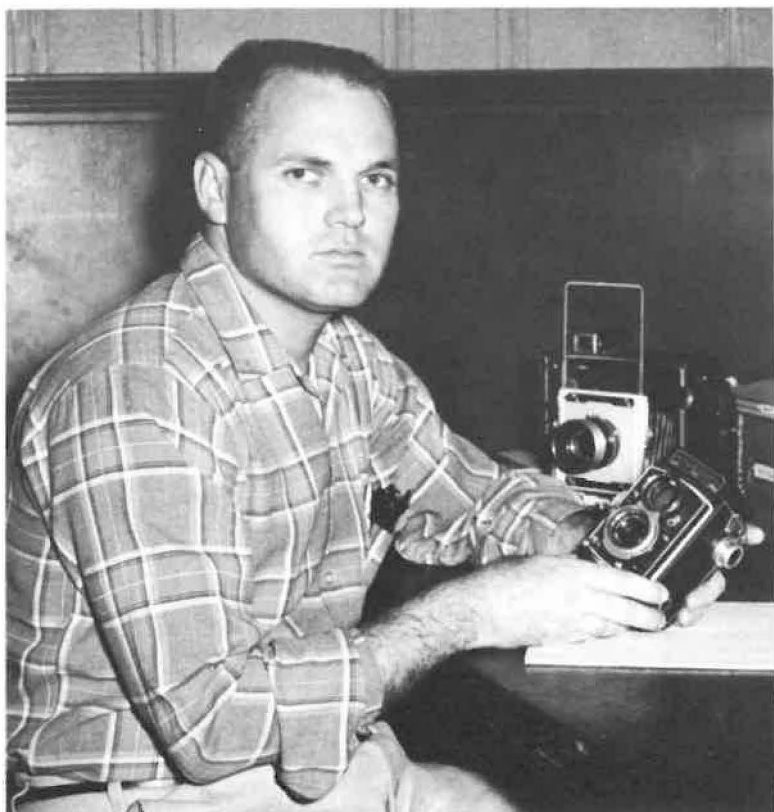
A year's work by the staff is reflected with the presentation of the AGRICOLA each year. The book records the events of the school year and serves as a permanent record of the students and administration.

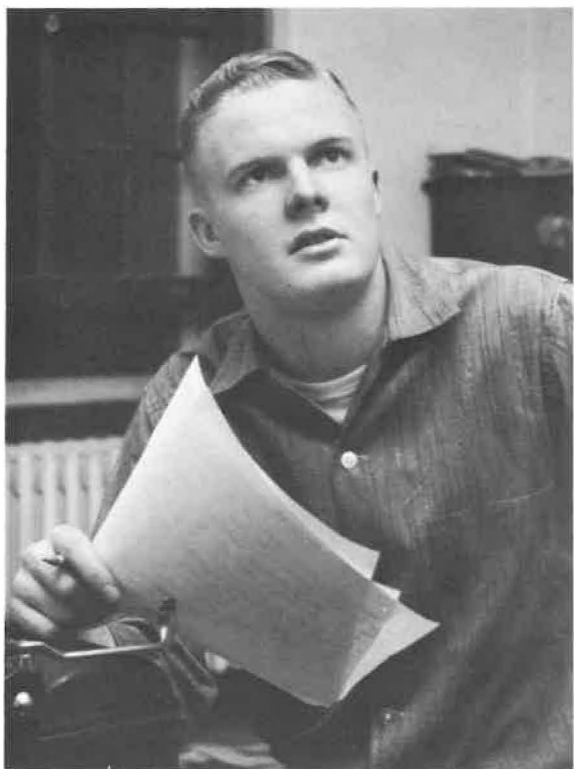

Each spring the club members, leaving their books for a few days, enjoy an educational and pleasure tour of out of state engineering functions.

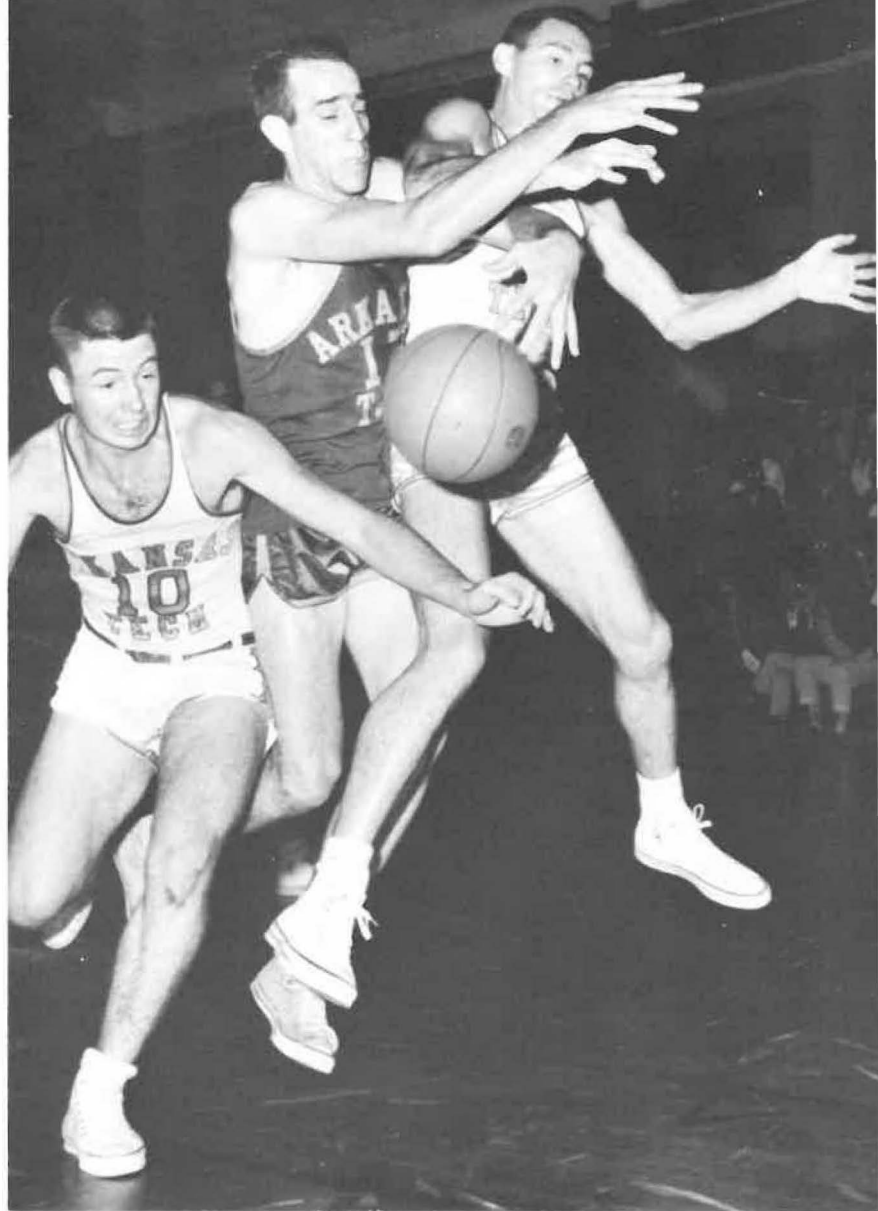

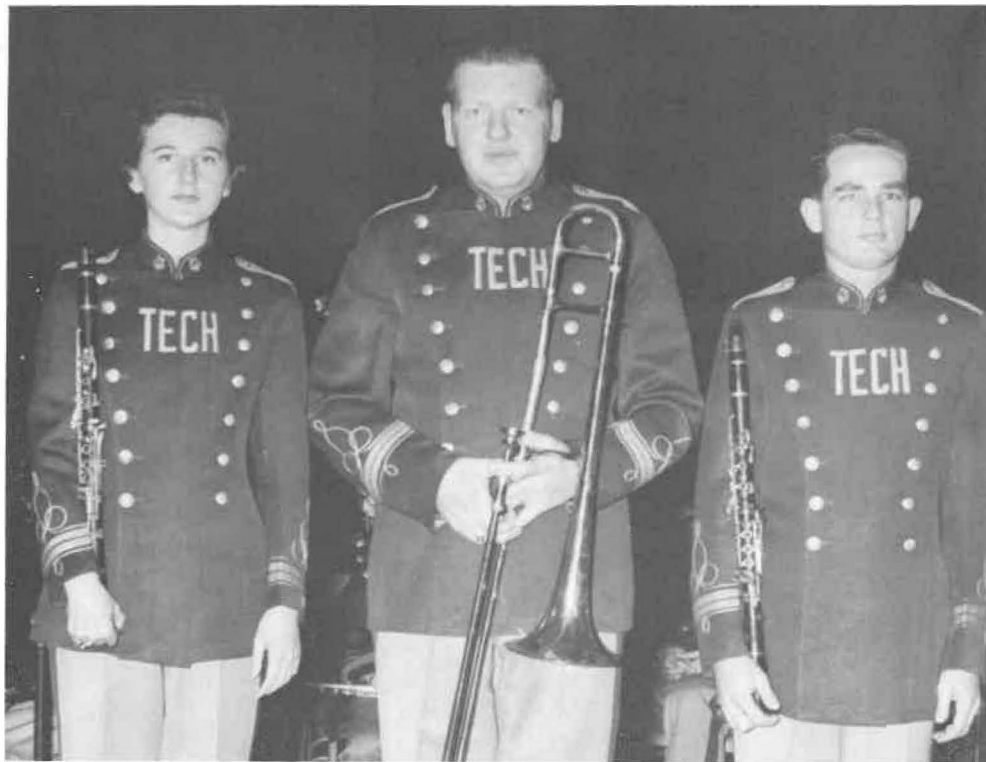

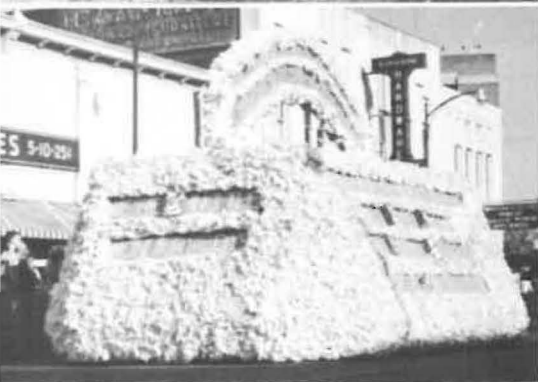
Despite bitter cold and a driving rain, the Wonder Boys upheld the Dad's Day tradition by trouncing East Central Oklahoma 43-14.

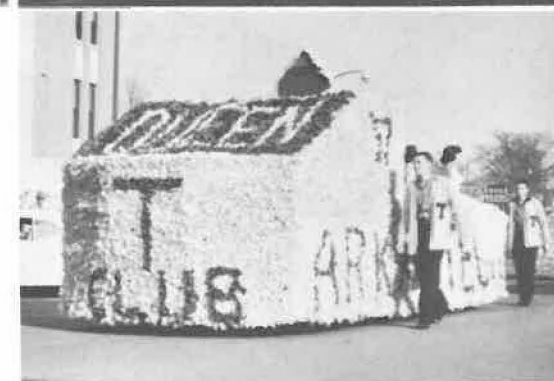
Just prior to the football game, Beverly Travis was crowned Homecoming Queen by Mr. Olen Churchill, president of the Tech Alumni Association.

Water fell in sheets as the game began. The game was difficult to watch at first because of the driving rain and, after a few minutes, because of the mud which completely covered both teams.



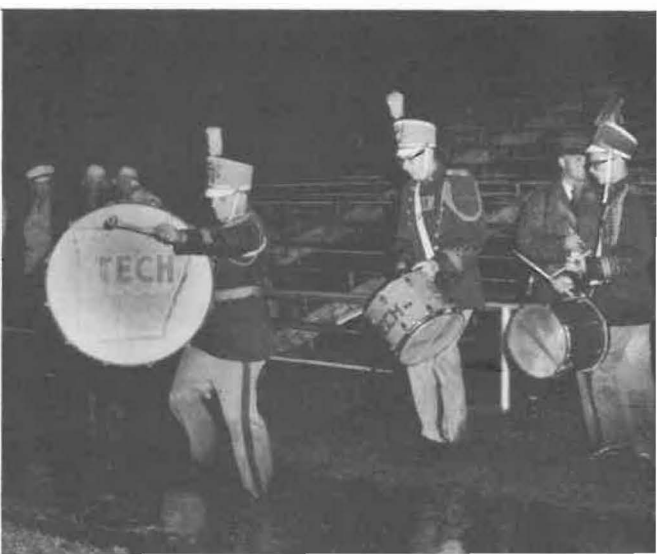
The fans stood during the entire contest and were rewarded for their faithfulness as the Wonder Boys slogged to a 19-7 victory and the title of State Champions.
